CITY WATER TO BE TURNED OFF FOR FEW HOURS

The City of Wheeler may be without water for a few hours late Thursday, September 15, Jim Risner said Tuesday.

The public is advised to be prepared for the water cut-off all over town Thursday night starting about 10 o'clock, and lasting two or three hours, Risner said.

A new fire plug must be installed to replace one that is in the west part of town. An unsuccessful attempt was made to cut off water in the west part of town Monday. The installation could be made before the cut-off work Monday was attributed to sand having lodged beneath the valves.

Risner said workmen will try again at 5:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon to cut off the water supply from the city postoffice to the wells, in the southwest part of town.

If this attempt fails, the water will be turned off all over town at the tower at 10 a.m. and remain off until necessary repairs are made, probably two or three hours.

MUSTANGS OPEN CONFERENCE IN QUITAQUE GAME

After dropping a close game to the fighting Canadian Wildcats last Friday, Coach J. D. Atwell's Wheeler Mustangs will open their conference schedule Friday night when Quitaque's gridiron machine rolls into town.

An appeal for a large and demonstrative crowd of fans was made this week by school organizations and town sports fans. Sparked by the loyal backing of home rooters, the Mustangs have the potential to rout most opponents this season, and fans plan to furnish that extra push in Friday night's conference opener. Last Friday's large turnout had a heartening effect on the local boys.

The 13-6 loss to Canadian last week was nothing to brag about but as one fan put it, "Our Mustangs have come a long way since the 47-0 pasting they took from the Hemphill county team last year." Like most football games, Wheeler could have won the season opener, given breaks at crucial moments.

Statistically speaking, however, the invading Wildcats were entitled to victory, piling up 11 first downs to the Mustangs' 7, and roughly accounting for twice as much rushing yardage as the home team. Scoring both touchdowns in the second quarter, Canadian was breathing on the Mustangs goalposts when the game ended.

Wheeler's touchdown came in the third period, Topper going across from the 1 yard line as the climax to a tremendous offense.

Saturday Last Day To Get Polio Shot

Next Saturday, September 17, is the final date for eligible children to receive the second Salk polio shot, Dr. O. M. Roberts, Wheeler county health officer, announced.

Parents of children who received the first polio shot last April but who have not taken the second shot, were advised by the county health officer they may receive the second vaccine by requesting it of their family physician not later than September 17.

All children who were enrolled

in the first and second grades last year who took the first Salk vaccine shot, are eligible to receive the second shot.

The county health officer stressed that September 17 is the final day, and shots may be obtained any day until then if parents will make a request of their family doctor.

The Salk vaccine if furnished free by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The unit will be moved to Shamrock, operating from 1 to 6 p.m., Friday, November 4 and from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., on Saturday, November 5, under sponsorship of the Shamrock Boosters club.

Dr. Roberts acting in his capacity of county health officer, will be in charge of overall arrangements.

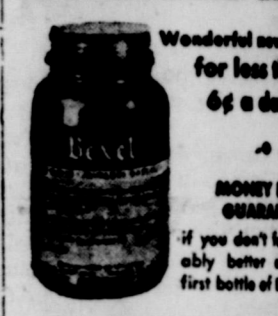

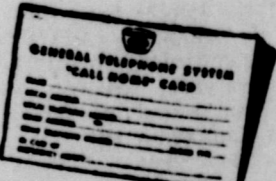

COUNTY LOSES 242 FARMS IN PAST 4 YEARS

Wheeler county lost 242 farms between 1950 and 1954, according to a report by the Bureau of the Census and USDA, following compilation of last year's general agricultural census.

The drop is about average for farm areas, emphasizing recent statements in the light of continuing rising standards of living, that never before in history have so many depended on so few for so much. The people who furnish the raw material for food and fibre have dropped to the record low of 13.5 per cent of the nation's population.

The report shows Wheeler county had 853 farms in 1954 compared with 1,095 in 1950.

The report, which covers the period from April, 1950 to April 1954, shows that a year ago there were 3,168,000 fewer farmers in the U. S. than in April, 1950.

Five years ago the percentage

of our population engaged in farm production (including ranches, of course), was 16.6 per cent, whereas last year it was only 13.5 per cent.

The decline is described as a continuation of a long-time downward trend. For instance, between 1940 and 1945, the number of farmers dropped by more than 5,000,000. A slight buildup was then noted until 1948, when the downward trend was resumed, and since 1950 farm population has dropped an average of about three-fourths of a million per year. In 1950, there were 25,058,000 farm producers, but in April 1954, the number had dropped to 21,890,000.

The statistical breakdown, by age groups and sex is interesting. The figures include, of course, children of farm families. In fact, nearly one-third of the total 6,914,000 are under 14 years of age, but the division between male and female is about even, with males having a slight edge in number. In only one age group, 20 to 24 years, do women outnumber men.

