IF SOMEONE ASKS

If Someone ASKS... is a column of Pertinent questions, the answers of which have been prepared by the Red Cross and published in a small pamphlet entitled "Since You Ask Me."

Purpose of this column is to admit that errors have been made and some Red Cross Workers have had to be replaced because of failure to carry out Red Cross policies, says Jim Patterson, Regional Director of the Red Cross. Percentages of these are very small in the overall picture.

Here are other questions often asked with their answers: RED CROSS DIDN'T GIVE A LEAVE. Leaves are entirely controlled by the military authorities. The Red Cross is brought into the picture only when there is a question of emergency. The job of the Red Cross is to provide verified information about hom conditions that might require the presence of the serviceman in question. The information is obtained at the request of military authorities or the ser.

NEW SCHOOL LEGISLATION C OF C TOPIC

Twenty-eight members and guests assembled at Nora's Cafe for the regular meeting of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, Supt. A. E. Brown of Wheeler talked on proposed legislation as recommended by the Texas Education Agency for introduction to this session of the legislature. Supt. Malin of Allison talked on the Teacher Salary Bill, and Supt. L. R. Reeves of Mobeetie spoke on Audio-Visual Aids to teaching.

Mr. Reeves pointed out that the Gilmer-Aiken Bill set up the visual Aids programs but only set up one library of films and made no provisions to replace or replenish same. He pointed out that a film library was being maintained at Childress by the combined aid of schools and the Dr. Pepper Bottling Co. of Childress. The film library is at Clarendon. Mr. Reeves said it had been proven that the audio-visual aids were the best aids in teaching. Pointing out that by reading, seeing, hearing and doing the students retained the most knowledge of any field. Proposed legislation would set up a fund of 50c per pupil for the procuring and maintenance of adequate film libraries.

Supt. Malin pointed out that a starting teacher with a degree now receives \$2805 annually. Under the new bill she would receive \$3204. A stenographer, without a college education, can take civil service exam and start at \$3600 per year. This shows a need for better salaries in order to secure more teachers. The definite teacher shortage in Texas was pointed out. Of the 7,000 qualified teachers graduated from Texas colleges last year only 2,900 remained in school teaching jobs in Texas.

Supt. Brown pointed out the changes being proposed in school organization. Some of which he thought might pass the legislature. Among them are: (These are recommendations of the Texas Education Agency).

Each school must be a part of a 12 year school system. Any other type of school will work hardships on both districts and pupils the Texas Education Agency showed.

State Board to Classify all schools in two classes, Active and Inactive. Active schools to be those meeting the following requirements: over 100 square miles with less than 1 pupil per square mile or more than 500 ADA. Pupils to ride buses not more than 1 hour each way daily. Having a valuation and tax rate that will support a 12 year accredited school system. No school in Wheeler County could qualify without state aid.

Inactive schools would be all schools that could not qualify for schools as above. All inactive schools would be forced to attach themselves to an active school district. A State and County advisory committee would attempt to work out the annexation procedure. If they could not then the county board would have to force the annexation.

The above legislation pertaining to school re-organization has NOT been introduced this session but is what has been recommended by the Texas Education Agency to improve school conditions on a state level.

The County Superintendent have introduced legislation that would do away with county superintendents as we now have them. Area rather than counties would be the basis for the intermediate unit. A county might retain their county superintendent if they would support the office without state aid. At the present between \$5 and \$6 per pupil is being deducted from the school fund to support the County Superintendents office, Mr. Brown pointed out.

CITY TAXES 87% PAID

Tax Assessor-Collector Thurman Rives, this week reported to The Times that 13% of the Wheeler City tax for the current year was still unpaid. Total tax assessed was \$11,313.92. At the close of business on January 31, or the date after which the penalty for non payment of taxes went into effect only \$9,888.12 had been collected in city taxes, the collector stated. This leaves \$1,245.80 or 13% unpaid. This is a larger deficit than has been in the past at this season of the year, the assessor-collector stated.

The State has received 95% of the taxes assessed, \$44,804.01 were assessed and \$42,583.91 have been collected.

On the county level \$154,285.94 were assessed and \$145,480.05 have been paid for a total of 94.3 percent, the collector stated.

Wheeler School district had \$24,736.35 on the roll and \$22,712. (Continued on last page)

1957 School Census Shows 377 Students

The 1957 school census which has just been completed shows that Wheeler School District has only two less children than last year, according to Supt. A. E. Brown.

The current count shows 202 boys and 175 girls for a total of 377 school-age children. This compares with 379 last year.

The census shows 32 six-year-olds, compared with 41 beginners last year, Supt. Brown stated.

Wheeler Boys and Girls Cage Teams Are District Champions

Wheeler is the city of sports champions!

With the season's football honors tucked safely away, Coach A. D. Atwell's boys and girls basketball teams have come through to win the District 11-B championships.

The Mustangs will go into bi-district play Monday night, February 25, when they meet the Samnorwood Eagles, champions of District 12-B, in the title game at McLean.

The game will begin at 8 p.m. with Mr. Kimmous of Phillips and Mr. Knowles of Borger serving as officials.

Admission prices will be 50c for adults and 25c for students.

The Mustangettes will play for the bi-district crown on either March 4 or 5, but the site has not been selected.

The Mustangs captured the boys title in District 11-B by beating out Kelton the runner-up 66-63, last week. Jim Porter stacked up 25 of the points for Wheeler

and Harold Pitcock scored 23 points for Kelton. The Mustangs led the last three quarters, although Kelton took a 15-14 first-quarter lead. It was 35-29 with Wheeler out front at half time, and 54-43 after three quarters. Briscoe is third place winner in the district.

