

THE BUDGET

The budget continues to be number one conversation item in Washington, and among the top subjects in the mail. To date, the House has considered and acted on 22 separate measures concerning the appropriation of funds for this government and its departments and agencies. It has not acted on the Public Works bill, which is sometimes referred to a s the 'pork barrel" bill, nor the Mutual Security (Foreign Aid) bill. As of June 3rd, 1957, the Senate had acted on 14 of these measures. Four had been signed into law by the President, while 6 were awaiting the President's signature Four of the measures were sub ject to the action of a Conference Committee between the House and the Senate. The 4 that have already been written into law are appropriations for the Treasury Department, Post Office Department., U. S. Tax Court and the Second 1957 Urgent Deficiency bill. The Presidential request was for approximately \$87 million more than the Congress allowed him in these 4 appropriation matters. The other measures, now on the President's desk for his signaproximately \$100 million less than the President asked. These cuts were very carefully weighed and it was the intention of the Congress to cut only those things that appeared to be in the nature of waste or budgetary fat. There are more cuts to come on the other appropriations. These cuts will be weighed in the same careful man-
