### HUGH MANHUNT IN WHEELER CO.

Wheeler County was the scene of one of the largest man hunts in the State of Texas last Saturday evening and night. More than 70 radio equipped units participated in the hunt centered 3 miles east of Shamrock.

Two men are dead and two officers were slightly wounded in the battle which consumed most of the night in a waitin game.

The dead are: Victor Lee Stephens, 19 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bot Stephens of Shamrock and Junior Bard Meyers, one of the hunted men.

Victor Lee Stephens asked to join the hunt early Saturday evening. He was shot when the posse came upon the fugitives in a pasture north of 66 Highway. Sheriff John Rainey of Collingsworth County saw one of the two wanted men in the brush and weeds. He called upon him to come out with his hands up when the other raised up about 10 feet further down the fence line and dropped the Stephens boy with a bullet from a 30-30 caliber rifle.

The battle started when a car bearing Colorado, license 3-24938 hit and ran in Elk City, Okla. The Oklahoma officers called Deputy Marvin Skinner at Texola, to stop the car and return the persons to the scene of the incident.

Marvin stopped the car but was unable to get the fugitives to return to the accident scene. A scuffle followed in which Skinner was grazed by a bullet from one of the guns and the car got away. He gave pursuit alerting officers at Shamrock for help. Deputy Sheriff Luke Henley, and City Officer N. M. Nix set up a road block east of Shamrock. They (Continued on inside)

Before a crowd of approximately 2,000 fans the Wheeler Mustangs downed the Happy Cowboys to win the Class B Regional Football Championship in Region one. Score 33 to 21.

This is the first time in the history of the Wheeler Football Team that they have won the regional championship. Once in 1948 they tied for District Championship with Panhandle and White Deer. In 1937 they won the district championship and were defeated in Bi-District play.

Coach J. D. Atwell's Mustangs were never behind throughout the entire game. They took the lead in the early minutes of play and maintained it all the way. Extremely good football was shown by both teams but the Cowboys were unable to ride the Mustangs. Oler, Cole, and Gary Poage were the leading ground gainers for the Cowboys.

Jim Porter, Harold Crossland, Joe Jaco and Gary Satterfield were the principle yardage makers for the Mustangs. Dennis Wilsford, Bill McCormick, Darrell Moore and Larry Hunter seemed to have a superhuman knack of being in the Cowboys way and tore up their interference to down the ball carrier time after time. Jim Porter showed up mighty well as line backers and was his old hard-hitting self in taking care of the Happy team.

The Cowboys were unable to score in both the first and third periods of the game. They tallied once in the second and twice in the fourth.

In the second quarter the cowboys broke Gary Poage loose for a 54-yard scamper to the 16-yard line. Wayne Cole carried to the 12. Then on a pitchout, Gary Poage to Vincent Venseuse went the remaining distance for the TD. Gary Poage carried the extra point.

The Cowboys kicked off to the Mustangs with an on-side kick retaining possession of the ball. Dub Oler again got through to the 36. Gary Poage came through, reversed the field again picking up blockers and went the distance to pay dirt. This was the last TD for Happy. Gary Poage kicked the extra point. Score, Mustangs 26, Cowboys 21. This was the closest score after the first period.

The Mustangs scored their first TD with 54 second left in the first quarter. After the ball had been kicked back and forth the Mustangs held, forced the Cowboys to kick. Joe Jaco returned Happs' 45 yard punt for 25 yards to the Happy 46. The Mustangs started to roll and raked up a couple of first downs. ### BULLETIN!

The Federal Power Commission has authorized the Natural Gas Pipeline Co. of America to build its 350 mile pipeline from Wise County to Fritch. This is the proposed line for which options on right-of-way were secured across Wheeler County about a year ago. The original plan was blocked temporarily by a cross petition of Lone Star Gas Co.

The proposed line will have a carrying capacity of 240 million cu. ft. of gas and will cost \$32,070,000 including gathering lines.

The commission agreed to the 13.9 cents per thousand specified in the contracts with independent producers to stand and that will be the rate paid for gas. The commission also authorized a group of independent producers to sell gas to Natural from fields in Jack and Wise Counties.

### 4 INDICTMENTS RETURNED TUES.

The Wheeler County Grand Jury in session Tuesday, returned four indictments against James William Whitehead of Phoenix, Ariz. He is the survivor of the two fugitives in the manhunt east of Shamrock last Saturday night and early Sunday morning.

Two indictments for murder and two attempted murder were returned by the Grand Jury. Murder indictments were returned on the death of Victor Lee Stephens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bot Stephens, and Junior Bard Meyers, one of the fugitives.

Attempted murder indictments were returned in as a result of a gun battle with Deputy Sheriff Luke Henley and Shamrock night officer N. M. Nix. Nix was injured in this affray.

Whitehead, alias Jerry Hunter is the alleged half brother of Junior Bard Meyers, who was killed in the battle Saturday night, in which more than 250 peace officers and volunteers participated. (Continued on last page)

### PROCEEDS FROM SALE OF SEALS AID TB FIGHT

Warning of trouble ahead in the fight against tuberculosis if present over-optimism continues was voiced today by Dr. H. E. Nicholson, founder and president of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association, sponsor of the current Christmas Seal Sale.

