UNEMPLOYMENT TAX TO START

Several Wheeler business firms will be subject to a three per cent unemployment compensation tax, beginning January 1, when the law states all firms employing four or more persons must pay the tax. Heretofore only firms employing eight or more employees have had to pay.

It is of importance to employees likewise to familiarize themselves with the new law as they will become eligible for unemployment insurance if the firm which they are working employs more than four people in 1956.

Here are some important developments in the law:

1. Last year congress amended the federal unemployment compensation tax act to include employers of four or more persons (instead of the present eight or more), effective in 1956. This meant that some 38,000 newly covered Texas business firms will have to pay a three per cent payroll tax in 1956.

2. It was pointed out, however, that states could amend their unemployment tax laws to include these four-to-seven employers and (Continued on last page)

WHEELER FIRE DEPT. HAS SHORT WAVE RADIO SET

Fire Chief Pettit this week announced the installation of a short-wave radio set on the Wheeler Fire Truck. The operating frequency is the same as that used by the Sheriff department and their master station will be used as the home station for the mobile unit. In making the announcement Chief Pettit stated:

"The new radio with both sending and receiving capabilities will enable the department to be in constant contact with the County jail through the master station, regardless where the truck is being used in fire fighting and protection.

"The radio is a part of the Civil Defense set up and can be utilized if an emergency arises in establishing outside communication.

COTTON QUOTA ELECTION SOON

Outcome of the cotton marketing quota referendum to be held in Wheeler County and throughout the nation's cotton-growing area on December 13 will have far-reaching effects, Albert Marshall, office manager of Wheeler County ASC, said this week.

Every cotton grower has mailed his cotton allotment figures, and is urged to take part in the referendum, which will be held between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., at the following places:

Wheeler — Commissioners court, room.
Mobettie — Barber Shop building.
Shamrock — City Hall.

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next years crop, if at least two thirds of the votes cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In that case, price support will be available for the 1956 crop of upland cotton at a level between 75 and (Continued on last page)





FARMERS WILL VOTE ON 1956 COTTON QUOTAS

A referendum will be held on Tuesday, December 13, to determine whether cotton quotas will be in effect in 1956. Albert Marshall, office manager of the Wheeler County ASC, announced this week.

Each farmer will be mailed his cotton allotment figures prior to the referendum date, Marshall stated.

"We have received application blanks for 'new grower' cotton allotments," the ASC manager said. "To be eligible for a new grower cotton allotment for 1956, the applicant must derive at least 50 per cent of his livelihood from the farm; also the operator or owner must not have another farm in the county that has a cotton allotment," he declared.

Wheat Allotments
 "Wheat growers whose 1956 wheat acreage is as much as 25 per cent below their farm wheat acreage allotment will get credit for full allotment acreage in calculating future farm allotments."

"If the farm's wheat acreage for next year's harvest is only three-fourths of the farm allotment, the future wheat acreage

allotment established for the farm will be figured as though that full allotment has been planted.

"Heretofore, reductions of more than 10 per cent were considered in calculating future allotments," Marshall said.

 Loans are available on wheat and grain purchases until January 31, 1956. "We can process your loan in a few minutes, if lien waivers are secured in advance of your request," Marshall stated.

CAR STICKERS ARE REQUIRED

The attention of Wheeler County motorists is called by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, that almost half of the period set for car owners to obtain the new Motor Vehicle Inspection stickers has already passed.

Texas motorists must obtain the 1956 stickers by April 15, Col. Garrison said.

There are more than 4,000 licensed inspection stations in the state where motorists can obtain the safety checks and have the stickers placed on their cars.

Captain J. W. Blackwell, commanding officer of the Panhandle Area Highway Patrol, stated that on S-D Day, December 1, a total of three accidents involving one injury occurred on the rural highways of the 26-county district.

The 19 Highway Patrolmen working in the area made a total of 30 arrests and issued 45 warnings on Safe Driving Day.

