## O'DANIEL RATES AS FAVORITE IN WHEELER CO.

W. Lee O'Daniel, former gover-  
nor and United States Senator who  
has carried Wheeler county by  
landslide proportions in previous  
political campaigns, upset the pre-  
dictions of local observers by em-  
erging as the No. 1 gubernatorial  
candidate in Saturday's Demo-  
cratic Primary in this county.

The insurance executive and  
erstwhile flour salesman polled  
704 votes in Wheeler county with-  
out benefit of organized support  
or any form of local advertising,  
topping the 644 count of Ralph  
Yarborough and the 660 vote total  
of Price Daniel.

O'Daniel who trailed Yarborough  
by 100,000 votes in the state count  
to lose a position in the August  
Run-Off with Daniel, carried 7 of  
Wheeler county's 15 boxes. He ran  
close in most other boxes, making  
his poorest showing in the south  
Shamrock box where he polled 62  
to Yarborough's 114 and Daniel's  
115. O'Daniel carried the north  
Shamrock box along with 7 other  
county voting precincts.

Tom Lee Smith of Lubbock was  
high man for lieutenant governor  
in Wheeler county with 894 to Ben  
Ramsey's 849. A. M. Aikin, Jr., re-

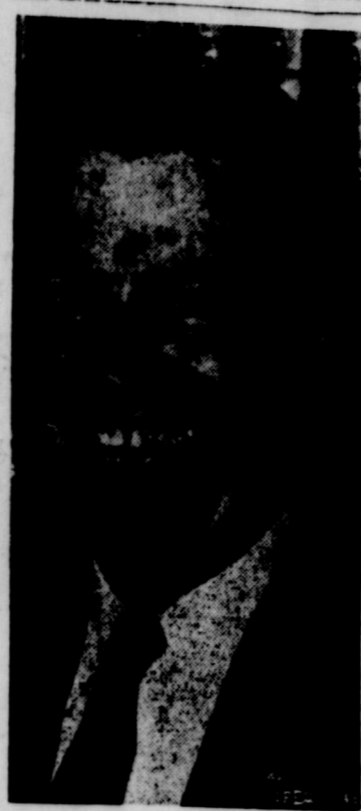

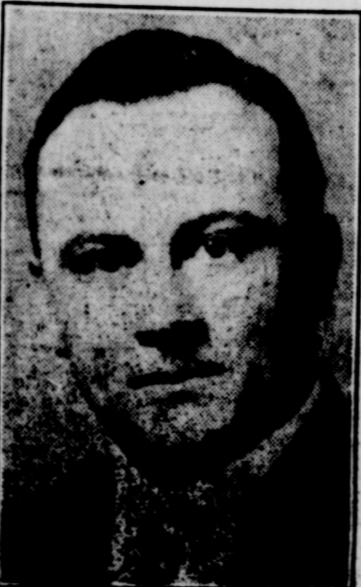

## COUNTY DEMOS MEET SATURDAY

Delegates named at last Saturday's Democratic Precinct convention will gather in Wheeler at 10 o'clock next Saturday morning for the Wheeler County Democratic convention.

A. B. Crump of Wheeler, county Democratic chairman will preside. The county convention is expected to be controlled by delegates favoring strict party loyalty although at least three delegates chosen at the South Shamrock precinct meeting have said they do not favor binding Democrats by the loyalty oath.

A majority of the Shamrock delegates, however, as well as most delegates from the other 13 county precincts are expected to favor a requirement that Democratic nominees for office agree to support the national ticket as well as county and state tickets.

Purpose of the county convention is to select delegates to the State Democratic Convention to be held at Fort Worth on September 11.

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Funeral services were held in Spearman Monday morning and burial was in Marlow, Okla. He is survived by his wife, Oran; one daughter, Evelyn; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. McCauley of Marlow, two brothers, and three sisters.

## ENTRIES BEGIN QUEEN CONTEST

Entries are now being accepted in the annual Farm Bureau Queen contest, according to Geo. Richardson of Wheeler, Farm Bureau office manager.

Each director in the county is responsible for seeing that contestants are entered from his community. Entries must be made at the Wheeler office of the Farm Bureau not later than Saturday, August 25.

To be eligible, young ladies must be between 16 and 22 years old and must be daughters or sisters of Farm Bureau members actively engaged in agricultural production.

Contestants will be scored; 40 points for appearance, 40 for personality and 20 for poise.

