CITY COUNCIL SETS 1958 TAX RATE FOR WHEELER AT \$1.30

The city council met Thursday evening for their regular monthly meeting in the First National Bank Building. After paying the bills the council discussed the water and sewer project and the swimming pool program. They examined the specifications for the swimming pool, which were completed last week by Lubbock engineers.

After the brief discussion period the council voted to set the 1958 tax rate at \$1.30 per \$100.00 valuation. This rate will take care of the outstanding bonds and the proposed \$110,000 water and sewer bonds in addition to the general fund, which is used for the general operation of the city.

Here is the way ad valorem tax is figured . . . For example, say you owned a home actually worth \$10,000. On the tax roll it would be valued at 32 per cent of the \$10,000 which is \$3,200. Now multiply the \$1.30 tax rate times the \$3,200 valuation and we find that \$41.60 is the amount of ad valorem taxes to be paid on the property.

The council also voted to invite the water and sewer association to hold their annual meeting in Wheeler. The annual affair will be held July 17 according to Jim Risner water superintendent.

A Tribute

PROGRESS ON POOL SLOWED BY 'RED TAPE'

Progress on the Wheeler Swimming Pool is temporarily "bogged-down" according to Mayor Thomas Daughtry. "It's just impossible to speed up the legal work", he said.

The specifications and blue prints have been completed and a lawyer has been obtained to work-out the legality of issuing warrants for the \$20,000 to be furnished by the city. After the warrants are issued, "then we will be able to let the contract for actual construction of the pool," Daughtry said.

Daughtry estimated that it will be sometime in October or November before construction of the pool can begin. "We are rushing the project as fast as possible, but the red tape just takes time".

The project will take approximately 45 days to complete. The financial drive to raise \$5,000 headed by Dr. H. E. Nicholson has snowballed past the \$7,000 mark. At press time today, Helen Franklin, treasurer of the drive indicated that \$7,117.30 had been contributed.

THE JOY THAT WAS SET BEFORE HIM

In the 53rd chapter of Isaiah, Jesus is pictured as one despised and rejected, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief. He said of himself while in the garden, "My soul is exceeding sorrowful, even unto death." Matt. 26:38. Luke adds to the garden scene these words, chapter 22 verse 44, "And being in an agony He prayed more earnestly; and his sweat as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground. Soon after the garden experience came the cross with its shame and suffering. We feel surely there could be no joy in these experiences for Him.

In Hebrews 12:2 we get a picture of Christ's ministry in a different light in these words, "For the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." This enduring of the cross was for a purpose. He could look beyond the cross, to the final outcome. He could measure present experiences by eternal results.

