SCHOOL OPENS IN WHEELER ON FRIDAY, AUG. 31

The 1956-57 school term at Wheeler Schools will get under way at 9:00 a.m. Thursday, August 30, according to A. E. Brown, Superintendent, at that time, all school employees will meet to discuss enrollment and other problems of the school year. Members of the local Board of Education have been invited to attend the meeting also, Mr. Brown stated.

Enrollment will begin at 9:00 a.m. Friday, August 31. Free textbooks, furnished by the State will be given out to the pupils, and regular classwork will be started. Buses will run at the regular time and on the same routes as last year on this opening day, but some changes in routes may be necessary later.

The cafeteria will serve lunch on Friday, and pupils will be dismissed at 3:00 p.m. Monday September 3 will be a holiday in observance of Labor Day, and regular classwork will be resumed at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday September 4.

Kiwanians Sell Home Needs To Aid Blind

On Wednesday, August 29, members of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club will take to the streets in true college boy fashion in a house-to-house campaign to sell brushes, mops, brooms, dust cloths and various other household necessities in a caravan selling spree to assist in the disposition of such merchandise manufactured in Light-house for the Blind.

The Kiwanis Club will take to the streets in true college factured by blind persons. Many of the workers are also handicapped persons with other handicaps. The merchandise is priced in line with retail prices in local stores, according to a spokesman for the Club.

The familiar salutation, "Lady I'm trying to work my way through college," "Lady I Gotta Sell this stuff," etc., will be heard coming from well known local business men on Wednesday afternoon.

The club membership has been divided into teams and each team assigned a certain part of town in which to operate. A contest between the teams is being held with a penalty for the looser. Cooperation by housewives will be appreciated by all members of the various teams, president C. J. Meek, said this week.

Commissioners Race To Hold Election Spotlight

Holding the spotlight of interest locally in Saturday's Democratic Runoff Primary will be the contest for a place on the commissioners court in Prerinet 1.

Candidates for the post are Incumbent W. L. (Shorty) Erwin and Frank Lee. Erwin headed the ticket in the July Primary with a five-vote margin over Lee. Erwin polled 245 votes to 240 for Lee. Two other candidates in the four-cornered race received a total of 320 votes.

All voting boxes in the county

will be open for balloting as in the first Democratic Primary. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

In Wheeler, voters will cast their ballots at the gymnasium and the court house.

Balloting will require a minimum of time. The two state races on the short ballot are those for governor and attorney general. Judge Ralph Yarborough and Senator Price Daniel are candidates for governor. Candidates for attorney general are Tom Moore of McLennan County and Will Wilson of Dallas County.

Withdrawal of A. M. Aikin, Jr., from the lieutenant governor's race left incumbent Ben Ramsey without opposition, although Aikin's name fill appear on the local ballot.

Ground Observers Corps Is Organized

A Ground Observers Corps was formed here last Thursday evening with members of the Wheeler Fire Department as the nucleus of the organization.

Fire Chief R. J. Holt, Jr., will serve as supervisor of the GOC. Adrian Risner was named chief observer with Bob Douthit and Joe Rogers as assistant chief observers.

Purpose of the newly formed GOC is to supplement the radar network of the United States with a trained crew of ground observers to be used in case of storm and aircraft alerts.

Practice aircraft alerts will be staged approximately every six weeks.

The Wheeler unit of the GOC got off to a good start Thursday evening when 46 members were enrolled. All work is voluntary. None of the workers receive pay.

The local unit will have a direct telephone line to the filtering system in Oklahoma City. There, with reports from the Wheeler GOC and others throughout the area, the filtering system center can trace the path of a storm or aircraft.

There was a small bunch of loyal members out for the monthly meeting Tuesday evening. Sixteen to be exact.

A film was shown depicting farm life, and problems of a dairy farm family which was very interesting. You should have been there. Judge R. H. Forrester made a strong plea for the voters to go to the polls and vote in all elections as that is the only way that our way of life can be assured in the future. He deplored the apathy shown by a large percentage of the people who don't take an interest in voting for better government, and who, also fail to take more interest in the affairs of the community.

The invocation was by Dr. C. C. Meritt, and the benediction was by Harry Wofford.

LOAN PRICE ON COTTON IS DOWN

The exact rate that will be paid farmers who put their cotton in government loan this fall has been announced by the ASC. This year the rate is based on one inch staple, white middling and the price is set at 32.69 cents a pound. Last year the rate was 33.32 cents per pound for white, middling cotton with a staple of fifteen-sixteenths. White middling cotton of fifteen-sixteenths staple brought 33.32 cents a pound in 1955, and will bring 31.54 cents this fall. That is a drop of 1.79 cents a pound. White middling of seven-eighths staple received 31.52 a pound in the loan as compared with 29.29 cents this year, a drop of 2.23 cents.

Last year the loan price for

seven-eighths inch, middling, spotted cotton was about 28 cents a pound. This year the same kind of cotton will bring about 25 1/2 cents a pound. On the brighter side, cotton seed has taken a raise in price from \$46 a ton to \$48 at ton. Grain sorghum will be supported at a price of \$1.88 per hundred pounds. Last year the grain rate was \$1.69 a hundred.

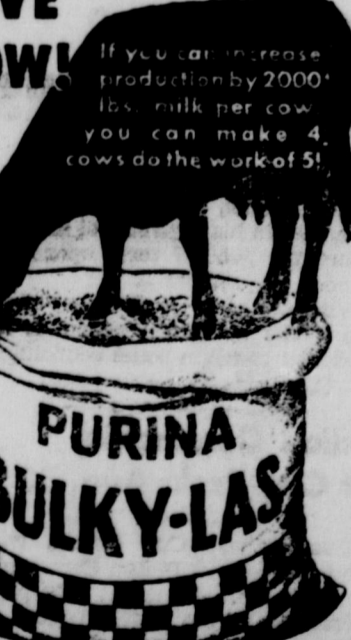

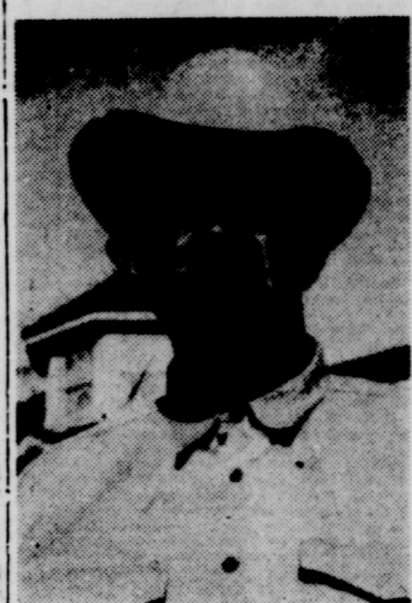

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9
relating an Amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a subsection thereto to be known as Section 11a and to read as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent in the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction therefor may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside, unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is unimpaired by this section; and the accused may be removed to a county for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On At An Election To Be Held On November 13, 1956"

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 11-B, which shall read as follows: "The Legislature shall have the power to provide by general laws under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, to assist needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not eligible for vocational rehabilitation, who are residents of the State of Texas, except that the individuals who are receiving aid may not, during the same period of time, receive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, or be resident in any completely State supported institution; providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals; providing that the amount paid to any individual may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds and may exceed the amount paid to that individual from Federal funds; providing that the amount paid out of State funds shall not exceed One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year; providing for the necessary proclamation, publication and election."