Purpose of the contest which always attracts many lovely Wheeler county misses, is to give recognition to the farm and ranch girls of Texas. County winners go to district contests, thence to state and national.

The annual queen contest will be held in connection with the annual Wheeler County Farm Bureau banquet for members, wives and guests, to be held at Wheeler on August 28.

## AMATEUR RODEO AUGUST 17-19

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Posse will sponsor an Eastern Panhandle Amateur Rodeo in Wheeler on August 17, 18 and 19, offering three days of excitement that promises to attract a large crowd of visitors from several counties.

There will be a big Western street parade at 5 p.m. on Friday, August 17, with night shows scheduled for Friday and Saturday, and an afternoon performance on Sunday.

Stock for the big event will be furnished by Charlie Plummer of Berlin, Okla. Clowning events will be put on by local talent.

Riding events will include saddle broncs, bareback broncs and bull riding while roping contests will feature calf roping, double mugging and bull dogging. There will be a cowgirl sponsor contest in connection with the parade.

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce office will serve as rodeo headquarters in advance arrangements and Wheeler merchants will give Levi's to winners and "hard luck" contestants in each event.

## DUMAS TRAGEDY BRINGS GRIEF TO FAMILIES HERE

The tragedy at Shamrock Oil and Gas Corp's McKee plant at Dumas Sunday morning claiming 19 lives and injuring 31, brought grief to members of several Wheeler county families to whom the victims were related.

At least three men who lost their lives in the explosion had survivors in the county. Charley Lummus, 46, employee of Shamrock Oil Corp, former Shamrock resident, was an uncle of Mrs. David Britt of Wheeler; Gifford Corse of Mobeetie; and Billy Joe Dunn, 24, Dumas fireman, was a cousin of Cliff Weatherly, Weldon Weatherly, Roy Weatherly and Haskell Weatherly.

Darce Foshee, burned in the blast, former Shamrock resident, a nephew of Sheriff and Mrs. Bus Dorman, and J. C. Jones also on the list of critically injured, is a brother of Mrs. Murray Sanders and brother-in-law of Boyce Faris.

Two of the others injured are: Noel Lee Laycock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Laycock, north of Wheeler; and A. D. Dunlap, brother of Mrs. Tom Morgan, Jr., of Shamrock.

Funeral services for Clifford Corse were held in the Sunray Church of Christ Monday afternoon. He was owner of the Broadway Supply Company of Sunray and had been a resident of Sunray for 12 years.

Last rites for Charley Lummus were held at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon with the last victim to be buried Wednesday morning. He is James L. Rivers.

## PHONE HIKE EFFECT AUG. 6

New rates for telephone service in Wheeler which were agreed upon by the City Council and General Telephone Company of the Southwest earlier this month, will become effective with the August 6 billing, according to H. E. Craig of Memphis, district manager.

New business rates are \$10.00 for one party, \$8.00 for two party and \$1.50 for extension, compared with present rates of \$9.00, \$7.00 and \$1.50.

## Rives and Dougherty Are County Winners

(See Complete Tabulated Vote on Another Page)

Thurman Rives of Wheeler was re-elected tax assessor-collector and Jim Dougherty, Shamrock lawyer, was elected county attorney in the only two contested county offices on Saturday's Democratic Primary ballot.

Rives scored a majority over his two opponents, C. G. Cantrell, Jr., and B. F. Chance, Jr., both of Shamrock, while Dougherty nosed out D. O. Beene of Wheeler by 92 votes.

The most exciting race was that of county commissioner in precinct 1 which will not be decided until the August run-off. Incumbent W. L. (Shorty) Erwin was high man with 245 votes with Frank Lee trailing only 5 votes behind, and Shelby Pettit coming in for a strong third with 232. L. T. Underwood polled 88.

In the tax assessor-collector's race, Rives received 1263, Cantrell 864 and Chance 566.

Dougherty's total vote was 1253 and Beene's 1161.

In precinct 3, County Commissioner Clois Hanner was re-elected to a second term by a vote of 224 to Sam McMurtry's 131.

Sheriff Bus Dorman and District Clerk Rena Sivage were re-elected without opposition, as were District Attorney Bill Waters, Congressman Walter Rogers and State School Board Member A. R. Bivins.

State Representative Grainger McIlhany of Wheeler was represented a majority of almost 1,600 by home county voters, over his opponents, Johnny Willis of Pampa, in their three-county contest. The Wheeler county majority was about the margin of McIlhany's victory.

