

## 7,000 Jam Wheeler For Gala Party

### Oldtimers Praise Day's Programme

Wheeler's birthday party last Saturday eclipsed all public events in her half-century of history, and took a proud place alongside the major celebrations of the Texas Panhandle for 1955.

A former resident summed it up this way: "They waited a long time to invite us back, but they really threw a humdinger. It was worth waiting for."

An estimated crowd of 7,000 jammed the Square during the day.

By actual counting of plates, slightly more than 3,500 persons were fed barbecue and the trimmings. It took 53 minutes to feed them. And the remainder of the program clicked almost as smoothly.

T. J. Daughtry, president of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the 50th Birthday party, this week expressed his organization's thanks to "everybody" for a job well done.

"Wheeler is fortunate in having the spirit and civic pride that enabled our small town to stage such an impressive and enjoyable affair," said the chamber of commerce president.

"It seems to me that every one of our home folks as well as the thousands of visitors had a very good time. It is to be regretted there was some misunderstanding and slight dissatisfaction about one or two things on the day's program but blame for this cannot be paid to any one person or organization."

The plan for the anniversary celebration were submitted to the board of directors and in turn presented to a full meeting of the chamber of commerce in writing by the planning personnel in charge. These plans were approved without question or protest by both groups of men.

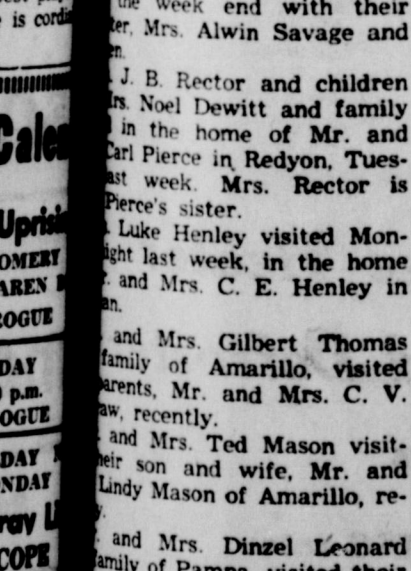
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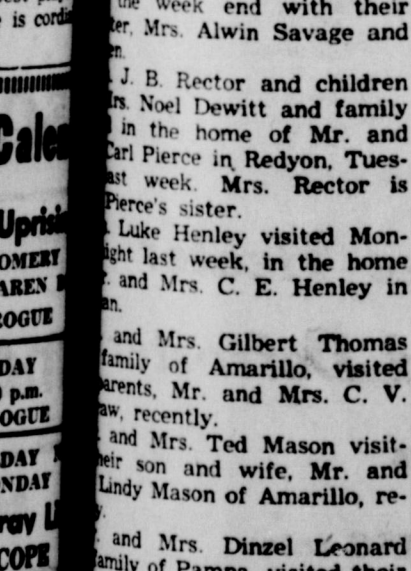

**COUNTY X-RAY IS AVAILABLE LATER IN FALL**

Wheeler county's eighth annual chest X-Ray clinic could be held some between October 15 and November 1, this year, Dr. Howard E. Smith of the Texas Department of Public Health, has advised Mrs. Doris Ritter, Shamrock City Sanitarian, who has been working with Wheeler county and community health leaders in trying to schedule the clinic again this year.

At the request of officials of the State-Line Free Fair, Mrs. Ritter had tried to again schedule the X-ray in September but Dr. Smith, director of the Tuberculosis division of the state health department, said advance commitments are already beyond that date.

"We are making every effort to eliminate all Fairs in scheduling the units and feel that a general population survey is much more satisfactory," he wrote. "The Amarillo Fair will not be surveyed this year either."

The free X-ray program was launched seven years ago by the late county sanitarian, W. R. Ritter, and has shown increasing popularity each year. A total of 3,600 persons 15 years of age and older were x-rayed last year, a gain of 555 over the 1953 total. The Wheeler total last year was 887; Mobeetie, 360; and Shamrock, 2,353.

The state health department told Mrs. Ritter they would notify her within a few weeks as to dates the mobile unit could come to Wheeler county. On receipt of this information she will confer with proper officials about accepting the proffered date.

## EGG PRICES MAY BE HELPED HERE

Many Wheeler County egg producers are not getting as much for their eggs as they might. There is an available market that will pay Chicago market prices for eggs that are produced under certain requirements. First, a person who wishes to sell to this market must sign up and deliver a majority of the eggs produced for a minimum of twelve months. The hens must be confined within a fenced poultry yard with a maximum of 10 sq ft per bird. The eggs must be gathered three times a day in wire baskets and immediately placed in a cellar or other cooling rooms with a maximum temperature of 55 degrees F. and a minimum humidity of 70%. The eggs must be delivered to a collecting station three times a week and a complete egg laying and feed consumption record must be kept on the flock. These eggs will be sold according to how they grade. For additional information of this program, contact Norville Argenbright of Wheeler.
