Improves Floor Furnaces Some of the lessons learned by |

circraft engineers are turning up in an unlikely place—the familiar floor furnace, which scientific air-foil design has helped convert into an efficient modern heating ap-The way a floor furnace func-

tions is that air at room temperature flows down into the furnace through a "cool air chamber," then turns a sharp corner and comes up through a "warm air chamber." On its way up, it passes over a heated metal surface, where it is warmed before it flows out into the room.

These passageways now have been streamlined, according to the Coleman Company, a manufacturer. Air movement across a curved, streamlined surface is much smoother than across an angular surface. This principle is as true for a floor furnace as for

the fuselage of a jet plane.


Rounding the bottom of the floor furnace to do away with all sharp angles has increased the flow of warm air as much as 35

A floor furnace fits under the floor in a house, where it is concealed except for the register at floor level. A dual-wall model fits under a wall, with a register on each side of the wall for direct distribution of heat into two rooms.

Floor furnaces are made to burn either gas or oil. Heat output can be controlled by manual regulation of the burner or by automatic controls that operate from a wall thermostat.

One floor furnace will comfortably heat a small home. Larger homes require two or more units. 



As I pointed out before, all of daughter. the items produced by this factory except passenger cars were produced on an assembly line basis. The factory was turning out one truck every ten minutes from the truck assembly line and one bus every two hours from the bus assembly line. The bicycles and refrigerators, of course, were more numerous.

The passenger cars were not produced on an assembly line basis for the reason that there was a demand for so few of them. The car which this factory produced was the 'Zis". The "s" at the end of the word stands for Stalin and the car resembles one of our Packard automobiles. The Russians also have a car called the "Zim", the "m" standing for Molotov. This car resembles a Buick. Neither of the cars approach the American cars in looks or performance.

I have undertaken to give you a brief treatment for how the Russian economy works by using the Stalin Auto Works as a sample. There are many other interesting items which I will try to treat in more detail in later newsletters.







Home-Owners Blamed For Condensation Woes

"He has accepted the benefits of his modern, weatherproof house, without learning to live in it," One if owner Rowley explains.

"Many years ago there was no such problem. Houses were bigger and more loosely con-structed. Outside air seeped in and out, taking with it excessive

"Today's improved house leaves less room for error in matters of condensation. It is smaller. It is tighter—well calked, weather-stripped, insulated, and equipped with storm sash. Often it is basementless and frequently built over damp earth. Unvented modern household appliances such as washers, dryers and dishwashers generate a flood of water vapor."

Jevel. Because window glass has the coldest surface between the indoors and outdoors in winter, condensation will occur there first. By cracking a window a few inches after the glass fogs, the vapor pressure can be lowered to safe levels in a matter of minutes. When the glass clears, the windows can be closed. The window is open for so short a time that the heat loss is negligible.

The home-owner with a condensation problem may have himself to blame, says Prof. Frank B. Rowley, director emeritus of the Engineering Experiment Station, University of Minnesota.

One important step the homeowner can take to avoid this trouble is to keep the indoor vapor pressure from rising.

Professor Rowley says that condensation problems are most likely to occur in winter. Water vapor, an invisible gas, will build upgreater pressure indoors than the air pressure of the cold air outdoors.

Condensation problems occur only when moisture gets into places in the house where it shouldn't be.
