GAS TAX REFUND CLAIMS ARE NOW AVAILABLE

County Agent Bryan Swaim announced today that farmers may now submit claims for Federal gasoline tax refunds on fuel used for farming purposes. He said, "this tax of 3 cents per gallon is entirely separate from the state tax for which local distributors furnish exemption slips."

Here are the main points to keep in mind:

1. Refund claims must be only for gasoline used in producing or harvesting farm or ranch products.
 2. The amount used between July 1, 1957 and June 30, 1958 should be included.
 3. Use Form 2240, obtainable from County Agent's office for requesting the refund - only one claim per farm operator.
 4. Refund claims must be submitted on or before September 30, 1958. Mail them to District Director, Internal Revenue Service, either in Austin or Dallas.
 5. Keep proper records for verifying the refund claim submitted.
- Swaim said forms for new operators were available in his office.

NO BALLOTING TO BE HELD IN 7 COUNTY BOXES

A. B. Crump, County Democratic Election Chairman, announced today that the following voting boxes will not be open for the August 23 primary: Mobeetie box 1, Briscoe box 2, Wheeler box 3, Kellerville box 8, Heald box 9, Lela box 10 and Pagan box 14.

These boxes constitute commissioner precincts 1 and 3, or the west half of the county. "No county or district races require a runoff in these precincts and the only state race is that of associate justice," he said.

Voters in all the other precincts in the county will vote at their regular voting places.

County Democratic Convention To Be Held Saturday

Wheeler County Chairman A. B. Crump announced this week that a County Democratic Convention will be held at 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning, August 2 in the district courtroom in the Wheeler Courthouse.

The purpose of the convention is to elect delegates to attend the state convention to be held in San Antonio on Tuesday, September 9.

Simpson Suffers Stroke in Courtroom

Col. E. A. Simpson, Amarillo, suffered a stroke Monday morning in the Wheeler Courtroom. He was rushed to the Wheeler Hospital and later removed to an Amarillo Hospital.

Mr. Simpson is a member of the law firm of Simpson-Clayton and Fullinger in Amarillo. He was in Wheeler in connection with a court hearing at the time of his attack. Two cases were postponed because of his illness.

Simpson is reported to be "doing fine."

Voters Pick McIlhany, Hefley, Goodrich, Weems And Pettit

TWO COUNTY RACES THROWN INTO RUNOFF

Wheeler county voters will go back to the polls Saturday, August 23, to make the final selection of candidates in two county commissioner races that were thrown into runoffs after Saturday's democratic primary served only to reduce the field of aspirants.

The precinct two and four commissioner's races were thrown into the runoff.

O. W. Pendleton, incumbent commissioner of precinct 2, was forced into a showdown election by R. D. Mason, former county commissioner. Pendleton gained a tremendous lead in the three way contest. Coy Revious, area farmer, was eliminated from the race.

Official county returns showed Pendleton received 210 votes to Mason's 126. Coy Revious was last with 92.

L. L. See, incumbent for precinct four commissioner, was eliminated by Ernest Henderson and Dean McMurtry. See polled only 245 votes compared to 477 for Henderson and 382 for McMurtry.

PAMPA MEN DEFEATED BY COUNTRY VOTE

Contrary to a report made by the Amarillo Daily News, incumbent Grainger McIlhany defeated Johnny Campbell by a comfortable margin in the race for state representative of the 87 legislative district.

The district wide vote was: McIlhany, 4,571; Campbell, 4,038.

Campbell led in Gray county, 3,062 to 1,601, but McIlhany's big margin in Wheeler and Collingsworth counties gave him the victory.

The official returns in Wheeler County gave McIlhany a 1812 to 407 margin of victory. And Collingsworth County reported 1158 votes for McIlhany and 569 for Campbell.

District Judge

Judge Lewis Goodrich, incumbent, snowballed to an easy victory over Bruce Parker, Pampa Judge, in what was expected to be a close race. Wheeler county gave Goodrich 1644 votes as compared to 556 for Parker. Parker's home county of Gray also picked Goodrich. The official vote in Gray county was 2,728 for Goodrich and 1,932 for Parker.

Hemphill County gave Goodrich 475 votes compared to 409 for Parker. Goodrich also led in Lipscomb 686 to 324 for Parker. And Roberts county gave Goodrich 147 and Parker 61.

The official returns from the district showed Goodrich with 5461 votes and Parker with 3282.

County Judge

In the race for county judge, George Hefley, Wheeler farmer and former county judge, defeated Joe Taylor, of Shamrock by a 2 to 1 margin. Hefley received 1536 votes and Taylor 773. Hefley carried 13 of the 15 county boxes.

County Superintendent

Geo. Weems, popular Wheeler county teacher and administrator, for the past 28 years was elected county school superintendent in Saturday's primary. Weems tallied 1292 votes compared to his opponent Thomas Baker's 964.

Weems carried 9 of the counties 15 boxes.

County Commissioner

Shelby Pettit, of Wheeler, edged past Jack Miller 365 to 263 in their quest for county commissioner of precinct one.

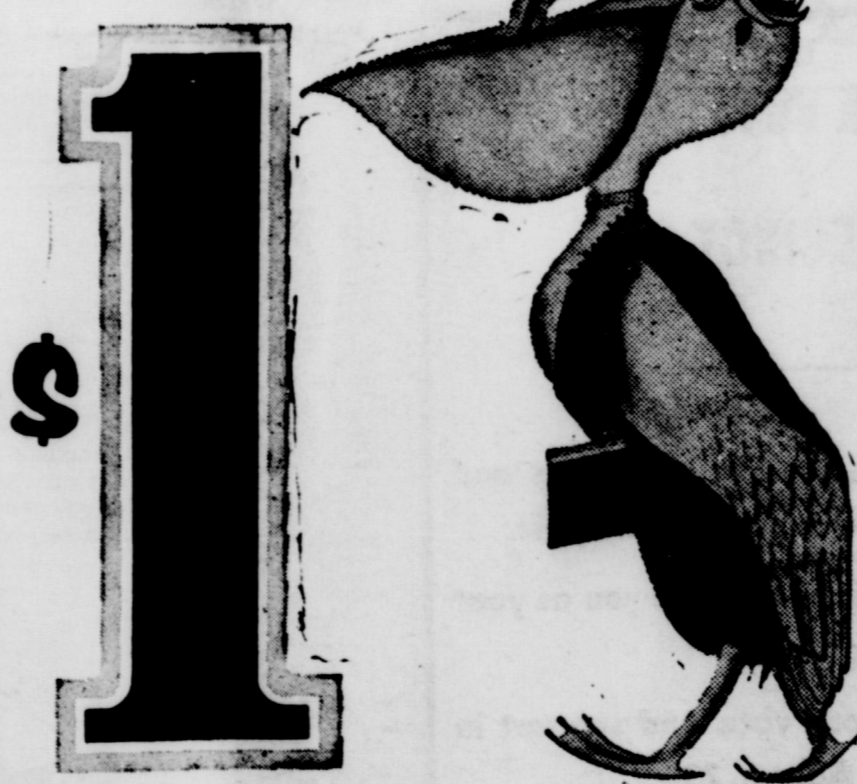

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