Wheeler county gave McIlhany 1,946 to Willis's 355; Gray county gave McIlhany 2,237 to Willis 2,777, and Collingsworth county gave McIlhany 1,241 to Willis' 644.

In another district race, Wheeler county gave State Senator Grady Hazlewood 1179, Bill Craig 483, Lonnie Smith 256, and James Crow 249.

## JURY RETURNS 2 INDICTMENTS

At the session of the Wheeler County Grand Jury held in Wheeler on Monday of this week three no bills and two indictments were returned.

Ollie M. Brown, 41, of California was indicted on the charge of Forgery. He went before District Judge Lewis Goodrich, took a plea of guilty, and was sentenced to five years in the State Penitentiary.

Winford Sweeten, 17, Okeene, Okla., was indicted for armed robbery of the Bradley Grocery at Lela. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced by Judge Goodrich to five years in the State Pen.

Judge Goodrich also sentenced Elton Holland to one year in the penitentiary for parole violation.

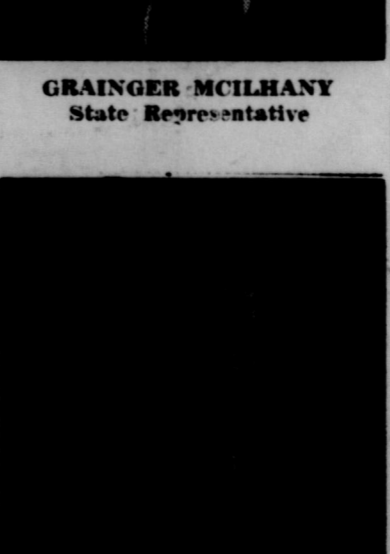

### Native Of Mobeetie And Wife Named Missionaries

A native of Mobeetie, Dr. L. Glynn Breeden of Wink, Tex., and his wife were appointed missionaries to Colombia by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board at its regular monthly meeting in Richmond, Va., last week.

Dr. Breeden has operated a private medical clinic in Wink since September, 1953, with Mrs. Breeden assisting him in the Laboratory and X-ray work. They operated a six-bed hospital for fifteen months

until the expanded hospital in a near-by town made it unnecessary.

Prior to coming to Wink, Dr. Breeden served as a physician in a clinic in Cameron, Texas. He has also served as an intern and resident at City-County Hospital, Ft. Worth, Tex., extern, Memorial Hospital, Houston, Texas, and surgical scrub nurse, Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, Texas. He was in the U. S. Army for almost two years.

A native of Mobeetie, Dr. Breeden attended Stanford (Calif.) University and received the bachelor of arts degree at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, and the doctor of medicine degree from Baylor University College of Medicine, Houston.

Concerning his commitment to foreign missions, Dr. Breeden told the Board that while in college he wanted to be a doctor but had given no thought to the possibility of medical missions until one day when he was "half asleep near the rear" of his Bible classroom. "The professor made a simple statement about the need of more missionaries, especially medical missionaries. I was jarred as nothing had shaken me before. It seemed as though he had pointed his finger at me and shouted, 'This means you.'"

Mrs. Breeden, the former Ila Hayworth and a native of Granbury, Tex., moved to Corpus Christi, Tex., with her family when she was 10. She attended Howard Payne College Brownwood, Tex., and the University of Houston and received the bachelor religious education degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Ft. Worth.

She told the Board that at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in St. Louis, Mo., in 1946, she made public the desire that had been in her heart for many years to serve God on the foreign mission field.

Dr. and Mrs. Breeden have three sons: Wilson Lynn, almost five; David Lee, three; and Harold Dean, nine months.

They are among 18 young people appointed for overseas services at the July meeting of the Board, bringing the total number of active Southern Baptist foreign missionaries to 1,084.

