THE JOY THAT WAS SET BEFORE HIM

In the 53rd chapter of Isaiah, Jesus is pictured as one despised and rejected, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief. He said of himself while in the garden, "My soul is exceeding sorrowful, even unto death." Matt. 26:38. Luke adds to the garden scene these words, chapter 22 verse 44, "And being in an agony He prayed more earnestly; and his sweat as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground. Soon after the garden experience came the cross with its shame and suffering. We feel surely there could be no joy in these experiences for Him.

In Hebrews 12:2 we get a picture of Christ's ministry in a different light in these words. "For the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." This enduring of the cross was for a purpose. He could look beyond the cross, to the final outcome. He could measure presest experiences by eternal results.

There was the joy of having God's approval on the life He lived here. When He was baptized by John a voice from heaven spoke "Saying, This is my beloved son in whom I am well pleased." Luke 3:17. In this act Jesus was publically dedicating Himself to His mission of salvation which would be climaxed in His death on the cross. When He was transfigured in the presence of Peter, James and John; Moses and Elias also being present, "Behold a voice out of the cloud which said, "This is my beloved son in whom I am well pleased, hear ye Him." Matt. 17:5. Thus he had the approval of God upon his actions and words. As Jesus was faithful in doing those things that met God's approval, we should follow Him. It is apparent that many times we seek only the approval of men.
