GAME MEETING MON., JUNE 11

Dick DeArment, biologist for the Texas Game and Fish Department, announced this week that a meeting of sportsmen and hunters would be held next Monday, June 11, in the District Courtroom in Wheeler at 8 o'clock p.m.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss the 1956 regulations for the Panhandle; explain and discuss Wing Studies report on last season's game harvest; and explain something about the foreign game birds that have been brought into the area.

The meeting will be carried out by the biologist and Game Warden G. P. Davis, of Shamrock, under the sponsorship of the State Game and Fish Department.

Anyone interested in the propagation of game birds and animals or those interested in same from merely the hunter's point of view, are urged to be in attendance, Mr. DeArment said.

A question and answer period will be held, at which time any question pertaining to game, or the Game and Fish regulations will be answered.

The public is invited to attend.

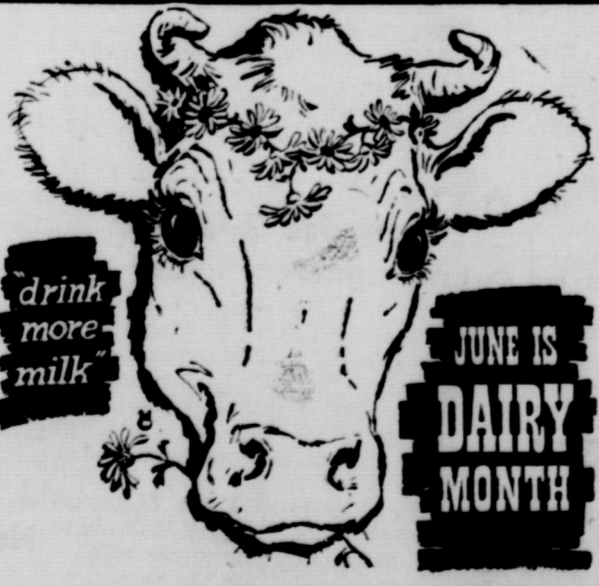

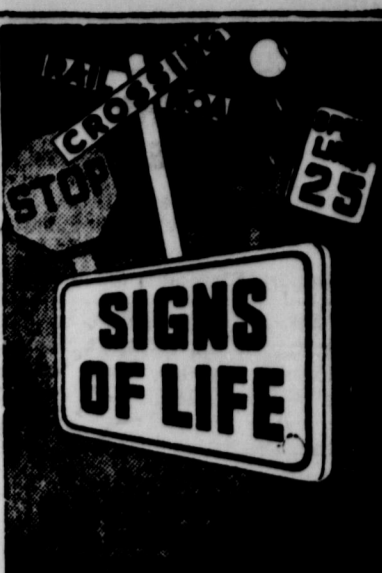

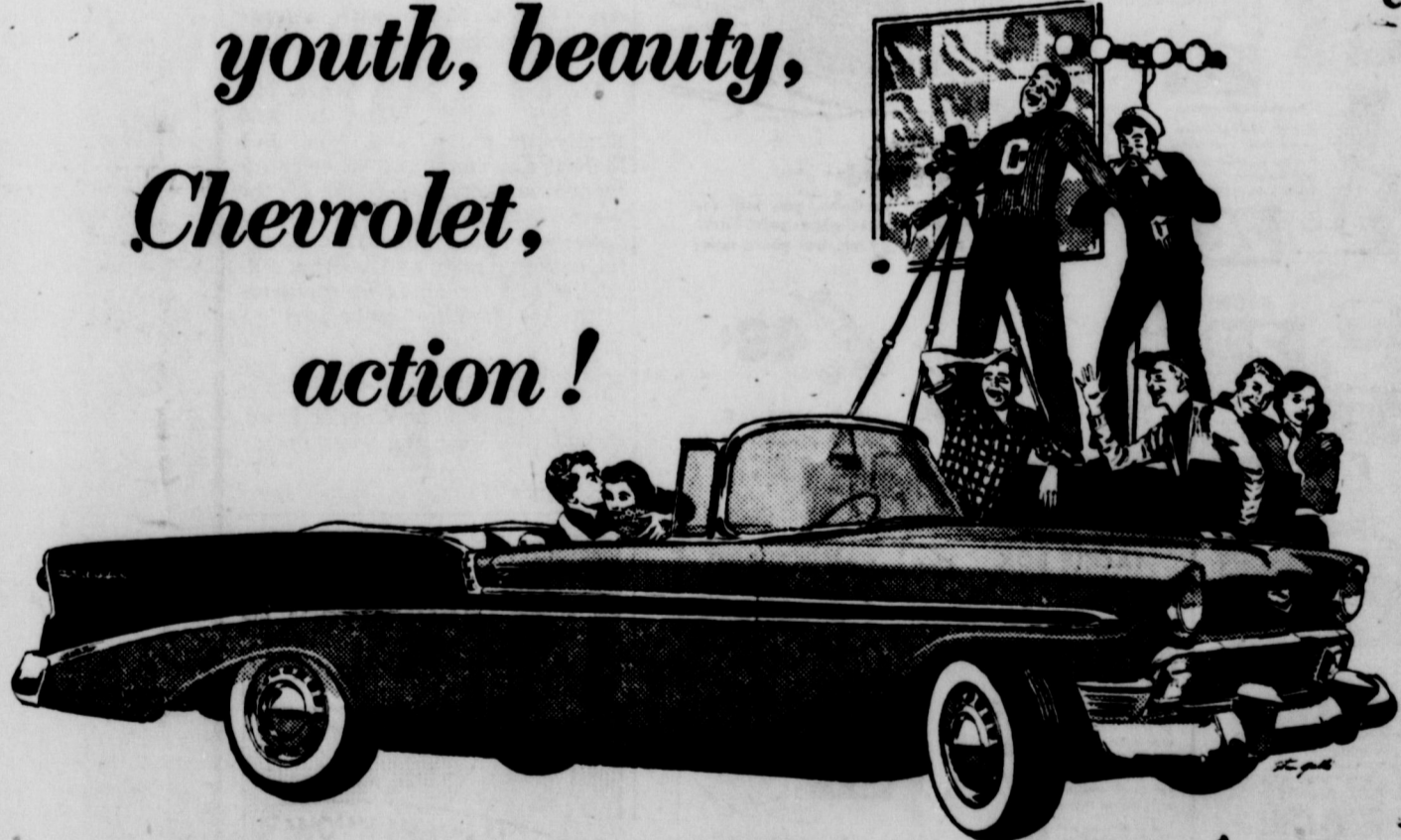

Wheeler County Soil Conservation District News

Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the Wheeler District have been getting a lot of requests for information on seeding Blue Panic grass. June is the best time to plant. It should be planted in regular width rows at about a pound and a half to two pounds per acre. The seed should be dropped in a shallow lister furrow and a short chain used as a drag. No covering plows of any kind should be used. The seed will not sprout if covered much over a half inch deep.