Winner of the Wheeler-Samnorwood bi-district game Monday night will go into regional play at Canyon on March 1 and 2.

Wheeler girls captured the district championship with wins last week over Mobeetie, 52-28; and over Kelton, 76-53. Briscoe is runner-up in the District and Allison holds third place honors.

District 11-B is comprised of Wheeler, Briscoe, Allison, Kelton, Mobeetie and Miami.

Clarendon won their District 2A. Wheeler will have a practice game with Clarendon here Friday night, 7:00 p.m.

Bobby Martin, 16 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Martin of near Briscoe, showed his lightweight Hereford calf "Mutt" to Grand Champion Honors at the Top O' Texas Junior Livestock Show in Pampa this week.

Mutt, an 840-pound Hereford steer, has been shown in several previous shows this winter by the Wheeler County 4-H Club Youth. It placed fifth in the lightweight class in Amarillo, eighth in the Odessa show, placed first in the lightweight division of the Wheeler County Junior Livestock show here on December 29 and was shown to the Reserve Champion of that show.

The steer was bred by J. L. Hess of McLean, from his commercial herd.

viceman or his family, and the Red Cross submits a report with out any recommendations of its own. The report may, however, include the recommendations of doctors, lawyers, or others. The final decision is made by the military authorities.

Red Cross Wouldn't Give Me a Loan

Red Cross loans or grants to servicemen or their families are made only to meet emergency needs that cannot be met through the resources of the men or their families. Delay in government checks, family illness, or emergency leave may create such needs. Obviously the Red Cross cannot attempt to lend money to every serviceman who finds himself out of funds.

Financial assistance is given as a loan when the recipient is able to repay without hardship. Otherwise it is given as an outright grant.

Why Does The Red Cross Conduct Special Fund Appeals In Time Of Disaster?

Red Cross disaster operations are financed in part from funds

raised in the annual fund appeal and in part from funds raised in special appeals when disasters strike because it is impossible to forecast how many disaster operations will occur in any one year or the total expenditures that will be required to finance them.

Each annual national Red Cross budget includes an appropriation for disaster relief, so that the

emergency needs of disaster victims can be immediately met. However, experience has shown that the amount budgeted annually may be inadequate for the job to be done in a single large disaster operation such as the 1951 Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Illinois floods, which involved expenditures of more than \$14,000,000.

An organization offering a national program of disaster relief on a year-round basis must consider the unpredictability of disasters and must have a means of financing itself by direct appeals to the public when disaster strikes.

Does The Red Cross Charge For Relief Supplies?

No. Aid of disaster victims given through the Red Cross in an outright gift from the people of America. Nothing is sold at any time.

Does The Red Cross Make Loans To Disaster Sufferers.

No. The Red Cross gives its financial assistance to disaster victims in the form of outright grants not loans. Shelter, food, clothing, and medical care are given to all disaster sufferers as required during the emergency phase of a disaster. When the emergency is over and the work of rehabilitation is begun, the Red Cross assists disaster victims on the basis of need beyond their own resources.

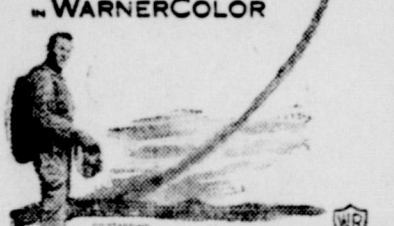

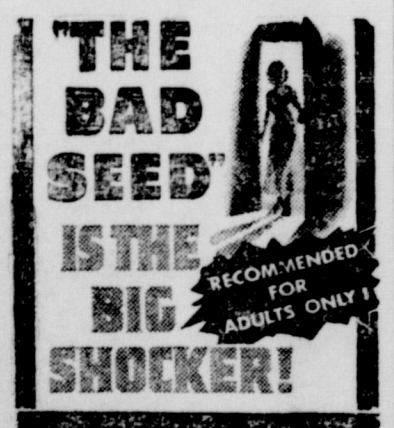

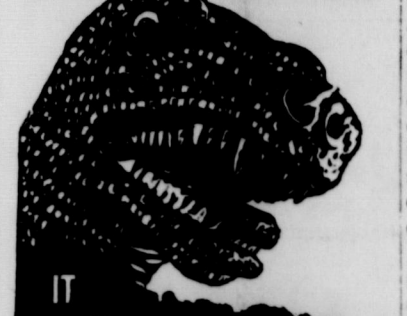

62 has been paid. This is 92 per cent complete.

Briscoe School had \$9,427.84 assessed. Patrons have paid \$9,001.06 for a total of 95.47 percent.

These figures, which must be considered in the setting up of a budget for the operation of the city of Wheeler, must be taken into consideration. Facts indicate that the percentage of uncollected taxes for the current fiscal year are likely to be higher than in the past. Also indicated is the fact that anything that would increase taxes to a higher level, might result in an even larger uncollected tax roll.

During the poll tax paying period ending on January 31, 1957, 1,357 poll tax receipts were issued in Wheeler County. There are 7 exemptions issued to first time voters in the county. This gives a total Poll tax voting strength in Wheeler County this year of only 1,364. This figure will be increased by over-age persons who are not required by law, in communities of under 10,000, to obtain poll tax exemptions in order to vote in elections.
