### WHEELER DOWNS MATADOR 20-6

The Wheeler Mustangs decisively  
defeated the mighty Matador  
Matadors here last Friday night  
by a score of 20-6. The Matadors  
scored only one time and that on  
a block punt which was carried  
over the goal line in the second  
quarter. The yardage gained in the  
air was tied at 32 yards for each  
team. On the ground the Must-  
angs traveled 317 net against 100  
yards net for the Matadors. Mata-

### POLIO NEEDS STILL GREAT

"The 1957 financial need for the  
fight against polio will be \$46-  
900,000 for patient care, rehabili-  
tation, research, vaccination pro-  
gram, professional and public  
education" it was reported today  
by Mrs. Harold Sivage, Wheeler  
County campaign director follow-  
ing her return from a regional  
conference of March of Dimes  
leaders in Dallas.  
"Rehabilitation of those already  
stricken with polio, and those who  
contract the disease is also a  
big job which the National Foun-  
dation for Infantile Paralysis must  
see through," Mrs. Sivage said.  
"To a frightened child depending  
on an iron lung for the breath of  
life, the Salk vaccine is poor com-  
pensation. We must return as many  
polio victims to happy, useful liv-  
ing as the increasingly effective  
techniques of medical rehabilitation  
will permit."  
Mrs. Sivage met with Raymond  
H. Barrows, executive director of  
the National Foundation and the  
450 polio officials, state chairman,  
campaign directors and chapter

### BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS AND HELP FIGHT TB GERM

"The tuberculosis germ has been  
known and studied by scientists  
since 1882, but it hasn't given up  
all its secrets yet," declares Dr.  
H. E. Nicholson, president of the  
Wheeler County Tuberculosis As-  
sociation, sponsor of the annual  
Christmas Seal Sale which is now  
underway.  
Outlining the mysteries of tub-  
erculosis that still baffle science,  
Dr. Nicholson says research must  
be intensified to find the answers  
and step up defense against a  
disease which costs this country  
more than \$600,000,000 annually.  
"Part of every Christmas Seal  
dollar contributed in this county  
is spent for medical and social  
research on TB," he said. "More  
Christmas Seal dollars will mean  
more research. Triumphs have al-  
ready been scored in preventing  
death from TB. Now every avenue  
must be explored to find some  
means of preventing the disease."  
The National Tuberculosis As-  
sociation, with which the Wheeler  
County Tuberculosis Association  
is affiliated, spends about 17 per-  
cent of its budget on research.  
Last year it made 40 grants to  
scientists studying various aspects  
of tuberculosis in laboratories and  
universities throughout the coun-  
try.

### Two Bi-District Titles At Stake At McLean and Pampa Fields

#### HORNETS VS. BULA BULL DOGS AT PAMPA SAT.

The Mobeetic Hornets will meet  
the Bula Bull Dogs in Bi-District  
play on Harvester Field in Pampa  
on Saturday night, November 24  
at 7:30. This is a six-man game  
and settles the championship of  
District 1-B which includes the  
entire Panhandle area and Dis-  
trict 2-B which includes the Lub-  
bock and South Plains area.  
L. R. Reaves, Superintendent of  
the Mobeetic Schools said that  
several hundred fans in the Pan-  
handle have never seen a six-man  
football game played, and that a  
huge crowd is expected for the  
play-off. The representatives of  
the two schools met for several  
hours over the week end and  
finally arrived at this decision.  
Admission prices for the play-off  
game will be \$2.50 for adults and  
75c for students.  
This is the fourth time Bula has  
been in Bi-District play having  
won two bi-district games and one  
regional game.  
The Hornets have entered bi-  
district play three times winning  
one bi-district and one regional  
match.  
The teams are fairly evenly  
matched with the Bull Dogs aver-  
aging 150 pounds per man and the  
Hornets 145 pounds. The Hornets  
lost a conference game to  
Booker and two non-conference  
games, giving them a 7-3 stand-  
ing. The Bula team has lost none  
in conference play but lost two  
in non-conference for a score of  
8-2.

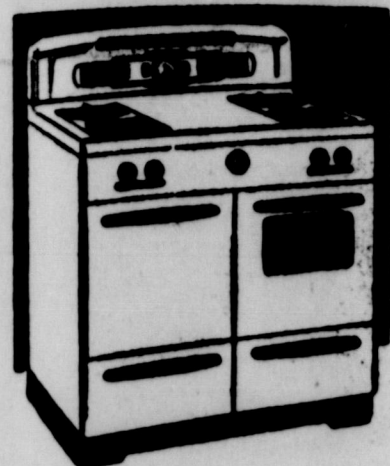

munities there would be no cities or towns. This being the case to have a well balanced area we need both the farms and cities.