Blue panic is an excellent summer grazing crop. It seeds all summer and the seed are good quality food. It usually makes enough growth to give the birds good cover while they are feeding. A few rows along fences will be appreciated by all kinds of birds.

G. W. McIlhany, Tom Britt, and Tom Puryear have been spraying brush to improve their grassland. There have been no actual measurements of the benefits of brush control on rangeland. It is very easy to see that the grass is much better on a number of farms and ranches where chemical control has been used in the past.

Civil Defense Has Key Role in Peace

Natural disasters can strike anytime, anywhere. From pioneer days to the present, neighbors have always helped each other in times of distress. But often, the power of a great hurricane, flood or tornado completely outmatched the valiant but disorganized efforts of untrained volunteers.

TODAY THE UNITED STATES has a form of disaster insurance — civil defense. Like any other insurance, it doesn't guarantee that disaster won't occur.

But by executive order, the Federal Civil Defense Administration does have the responsibility for coordinating all disaster relief efforts of the Federal Government under Public Law 875. This guarantees that the resources of the entire nation can be marshalled against nature on the rampage as required.

It's a job which requires the skills of many specialists, such as the Army Corps of Engineers, the National Guard and the American Red Cross. Trained civil defense workers in the general disaster area put their rescue, traffic control, first aid and other skills to practical use.
