

Don't Believe Olden Builder Was Better

Don't believe the old complaint that houses today aren't as good as they used to be. In most important respects they're much better.

One example of the superiority of the modern house is the wide spread use of preservative-treated millwork—windows, panel doors, and cabinets. Chemically treated millwork, generally made of pon-derosa pine, will last at least four or five times as long as the wood used in the so-called "golden age"

of home building.

Basically, preservatives do two things. They poison the fungus that causes decay. They also reduce the absorption of moisture

in wood. The ability to keep out moisture means that ponderosa pine windows and panel doors are free from sticking in any kind of weather. Sticking is caused when wood swells after absorbing moisture. Later, during dry weather, the wood shrinks. Preservativetreated wood, for all practical purposes, does not swell or shrink.

Preservatives improve wood's natural affinity for paint. They prevent paint failures such as bub-bling, cracking, and peeling, which are caused by the presence of moisture beneath the painted sur-
