



Reports from the Pampa-Wheel-10,000.00 er-Canadian area indicate that harvest is 90% complete. Wheat averaged 20 to 35 bushels per acre in this area. The Northern Panhandle reports


indicate harvest 90% to 95% complete with an average yield of 25 bushels per acre.


