**Longhorn Cavern Deemed Million Years in Making**

Texas Longhorn Cavern, spectacular scenic masterpiece of Nature, was at least a million years in the making, geologists estimate. The huge cavern is awesome evidence of the changes wrought through the ages by variations in climate, earth movements, the rise and fall of the seas and the slow solution of limestone by water.



Longhorn Cavern, located near Burnet in the Highland Lakes region northwest of Austin, is one of the state's favorite attractions for tourists and sightseers. Guided tours are conducted daily through the explored portions of the cave, which is one of the world's largest.

Richard W. Rush, assistant professor of geology at the University of Texas, has traced the sequence of events which led to the development of the cavern from the time when Texas lay beneath a huge sea, approximately a half-billion years ago.

The stone in which the cavern was eventually carved out was formed from limy muds deposited at the bottom of this sea. Over countless centuries this mud deposit gradually rose out of the sea, only to sink beneath it again, a process which was repeated a number of times.

Finally slow uplift raised Texas above the sea for the last time and the limestone which had hardened from the mud deposits lay exposed to the elements for over sixty million years.

At that time Central Texas was a humid swampland in which gigantic dinosaurs and other reptilian monsters roamed.

The actual beginnings of Longhorn Cavern probably occurred during the Ice Age, when the northern part of the United States

was covered by glaciers, more than a million years ago.

As the glaciers retreated, about 50,000 years ago, the climate of Texas became drier and the ground water level began to drop, dissolving the limestone as it fell.

Underground streams flowing through the cave helped to carve out the labyrinthian passageways and huge rooms, until the cavern was excavated to its most remote chamber, an eerie 130 feet below the surface of the earth.

Prehistoric caverns probably sought refuge in the subterranean depths of the cavern to avoid being devoured by the fearsome mammals which ranged the countryside in dim ages past.

The main approach to the cavern entrance is through a collapsed sink or deep depression in the limestone, with remnants of the original roof preserved as a natural bridge over the steps leading to the cave mouth.

The scenic beauty of the cavern is heightened by the sparkling displays of calcite crystals, the unusual shapes formed of flint and the clusters of stalactites and stalagmites which in some instances have fused to form impressive columns.