Captain Blackwell expressed his appreciation for the cooperation of motorists and pedestrians using the rural highways in the Panhandle area which effected a reduction of approximately one-third the daily average number of accidents and by one-half the daily average number of injuries resulting from traffic accidents in this district.

Captain Blackwell stated that during the week of November 6-12, the Texas Highway Patrol, using routine enforcement techniques, checked some 48,642 motorists on the rural highways in

letter is enclosed and put an additional stamp on the package.

Under the new service letters or other single pieces of First or Third Class mail may be placed inside Fourth Class parcels or inside copies of publications mailed under Second Class mail entry. Letters or other single pieces of First Class mail may also be placed inside Third Class packages.

This means the familiar phrase, "we are sending under separate cover," is no longer necessary, the Postmaster said. In the past it has been possible to send a letter along with a package only by pasting the letter on the outside of the package and affixing the necessary postage.

This new combination service, which went into effect November 28, meets a genuine need, the Postmaster said.

Postmaster Jamison said the new combination mail service is on a 60-day trial basis. During this period comments of the public will be welcomed.

Mr. Jamison quoted Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield as saying he felt certain most mailers will welcome this more convenient system for mailing different classes of mail together.

"We are here to serve the public," the Postmaster General said, "and we are especially pleased that we can introduce combination mailings before the Christmas season when so many Americans depend upon the Department for delivery of their gifts and personal messages."

Among the postal patrons needing to send two classes of mail together, the Postmaster also cited business firms substitute products and wanting to explain why that was done; magazine publishers sending gift certificates naming the donor with first copies of their publication to new subscribers; manufacturers sending operational, maintenance, and repair instructions with the household appliance; and companies including sales letters with samples of merchandise.



News Letter From

CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS

Moscow is a city of tremendous size. The Russians estimate the population at from five to seven million. All of the housing is apartment type. I asked a number of times about seeing the private residential sections. Each time I was told that there were no private residential sections, that private individuals did not own land in Russia. Living space is assigned upon application of the individual. The amount of living space allowed is determined by the number of individuals in the family group. This may include people from four generations. I was told that some people owned houses that were located away from the city, to which they took their families each summer. The house was owned by the individual as personal property, but he did not own the land. Most of the housing is in buildings that are built flush with the sidewalk.

Entry to the different living units is gained by going through a gate that extends into a center courtyard from which you have access to the several apartments. There is an acute housing shortage at the present time and much of the building that is going on in Moscow is multiple unit housing. We saw many of these buildings under construction and observed the type of workmanship. The brick laying does not appear to be even fair by our standards. The plastering work does seem to be fair. Much of this work is done by women who can be seen on each and every job. They appeared to be very strong and hard workers. Many of them also seen doing much of the street work. That is the cleaning of the streets and also the repairing thereof. Many

are working as park attendants and as cleaning women on the sidewalks and other portions of the public parks.

The Kremlin is a tremendous walled area in which there are many buildings, including a fabulous palace which was built by the czars. A part of this structure has been made over and houses the Supreme Soviet. This is made up of the Soviet of Nationalities 708 members and the Soviet of the Union of 639 members. All of these are seated in one hall at desks. The chamber is much longer than it is broad and has the appearance of many of the lecture rooms in some of our universities, although much larger. The Russian Government has converted one of the buildings inside the Kremlin into a museum. This museum houses a great number of items concerning Russia history, including the many types of dress during the czarist days, even back to suits of armour worn by men and also used on the horses. Many of the coaches, which are very ornate, have been preserved. Many intricate works of art and royal jewels are also on display.