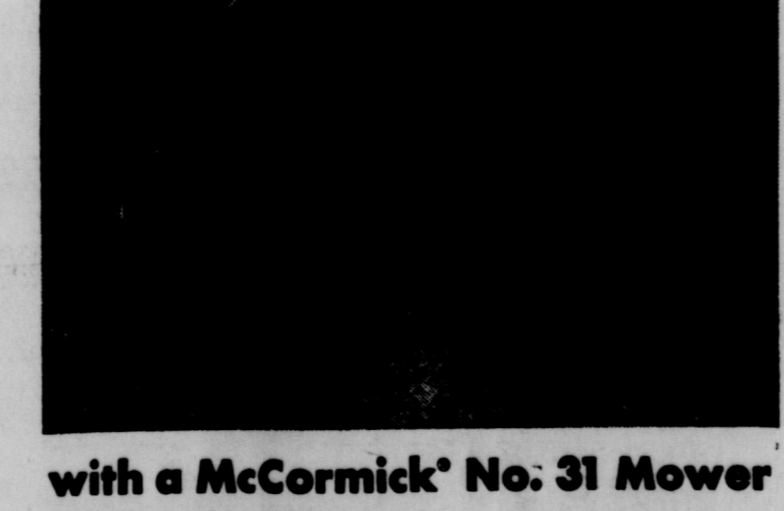
### U. S. BOND QUOTA 56% COMPLETE

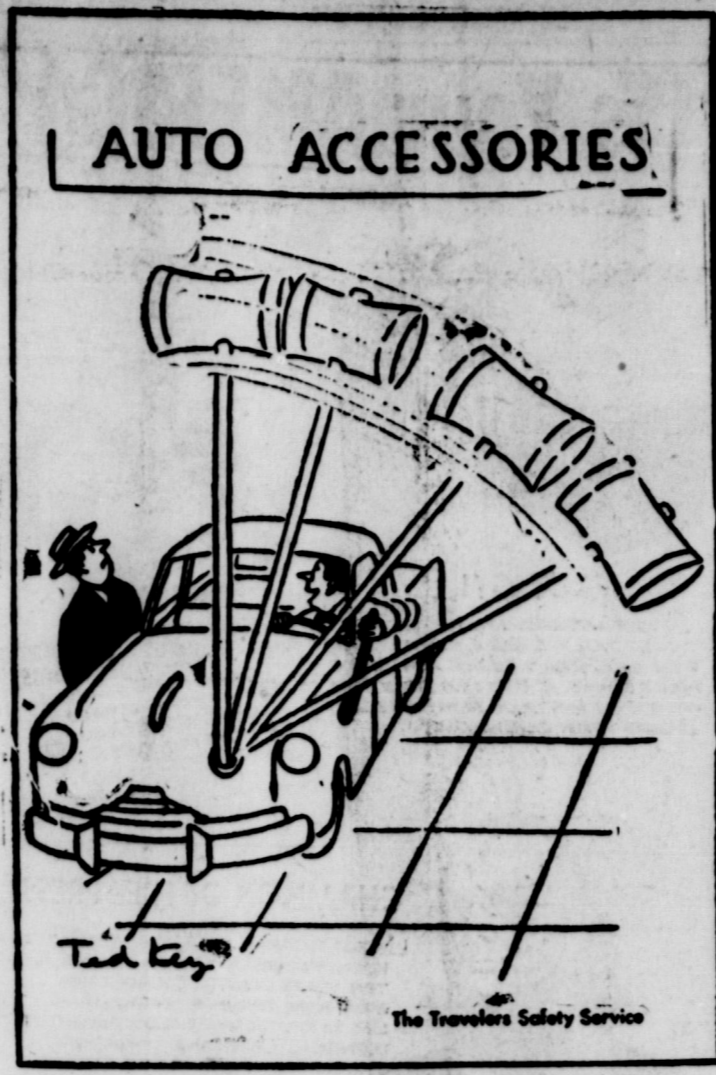

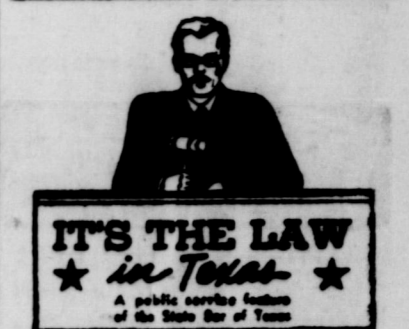

Will Reduce Complications In Settling Estate

A properly drawn will can be the means of short-cutting many legal formalities, and save a great deal of time in distributing the estate of a decedent among his rightful heirs. It may also serve to save many dollars in legal fees and court costs.

As an example, whenever a person dies without a will and it is necessary for the probate court to appoint an administrator of his estate, the person so appointed is required to post a bond. This bond is for the purpose of insuring the faithful performance of his duties.

The amount of the bond must be double the estimated value of the personal property of the estate plus a reasonable amount to cover prospective rents and other income from real estate involved. The administrator's bond must be kept in force until the estate is finally closed and he is discharged from his obligation by the court.