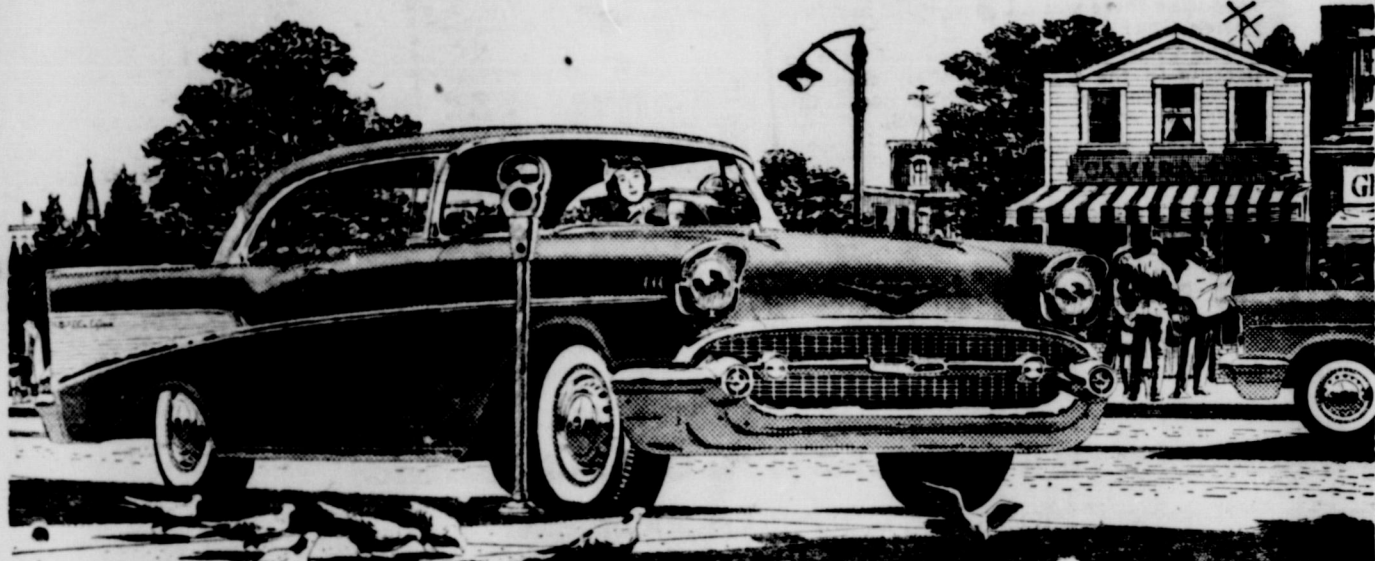

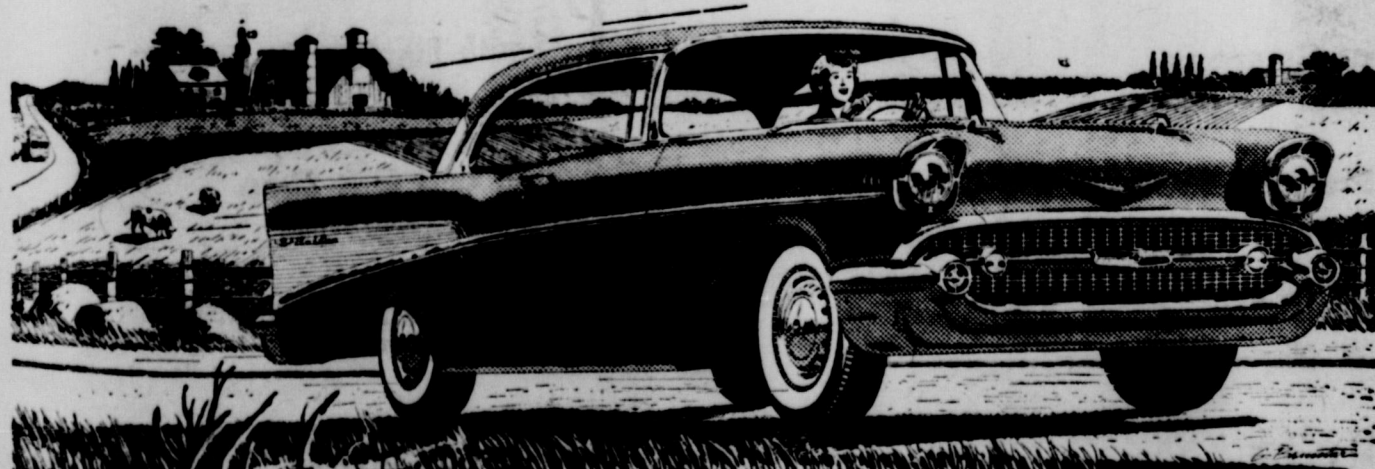

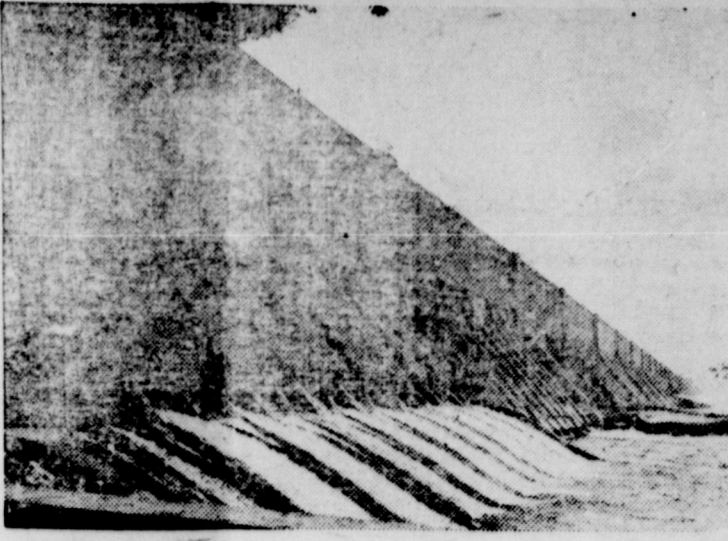

## FATHER NILE



Giver of life and death, a source of feast and famine—such is the mighty River Nile which dominates the fortunes of the Egyptian people. Indeed, without the Nile there could be no Egypt, for the waters are the lifeblood of a parched and desert country. The soil is fertile only along the banks of the river, at its triangular delta and in the artificially irrigated sections.  
 The ancient Egyptians learned how the waters of the great river could be controlled to bring the floods into productive use. They dug channels across the higher lands flanking the river, to carry excess water to low-lying lands farther away. After the Arab conquest in 640, much valuable work was done in irrigation.  
 A revolutionary change in the method of controlling the Nile took place in the 19th century, when cotton was first introduced into Egypt. Although it soon became apparent that Egypt could produce the world's finest cotton, the old irrigation systems failed to provide the frequent and constant watering that the cotton plant requires. Therefore, Egyptian engineers built deep canals to conduct the low-level waters of the summer to cotton fields and built dams to protect the crop from inundation during the flood season.  
 Cotton flourished so rapidly in Egypt that soon greater canals like the Ibrahimia were built. Then early in the 20th century, a large dam was built at Aswan, some 550 miles south of Egypt's Mediterranean coastline. The Aswan Dam was enlarged three times. Several other dams and barrages were built along the Nile to supplement the irrigation and flood control projects.  
 The High Dam, envisaged also at Aswan, will dwarf all its predecessors in size and ultimate utility to the Egyptian people. A huge, 300-mile long lake will be created to eliminate the old danger of famine when the Nile is low. An additional two million acres of desert land will be irrigated. Irrigation authorities believe that Egypt's cultivated land will be increased through the increased irrigation capacity by nearly one-third, and her agricultural income boosted by fifty per cent. In addition, the High Dam will give rise to new industries by providing ten billion kilowatt-hours of electrical power a year.

### Love and Gaily Striped Draperies



Just as the Red Cross is known throughout America as the symbol of mercy and succor, the Red Crescent is recognized in the Arab World as the emblem of human charity. One of the many projects sponsored by the Iraqi Red Crescent is the Home for Orphan Girls. The emblem of the new moon is prominently displayed on the Home's attractive building with its spacious lawns.  
 Construction of the orphanage was financed almost exclusively by the Women's Branch of the Iraqi Red Crescent Society, an affiliate member of the International Red Cross Societies. Twelve years of careful saving and hard work were required to build the Home for some 50 girls ranging from six to fifteen years of age. Today those once unfortunate girls enjoy a remarkably homelike environment with everything to be found at home including love and gaily striped draperies and floral-printed bed spreads.  