The Kremlin fronts on Red Square. This is where the tomb of Lenin and Stalin is located. It is a square, dark red, marble structure just outside the Kremlin wall on the Square. The tomb is opened at certain times for visitors to view the remains of Lenin and Stalin. You pass through a door at ground level at which is stationed guards. You turn to the left and go down several flights of stairs below the earth and turn into a chamber which houses the bodies of Lenin and Stalin. They are in a glass case and seem to be perfectly preserved. There is a pinkish or orange glow around them. Lenin's body is the first that you see, although you can see them both at the same time. They both appear to be asleep. Lenin has his fists doubled up and

seems to have his jaw set. Stalin, however, has his hands folded across his mid-section in a very calm manner and his physical appearance seems to be calm and relaxed. Great numbers of people pass through this tomb every time it is opened. I had watched these throngs from my hotel window but did not know where they were going or what they were doing. We were told by some of the Russians that the crowds seem to get larger rather than smaller.

Across the Red Square from the tomb is the large store of Moscow. It is called Gumm. I asked one of the interpreters if that was the place to go to get the best prices. He laughed and said that the prices were the same everywhere because they were fixed by the state. He told me that it made no difference whether you bought a pair of socks in a Black Sea Port or in an isolated town in Siberia. If the socks were the same, then the price was the same. Most of the shops have a picture in the window indicating what they are selling. If it is fish, then there is a picture of several fish in the raw. The picture is rather colorful. However, it occurred to me that since the state owns everything and the prices are all the same, a lot of colored paint could have been saved if they had just written "fish" across the window. I guess I just don't understand that type of economy.

The streets are all very wide and there are many wide squares. One fellow ventured that if New York had Moscow's wide streets there wouldn't be a traffic jam. It might also be pointed out that if Moscow had New York's narrow streets they wouldn't have any traffic jam. Actually, I can see more automobiles from my office window in Washington than I saw in all of Russia, including an automobile factory we went through. This was the Stalin Auto Works which I will talk more about next week.

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SOIL BUILDING CLINIC HELD AT J. ALLEN FARM

An important gathering of bankers, agricultural leaders, and agricultural representatives met on the farm of Jake Allen, located southwest of Mobeetie, on November 30, 1955. This meeting was in the form of a clinic, and was arranged by John L. Manning, County Supervisor, Farmers Home Administration, and George Taylor of Wheeler County and Vernon Morse of Hemphill County, Work Unit Conservationists, Soil Conservation Service. This meeting was an outgrowth of the interest of farmers in "soil building" through "soil and water conservation." Mr. Allen is a Soil Conservation District Cooperator, with a number of soil conservation practices planned but not yet completed.

Farmers Home Administration is authorized to make loans to farmers for soil and water im-

provement practices. The practices for which soil and water loans are made must be in line with Soil Conservation and Extension Service recommendations. A part of the cost of facilities, improvements and practices planned may be earned by the farmer through participation in the ACP program under the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Soil and Water Conservation loans were made possible by legislation passed by the 83rd Congress. Loans may be made for such purposes as building terraces, developing and sodding waterways and digging ponds in connection with handling water run-off. Farmers are becoming more conscious of the value of water and controlling it on the ground, Mr. Manning, County Supervisor, says. In some areas, sub-soiling is necessary in order to enable better water penetration of the soil. Loans are being made for this purpose. Loans may also be used for brush removal, the establishment and improvement of permanent pastures, well drilling, land leveling, and for the purchase of pumps and irrigation equipment, Mr. Manning said.

Loans are made by the Farmers Home Administration, primarily out of the funds advanced by private lending institutions. The Government insures the repayment of the loan. The repayment period on loans to individuals can be up to 20 years, and can be secured by liens on chattels or real estate, depending on the amount of length of the loan.

Information about Soil and Water Conservation loans can be obtained from the local County

Agent, representatives of the Soil Conservation Service, and the local Farmers Home Administration office. Applications for loans are to be made at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration, located on the 3rd floor of the Court House, Wheeler, Texas.

Della Borchardt, 21, of Orange Grove, Tex., is one of eight 4-H members in the Nation to be awarded a sectional trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, for outstanding achievement in the Frozen Foods program. The all-expense trip is provided by the International Harvester Co.



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