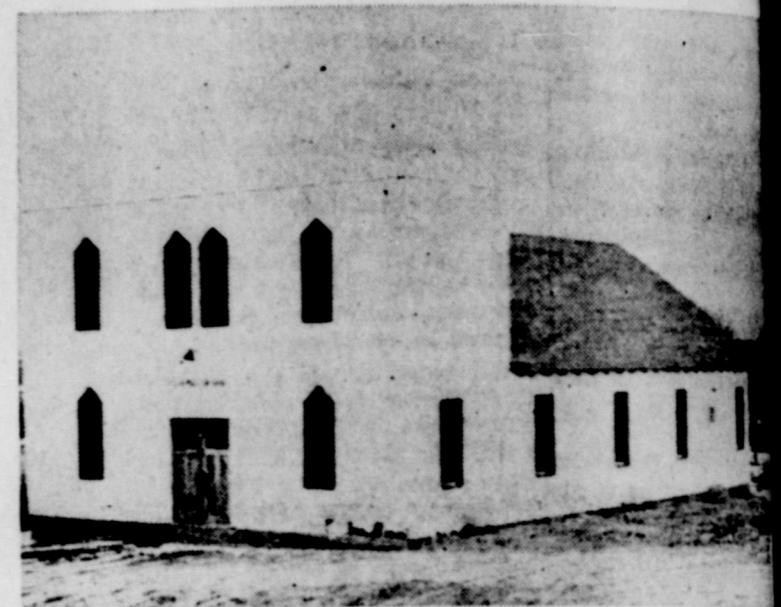

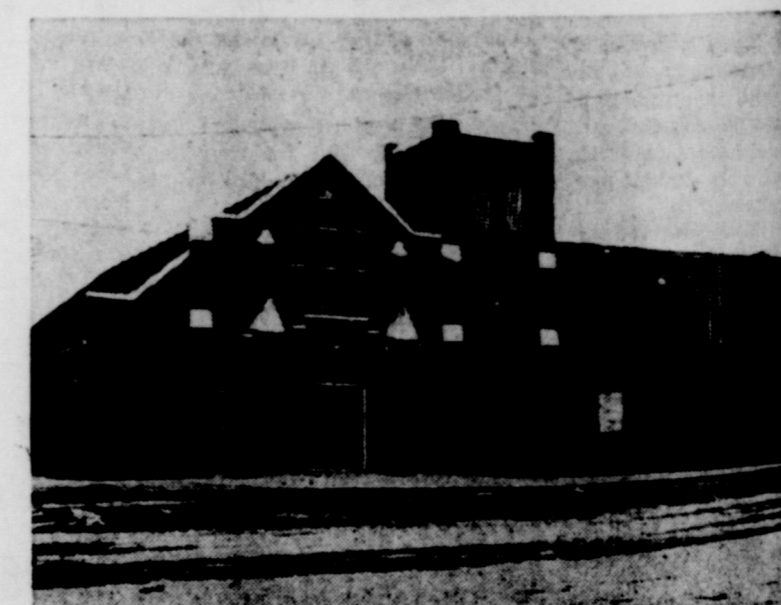

He, along with other cadets are encouraged to participate in a well-balanced athletic program and other recreational activities during their free time.

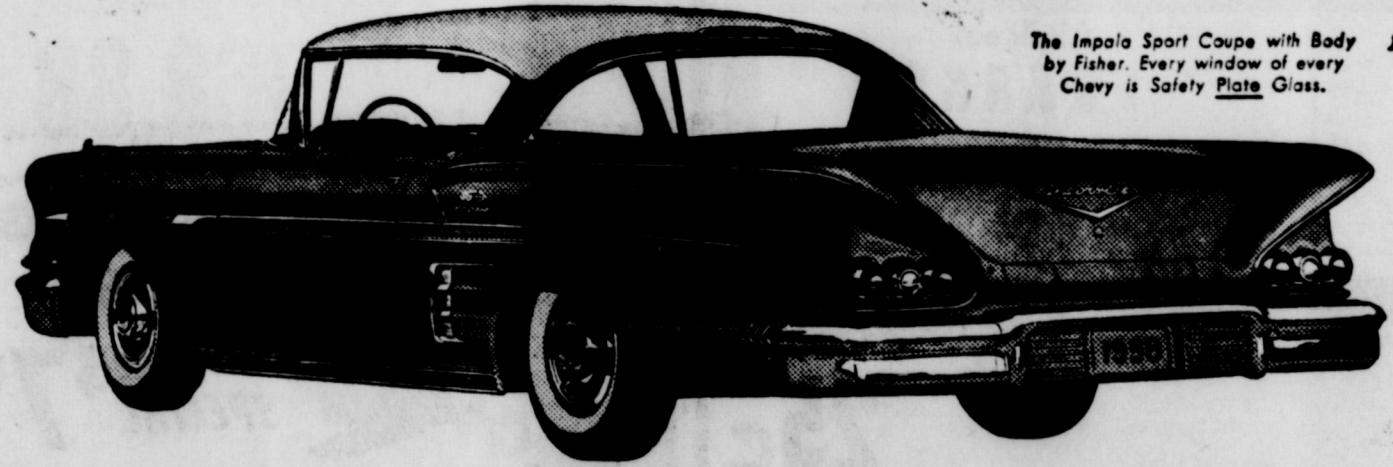

My Trip To Kiwanis International!