 Besides receiving a general education, study in English and Arabic, the girls learn sewing and handicrafts. They make the furnishings for their own rooms, using ingenuity and inexpensive materials, thus learning that good taste is possible even when limited means. This training in sewing and handicrafts is designed to serve a dual purpose: to equip each girl to become a good housewife or to earn her living when she leaves the Home at the age of eighteen.  
 Exercise, folk-dancing and singing are all part of the Home's program to produce for the nation happy, healthy young people and responsible and useful citizens whose influence will be felt in other social groups after they have left the Home. But most important of all, the girls are given love and affection. Each one is treated as an interesting individual, and each one receives personal attention from the members of the permanent staff, the voluntary workers and the administrative committee.  
 Candidates for the Home are chosen from the poorest Iraqi families, irrespective of race or creed. After entering the Home, the girls are not allowed to contact with their relatives. They are encouraged to pay visits. Thus every possible effort is made to give the institution the atmosphere of a happy home—an approach which is making a notable contribution to the physical and emotional growth of these girls by bringing them confidence to their sensitive young minds.

### Mustafa Ben Halim: Statesman Self-Made

Mustafa Ben Halim, the Premier of Libya since April 12, 1954, is in many ways a human symbol of the nation he represents—young, energetic and undaunted by the multitude of problems facing the newly independent country.

Ben Halim, now thirty-six years of age, assumed the post of Premier at a time when his nation was faced with the difficult and delicate negotiations over the question of foreign bases in Libya. Shortly after taking office, he successfully concluded an agreement with the United States concerning Wheelus Air Force Base. In the summer of 1955, he signed a treaty with France providing for the evacuation of French troops from the areas they had occupied in Libya ever since the Italians were driven out during the Second World War.

Married and the father of three children, Premier Ben Halim was educated in Egypt, where he received an architect's degree from Alexandria University. But he soon found himself concerned with the building of his country's economic and political future. His public life began in 1949 as Minister of Communications in Cyrenaica, one of Libya's three provinces. He held this post until the fall of 1953, when he was appointed Minister of Communications in the Libyan federal government. Since he assumed the premiership he has held the position of Foreign Minister simultaneously.