Today through out the United States the women and men of farming communities have seen the need for taking care of our land. They see that as long as their are people some must supply agricultural products for a large majority. To encourage proper land use the people who actually live on the farms have organized into Soil Conservation District through out the United States. The purpose of these local Soil Conservation Districts is to study, and analysis the conditions within their areas. What are the problems and how can they be corrected or improved. All Soil Conservation Districts agree that the best soil, plant and water conservation can only be done when the individuals understands his soils and their capabilities.

Wheeler Soil Conservation District has been in operation for the past six years. In this time there are four hundred and thirty individuals that have become district cooperators. Each are planning the needed treatment on their farms according to land use capabilities. They have used the services of the technician's of the Soil Conservation Service working within the district. With the growing population the need for better understanding between the farming and cities groups is becoming more important. District Supervisor's are encouraging a better understanding by working with all interested parties.

## FOUNDATION PROGRAM FOR STATE SCHOOLS

By LEE BARRY

The Foundation School Program Act, was passed by the legislature and became a law giving the state's guarantee that every child in the state would be offered the minimum educational opportunities. The law enumerates the following positions and services: (1) Class-room teachers, (2) Vocational Teachers, (3) Special service teachers, among which shall be included Librarian, School-nurse, School-physician, Visiting-teachers and Itinerant teachers, (4) Teachers of exceptional children, (5) Supervisors and / or Counsellors, (6) Principals part-time, (7) Principals full-time, (8) Superintendents. This looks good on paper but in actual practice less than one-fourth of the 1957 school districts can offer all these services. To us it looks more like a maximum program.

The law states and I quote: "It is the purpose of this act to guarantee to each child of school age in Texas the availability of a Minimum Foundation School Program for nine months of the year. To effectuate the Foundation School Program proposed and guaranteed herein, school districts are authorized to utilize following professional positions and services." End Quote. The services are named above.

The Education Agency allows and expects us to form a cooperative unit by pooling our classroom teacher units that we might be eligible for more of the professional services, Wheeler county has a cooperative unit and employs two Special Service teachers and we are entitled to one Supervisor or Counsellor. I do not like the word supervisor, it sounds like too much authority. I prefer counsellor but regardless of what it is called let it be understood always, that for authority he is on a class-room teacher level. The local school should not give up any authority, merely co-operate for the benefit of itself and other schools.

The size of the cooperative unit is limited to the county as the Professional teacher is hired by the county board and under the supervision of the county superintendent. If the Wheeler cooperative unit had a counsellor that would be as far as we can go on account of the limited number of teacher units.

The Intermediate Unit, that is the authorized agency between the local district and the State, is the Education Agency and their recommendations is to go to the next legislature for action. If the intermediate unit were enlarged to include more than a single county it would make possible a cooperative with more class-room teacher units and give us more

professional services. In our case I think we would benefit by enlarging the intermediate unit.

cellin machines cannot process such letters, often jam and damage letters.

Do not mail cash in any Christmas gift. For safety's sake, use Postal Money Orders or checks.

Make sure parcels are well packed and securely wrapped in strong containers. Cushioning material, such as excelsior, shredded newspapers or tissue paper should be evenly and firmly placed on all sides of the Christmas gift. The carton should be wrapped in heavy paper and securely tied with strong twine.

Gifts of a delicate nature, such as glass, china, electrical appliances, radios and musical instruments, must be marked "Fragile" by the mailer. Food stuffs should be marked "perishable" if subject to spoilage.

Insure parcels. Register letters of real value. Where only proof of delivery is required for letters of no intrinsic value use Certified Mail. Use Combination Mail where a letter or message — other than a gift tag — is to be enclosed inside a Christmas package.

Mail Christmas cards and parcels early to avoid the last minute rush and waiting in line at the post office.

Every postal employee is happy to answer questions on postal rules and regulations. Anyone with problems about mailing his Christmas parcels should avail himself of the opportunity of discussing the problems with postal employees, and take advantage of their experience.

chairman at the two day meeting.

He pointed out that polio is not beaten yet. It is still striking as evidenced by the recent outbreak in Chicago. And there are still millions of these have been stricken already or will be in the future," Mrs. Savage stated. "It is for this reason that our efforts must be unremitting until the battle against this disease is finally won.

"The chief practical problem in cutting polio incidence is to get more people to take advantage of the vaccines. The National Foundation recognizes that there will be families who cannot afford vaccinations and, to meet this need, ten million dollars has been included in the 1957 budget to be used wherever other resources are not available. Studies are now being made to determine most effective method of expending these funds. After the 1957 March of Dimes when this amount of money is available, it will be administered by National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis chapters with the advice of the medical profession," Mrs. Savage said.
