

If the first baseman plays his maximum distance from the base, he has no time to strad-dle the bag in order to take throws from the infield. When holding a runner man's position must be di-rectly facing the pitcher, with his right foot a little to the left of the inside corner of the bag. The left foot should be to the left of the inside cor-ner of the bag. This position not only allows the first base-man to catch throws to his left, or to his right, from the pitcher, but also enables him to touch the foot of the runner sliding back into the bag by quickly turning to the right and placing his glove in the proper position. This is the natural and proper position for the first baseman to take when holding runners on the bag.