In the company of J. Vernon Brown and his wife, Kloe, Berger, Mary and I left Wheeler Friday, June 27th, to attend the 43rd Kiwanis International Convention held in Chicago.

We found our nationwide network of dual highways and modern turnpikes, uncluttered by billboards and advertising gimmicks, to be the ultimate in engineering safety and speed. The first official function, aside from registration, was the cornerstone laying at the site of the Permanent Home Office, at Rush and Erie Street at 3:30 Sunday afternoon, with H. Park Arnold, International President, presiding.

At the South Hall, International Amphitheatre, chuck wagon chow was served in the evening with the Biltmore Girls and the Sons of the West, strolling musicians, entertaining.

The convention proper opened Sunday evening with a prelude by the Joliet, Illinois Township High School Band directed by Bruce Houseknecht. These youngsters are so outstanding in the field of band music that they were given national recognition through LIFE magazine and NEWSWEEK. The program proper was a worship service.

Monday's session was held at the Arena, International Amphitheatre, with William G. Stratton, Governor of the State of Illinois, bringing the welcome address, and the Honorable Wilber M. Brucker, Secretary of the Army, presenting a forceful and reassuring address entitled THE PRICE OF FREEDOM.

Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. was scheduled for the Tuesday program to bring the address AMERICA'S WORLD RESPONSIBILITIES but was taken ill and his address was read by an assistant.

Wednesday the delegate body elected Kenneth B. Loheed, Toronto, Ontario, Canada, for the 1958-59 President, and accepted the invitation from the Texas-Oklahoma District to hold the 1959 International Convention in Dallas, Texas.

We left Chicago, Thursday morning, spent the night at Rolla, Missouri, and Friday visited the Will Rogers Memorial at Claremore, Oklahoma, spent Friday night in Oklahoma City and reached Wheeler at 1:00 P.M. Saturday after driving all morning in the rain.

THE COUNTRY EDITOR

SWISHER COUNTY, primarily agricultural, gave Ralph Yarborough 847 votes in the special election which sent him to the U. S. Senate. All other candidates received a total of 432 votes. Because of his excellent record in the Senate during the past year, because the skeptics have found that "he is not as radical as he had been billed," because he has proved himself to be a friend of all groups including the farmer, the businessman, the laborer, the independent oil man and those dependent upon royalties, he will no doubt pick up many new votes in Swisher on July 26.

MANY OF THE NEW votes will come from people in the upper income brackets who in the past supported Yarborough's opponents. They have found he is not their enemy as has been charged by the opposition.

Many others, having the old American spirit of fair play and good sportsmanship, believe that any good man deserves a full term in an office after he has served a partial term. They believe that under such circumstances, the incumbent should be re-elected unless there is a good reason for not doing so.

This is only a sound business practice. When directors of a corporation have an efficient general manager who is getting the job done, they know it is wise and good business to keep him.

WE'RE TRYING to say that we in Swisher county are supporting Ralph Yarborough on his own merits, not on the demerits of his opponent.

However, we notice in some of the papers that there are some who have other reasons for supporting Ralph Yarborough.

The El Paso Herald-Post is critical of Mr. Blakley's record during the 102 days he spent in the U. S. Senate following his appointment by Allan Shivers.

The Herald-Post takes a dim view of the fact that the Dallas multimillionaire was absent about a fourth of the days the Senate met while he was a member. Blakley failed to vote on 45 per cent of the issues on which there was a roll call during his tenure. He spoke about 1200 words only on the floor of the Senate—and almost half of this number were contained in his "Farwell Address." He asked only three questions on the floor. And his bill for office help ran over \$10,000 for those 102 days—although large amount of mail remained unanswered when Yarborough arrived to take over the office.

(Mr. Yarborough was present for roll call votes 93 per cent of the time over a period of 14 months.)

WE REFUSE to believe that Mr. Blakley's record of inefficiency in the Senate indicates that he is an inefficient man. No man ever amassed a fortune of \$200 million who was not efficient and on the job at all times.

We do believe that a man who has the responsibility of managing and keeping \$200 million has too many personal responsibilities to devote his full time to representing Texas in the U. S. Senate, one of the most important jobs in the world.