Phenomenal success of modern medicines in curing TB patients has over-shadowed the fact that progress in preventing spread of the disease has been slow, he said.

"If over-optimism about TB tempts us to let down our efforts against the disease, we could have an increase in new cases of the disease. Last year, there were approximately 100,000 new cases of TB reported in the United States," he pointed out.

Urging support of the Christmas Seal Sale of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association, Dr. Nicholson said, "Anti-TB drugs have not changed the character of this chronic, debilitating disease." (Continued on inside)

**USE COMPLETE MAIL ADDRESS**

Postmaster Jamison said today that while the Post Office still has a tremendous job ahead of it, efforts are being redoubled to deliver all mail on time and in good condition by Christmas Eve. He points out that by taking a little extra care with your Christmas mailing now, you'll avoid disappointing friends and loved ones at Christmas time.

He asks for your special cooperation to be sure that your return address and the recipient's address are plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Use zone numbers, and it's a good idea to include an extra label inside your packages. Parcel Post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Ask about them when you go to the Post Office to buy stamps.

Speaking about stamps, the Postmaster said, "Use three cent postage on all your Christmas cards. This way they will be delivered promptly, and forwarded or returned, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on your Christmas card envelopes." First-Class postage on your Christmas cards enables you to include handwritten messages, thus making your Christmas greetings more personal. By including your name and address on each Christmas card envelope, both you and your friends can keep your mailing lists up-to-date.

The Postmaster urges that you mail all of your out-of-town Christmas cards and packages immediately, and certainly not later than December 10th. Christmas mail for local addresses should be started on its way at least a week before Christmas.

### FIRE HAZARDS POINTED OUT BY CHIEF R. J. HOLT

Fire Chief R. J. Holt, Jr., this week called upon all citizens of Wheeler and surrounding area to observe precautions in selecting and decorating Christmas trees. He said that thoughtlessness was the largest causative factor in these tragedies.

"Accidents at Christmas time always seem so much more tragic," Mr. Holt said. "And this is especially true if the accident results in a fire that costs a family their home; maybe serious injury to one of the family."

The Chief pointed out that most of this type of accident is easily preventable, if only a few common sense precautions are taken. As an example he listed the following eight rules which he considers "musts" in safe decorating.

1. Keep tree outside until time to trim.
2. Place tree away from all heating units.
3. Use non-flammable decorations.
4. Never use candles near tree.
5. Make sure lights, sockets and wiring are in good condition.
6. Anchor tree, at top, with wire to prevent it from falling.
7. Turn off tree lights at bedtime or when away from home.
8. Dispose of tree safely; never burn in fireplace.

"Remember," he concluded. "It takes less than 60 seconds for the average tree to burn up completely, so make your Christmas a bright one, but with happiness, not with fire."

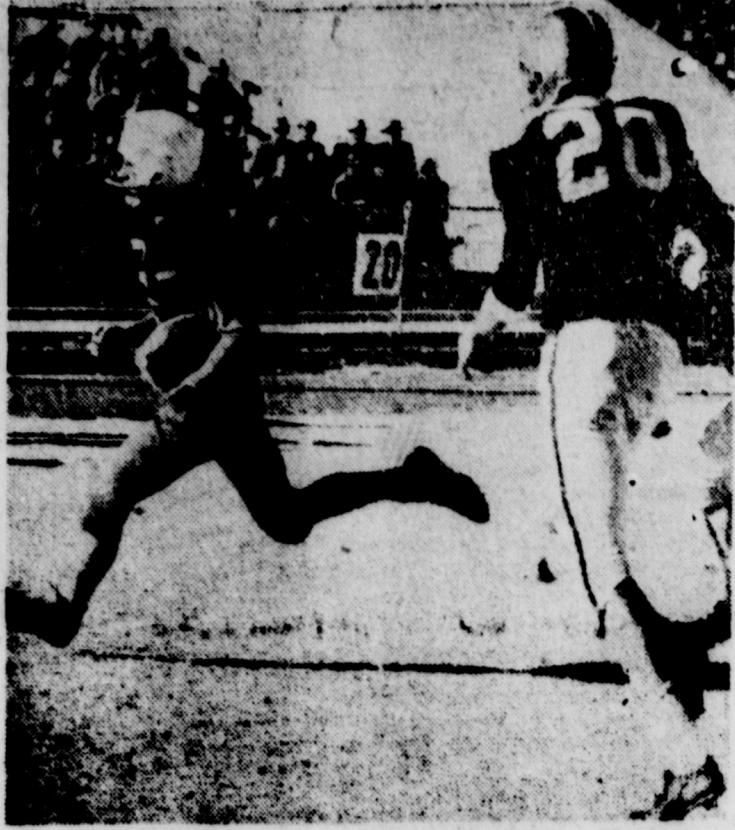