A man of frank speech and direct answers, Ben Halim is appreciative of Western friendship and economic support. Yet Libya's Premier is critical of Western attitudes toward the nationalist struggle of his Al-



gerian neighbors. He describes the oppressive French military operation in Algeria as "one of the biggest shames of the free nations. . . .  
"One cannot see how a people who are trying to achieve their independence should be treated the way they are treated now."

his way to the unit and wanted to know for sure whether or not the alcohol would show on the X-ray film. He insisted that the hostess check with the X-ray headquarters and promise that his wife would not find out through the X-ray report that he had stopped for a "quick one."

A meline resident of one town had to be turned away, even though his young mistress insisted tearfully that she only wanted to find out for sure whether kitty had swallowed a handkerchief. The hostess prescribed a dose of mustard and water, and explained again that the purpose of the X-ray machine is to take pictures of chests — not stomachs.

The hostesses and technicians are often asked how much the X-ray will cost and sometimes they find it hard to convince people that the service is entirely without charge.

One woman asked if the X-ray would help a back pain she had suffered for years. She was only one of many who had to be assured that the X-ray they were getting was no treatment, but a screening process to find out whether there were signs of illness in the lungs.

Most of those who come to be X-rayed are interested in learning all they can about tuberculosis. A number of people ask if an X-ray wouldn't be wasted on them because "they never felt better in their lives." They are told that tuberculosis does not make itself known with obvious symptoms when it first strikes. That is why apparently healthy people should be X-rayed.

Other people want to know whether or not their families or bosses will be told if suspicious shadows show up on their X-rays. It is emphasized that the reports are strictly confidential. Only the individual himself and his family doctor need know that he is advised to have a second, full-size X-ray and other tests to find out whether TB is actually present.

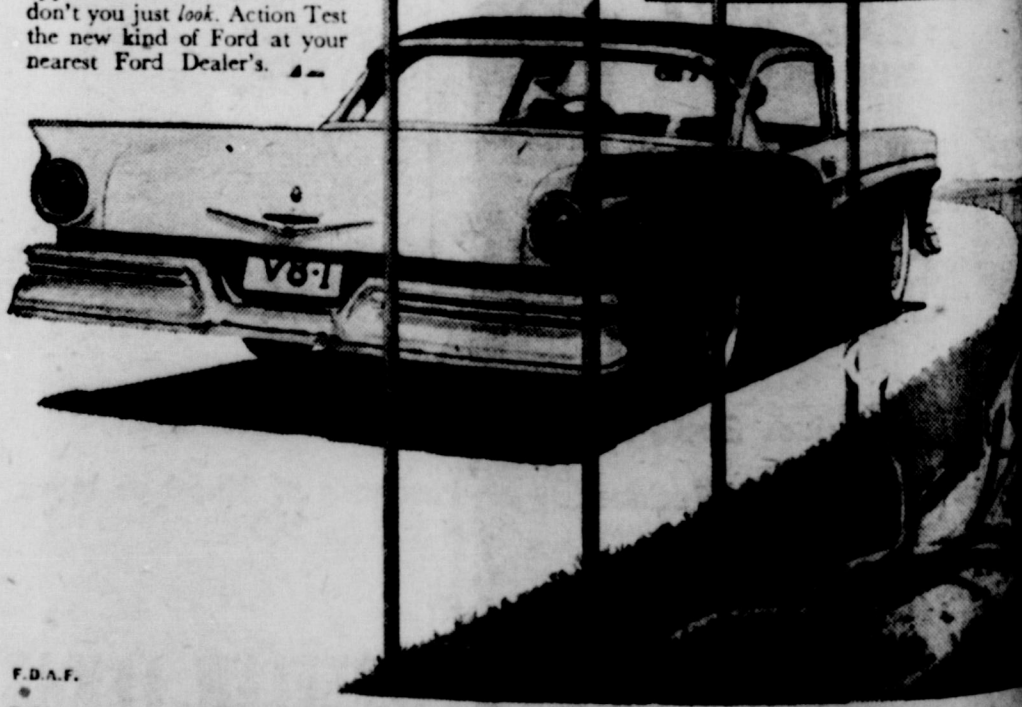
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