The same rule applies to an executor under a will, unless the testator has specified that no bond shall be required. This provision may be inserted or left out of the will at the option of the maker. Needless to say, there are situations in which the bond serves a real purpose. But when not needed, the statutory requirements may prove a distinct annoyance to the executor and a burden upon the estate in the form of annual premium payments.

Another example: A court appointed administrator may not sell any property of an estate without an order of the court authorizing him to do so. He must make application to the court for approval of each sale. The court must be advised of and approve the sales price and the manner in which the same is to be collected. Similar provisions apply to the making of mineral leases and other transactions.

These provisions apply equally to the executor of a will, unless the testator has freed him from such requirements. A single short paragraph inserted in a will designating him as an independent executor in appropriate phraseology may serve this purpose. Then he will have a free hand to dispose of property upon short notice whenever a favorable opportunity arises, with a minimum of legal formality.

Cucumbers are plentiful in the
markets now. Make the most of
their crisp texture, and delicate
flavor to add zest and appeal to
more nourishing foods.

Choose firm, fresh cucumbers
for best quality. They should be
well-shaped, bright green in color
with whitish tip or white lines.
Avoid withered or shriveled cucumbers,
or those that are dull in
color, yellow or puffy. Always
store them in the refrigerator to
retain crispness and flavor.

Use cucumbers for the relish tray,
in salads, in paper thin luncheon
sandwiches, added to a cream
dressing served with fish or simply
serve them sliced with vinegar
sauce and pepper, or sour cream.

For the relish tray, use very
fresh, green, unpeeled cucumbers.
Wash carefully and cut them into
slices or strips. You can make fluted
edge by scoring them length-
wise with a fork before you slice
them. If the skin has been treated
for shipping or display purposes
it may not be palatable. Cucumbers
make delicious pickles and relishes.
For tasty recipes and easy
directions, get a copy of Extension
Bulletin B-188, Pickles and Relishes.

Peaches are now in season.
There are so many ways that they
can be conserved, every one should
put away some for use in the
winter. Also, there are so many
delicious ways of serving them
fresh. Desserts, salads, preserves
are some of the ways.

For freezing, select firm, ripe
fruit, wash and peel. Make sugar
syrup in proportion of 3 cups of
sugar to 4 cups of water. Add 1/2
teaspoon powdered ascorbic acid
per quart of syrup or ten
100 milligram tablets. Pour
about 1/2 cup of cold sugar syrup
in pint freezer container. Since
peeled peaches directly into the
container. Press fruit down and
add syrup to 1/2 inch from top of
container. Place crumpled freezer
paper, heavy waxed paper or
aluminum foil on top of peaches.
This prevents the peaches from
floating above the syrup. Seal and
freeze immediately. For further in-
formation on freezing or canning,
get Bulletin B-175, Frozen Foods
and B-194 Home Canning Fruits
and Vegetables.

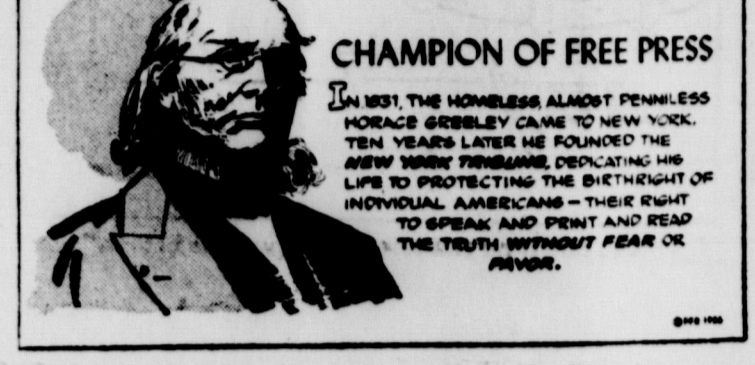

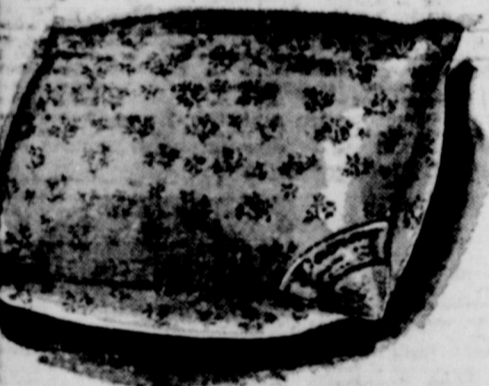

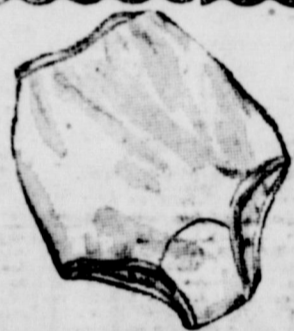

VETERANS LAND IS EXPLAINED

George Gandy, Wheeler county veterans service office and member of the Veterans Land Board county committee, has received a letter from Earl Rudder, chairman of the veterans land board for the state of Texas, answering inquiries that have arisen regarding the current status of the land program.