Six age groups are used in the report in addition to under age 14. They are 14 to 17, 18 to 19, 20 to 24, 25 to 44, 45 to 64, and 65 and over. As expected, largest is the 25 to 44 age group, embracing about one-fourth of the total. Next, of course, is the 45 to 64 group, only about a half million under the other group in numbers.

Indicating that entire families are involved in the farm production shift, the percentage reduction holds fairly steady through all age groups.

Largest reduction came, as would be expected, in the 25 to 44 age group, and next was the 45 to 64 group. Together they lost 1,423,000, and about two-thirds of the loss was in the 25 to 44 group. The two age groups make up almost half of the farm population, a total of 9,546,000 in the two groups, of the total farm population of 21,890,000.

Those are the groups from which most of the farm production comes, and the major loss numbers occurred there.

NEW ILLNESS HITS HORSES

Several cases of equine sleeping sickness (encephalomyelitis) have been reported among horses in the Wheeler and Shamrock area, according to a report by Dr. E. B. Range, Jr., of Shamrock.

Equine Sleeping Sickness is a virus disease affecting the central nervous system causing brain or spinal cord damage which may lead to "blind staggers." Dr. Range reported. It is transmitted by blood sucking insects, chiefly. There are two recognized forms

of sleeping sickness, Eastern type and the more locally prevalent Western strain. Vaccination against both strains is advisable and requires separate injections at seven to ten days intervals but the technique is tedious since the vaccine must be placed between layers within the skin and form a "blister".

Dr. Range also advises spraying of horses with modern insecticides at this season to reduce the blood sucking insects population, which serve as vectors or carriers of sleeping sickness.

This information is submitted in the interest of public health since under certain conditions horses have been known to contact Equine

Sleeping Sickness, Dr. Range explained.

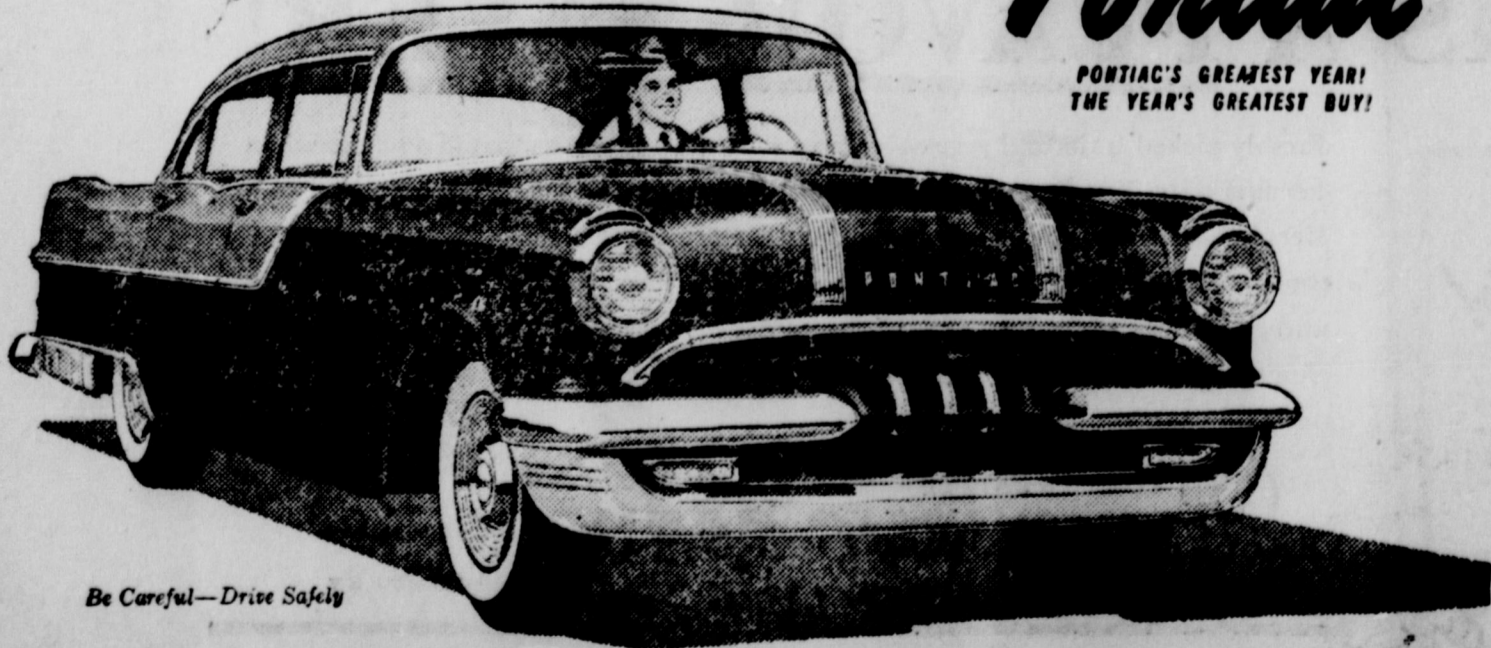