We do not believe Mr. Blakley would put his official responsibilities above his personal responsibilities if he went to Washington. We base our opinion only on his record during the 102 days he served.

THE HERALD-POST also said editorially, "It was a bit shocking to learn that one of William A. Blakley's insurance firms had paid 'fees' to three State senators who were members of the Senate Insurance Committee. Two of them served as chairman . . . Blakley's Guardian International Life Insurance Company of Dallas paid the three senators 'fees' totaling \$12,300 from 1945 to 1951. These payments bring back memories of A. B. Shoemaker, owner and operator of U. S. Trust and Guaranty Company. Shoemaker gave senators 'fees' also, and the peculiar morality of the Texas Senate let them remain members. In fact, the Senate honored the one receiving the biggest 'fee' by making him president pro-tem.

"Shoemaker is in a hospital, disabled by a bullet he fired into his head in an attempt to kill himself.

"Blakley is a candidate for the U. S. Senate.

"He is a multimillionaire and he is spending money in great gobs. He is going around Texas posing as a cowboy, but the pictures he has had taken show that he isn't even a reasonable facsimile of a cowboy.

"Blakley was chairman of the board of the Guardian International when it was paying senators 'fees.' He owned 6900 of the 9700 shares. He ran the firm.

"Well, it is obvious that Blakley won't do. He would not be a good representative of Texas in Washington. His firm thought it was all right to pay 'fees' to State senators; would he accept 'fees' as a U. S. Senator?

"Fortunately, Texas has a far better choice—Ralph Yarborough who was elected a year ago to complete the unfinished term of Price Daniel.

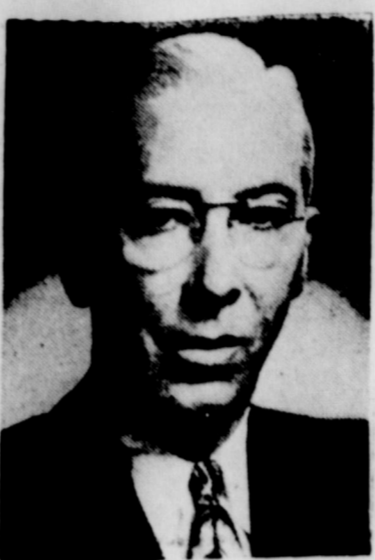

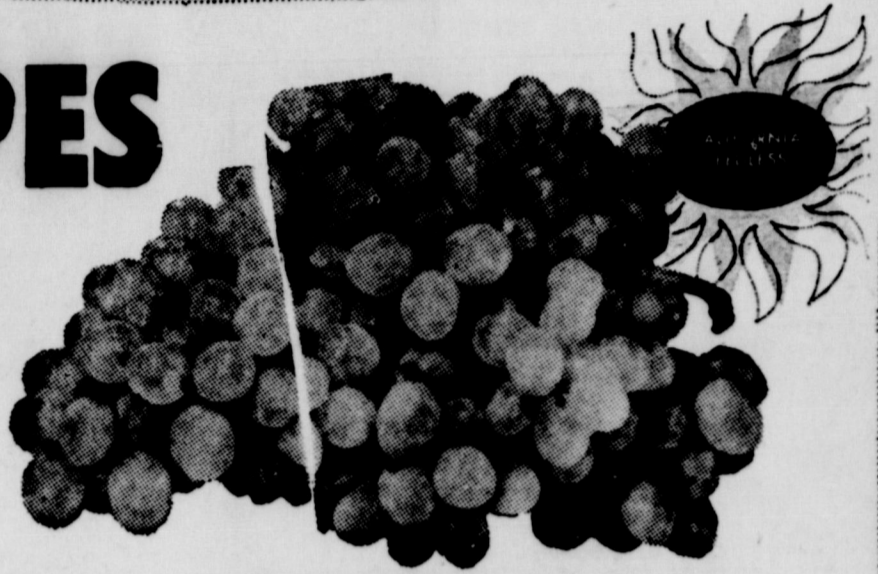