Following is part of Mr. Rudder's letter to Mr. Gandy:

"At October 31, 1955, when we again began accepting applications to participate in the Veterans' Land Program, we had sufficient funds on hand, plus anticipated receipts for the calendar year 1956, to purchase approximately 1000 tracts of land. Through July 17, 1956, 12,169 veterans had requested application forms to participate in this Program and such forms had been mailed to the first 27000 appearing in our application register. Of the 2700 sets of application forms mailed, 920 have been returned to us for processing.

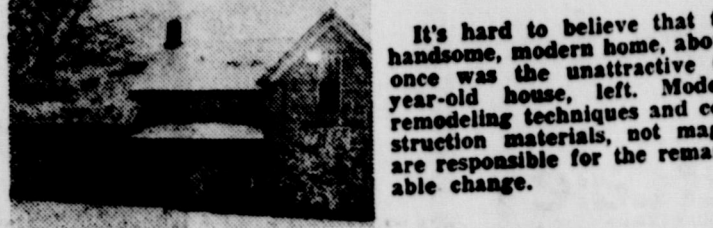
"Unlike procedures followed in the past, all application forms are being mailed from the Veterans' Land Board Office only, and in the exact order in which the requests for such forms are received. These forms will continue to be mailed as long as there are funds available for the purchase of land. You may assure any veteran who may inquire that when he has received forms from this office to participate in the Veterans' Land Program, funds are available to make the purchase on his behalf.

A Child May Dare So Drive With Care.

CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS

The pending adjournment of a session of Congress always brings out into the open many proposed bills which, if passed, would provide a sizeable windfall for some individual or groups. The Member who introduce the legislation usually does so at the request of some of his constituents. The bill usually has a very innocent look and a substantial degree of merit. But when all of the facts are brought out in the open, the ulterior purpose becomes apparent. When this occurs the Member sponsoring the legislation will accept an amendment striking out the objectionable part, or will withdraw the legislation from further consideration. These situations are difficult to detect during the prolonged debate that is possible if the bill comes up in regular order during the session. That is the reason that most people having a gimmick in a bill prefer that it come up in the rush of adjournment when the opportunity to debate it fully will not be available.
No doubt some bills will pass during this rush period having some windfall, but there is a crew of Members who stay in the Chamber constantly during the last few days in order to block as much of this type of thing as possible. Those who must object to the consideration of such bills place themselves in a position of being looked upon as an obstructionist or trouble-maker. For this reason, the burden of doing this job is usually spread among a number of members so that the full impact of criticism will not fall on any one person.
It is not difficult to tell when a bill's eye has been struck. Within minutes after the objection is made, the pressure goes on the objector to get him to withdraw such objection. One such bill that I was familiar with and helped in blocking passage of, brought a deluge of other Congressmen & Senators and a number of loyalists. However, the Member making the objection stood his ground. Result: no windfall.

To give you some idea of what happens during the last day or two of a session, on July 25th the House met at 10 a.m. after several committee meetings, disagreed with the Senate Amendments to the Foreign Aid Bill and appointed conferees for a conference to work out a solution; adopted a resolution providing certain rules during the balance of the week; took up and cleared for the President twenty separate House bills; agreed to Senate-House conference reports on nine bills; took up, debated & voted on the highly controversial housing bill; passed and cleared for the President a Senate bill to amend the International Wheat Agreement Act; took up and debated H. R. 8000, a bill to prohibit the serving of alcoholic beverages to airline passengers while in flight; adopted an amendment to this bill and passed the bill; adopted eight resolutions citing witness for contempt of the House of Representatives by refusal to answer questions before the Committee on Un-American Activities; debated, amended and passed a bill to provide insurance for flood damaged areas; passed a tax readjustment measure applying to breach of contract damages; passed two shipping bills; passed a bill relating to clerk hire for Congressmen who represent Districts having over five hundred thousand constituents; adopted a resolution providing for expenses of a special committee to investigate campaign expenditures. The proceeding included several other matters including the filing of reports on
