## Voters Must Pay Poll Tax Before Voting in Election

You have only a few days left in which to pay your poll tax and to vote in the coming elections to be held later on this year.

Any person who has reached the age of 60 before January 1, 1957 will not be required to obtain a poll tax. Also they will not be required to obtain an exemption as long as they live in a city which has a population of less than 10,000. County Assessor and Collector, Thomas Rives announced today.

"Some people are of the opinion that they have paid their poll tax when they paid their property tax. This is not the case unless a separate poll tax receipt was issued. Poll Tax is not assessed on the statements," he said.

There are several important officers to be elected this year in the County. There are County Judge, County Clerk, County Treasurer, County Superintendent, Commissioners of Precinct 2 & 4, District Clerk, District Judge and District Attorney.

So in reminding the people of Wheeler County Mr. Rives said, "if you want to have a voice in who is elected, pay your Poll Tax between now and January 31st."

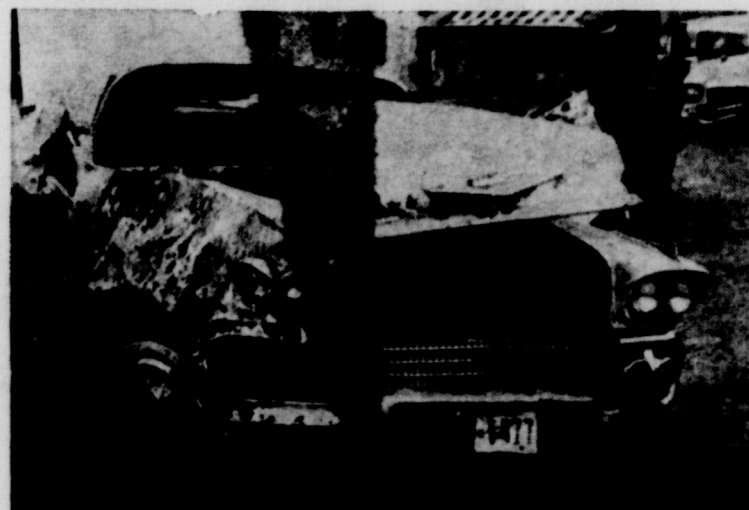
Following the luncheon and program President Brown met with Committee Chairman to perfect the organization of Committee.

## COMMUNITY TV TOWER IS ERECTED

A 400 ft. community television tower was constructed in Wheeler this week by the Western Communication System Company of San Angelo. The company constructed the tower in less than 5 days.

A spokesman for Lee Guthrie, owner of the tower, said the tower will enable Wheeler residents to receive "top" reception from three television stations, channel 9, Oklahoma City, channel 5, Enid and channel 4, Amarillo. Test taken Monday revealed reception to be several hundred times better with TV sets "tied-on" to the tower than those with 60 ft. "home towers".

The tower is located 2 blocks West of the south end of main street. It has 19 twenty-one foot sections and is supported by 18 steel guy wires set in 6 feet of concrete.

Guthrie said more than 200 poles have been set-up in Wheeler which will enable the firm (Wheeler T. V. Service) to connect practically every television set in Wheeler to the tower.

Plans have been made to lay the cable and install the booster amplifiers. "Traps" will also be constructed along the line to eliminate all "foreign" matter Guthrie said.

The company plans to be ready for the initial "tie-on" by February 1.

## License Tags Go On Sale February 1st

License tags will go on sale February 1, in Wheeler County, according to Thurman Rives, county tax assessor and collector. He said the only two places Wheeler countians can purchase 1958 tags will be at his office in the court house and at the Benson Hardware in Shamrock.

Tag buyers have until the end of March to purchase their tags Rivers said.

## Borger Police File 'Theft' Charges Against Pair

Two men were injured early Tuesday morning when the 1958 Chevrolet they were driving overturned 14 miles east of Wheeler. Both men were taken to the Wheeler hospital, where Walter Kimes, 42, Borger was treated for multiple bruises and Charles Reese, 28 Borger, for concussion.

State trooper, R. C. Parker, has filed "drunk driving" charges against Kimes and the Borger police have filed "car theft" against both men. Parker was also charged with "drunkenness".

Bus Dorman, county sheriff, who apprehended the suspects, said the Pampa police notified him at 3:00 A. M. Tuesday morning to be on the lookout for a stolen 1958 Chevrolet. Dorman set up a roadblock and attempted to stop the auto, but the suspects decided to "run for it". Dorman said they were driving about 90 to 100 miles per hour when they lost control of the auto.

## Wheeler County 4-H Livestock Team Is Second In Contest

The Wheeler County 4-H livestock team placed second in the Greenbelt junior breeders judging contest in Childress this past Saturday. Boys composing the team were as follows: Max Shaffer, 227 points, Dean Sims, 225 points, George Harris, 211 points, Bob Hink, 201 points, James Henderson, 197 points and Donald Gandy, 165 points. Max was second individual with 227 out of a possible 250 points and Dean Sims was fourth high individual with 225 points.

Brym Swain, County Agent, said the boys were coming along better this year than they did last year at this time and placed higher in the Childress contest than they did last year when they placed third. All boys except Dean and George are new on the team and with continued practice they should be ready for the district eliminations contest in Amarillo this next week. Swain said the four high boys this week will make the livestock team to go to Amarillo and represent Wheeler 4-H boys this next Wednesday. They are to work breeding stock on cattle, swine and sheep and fat lambs, barrows and steers this week.

Mr. C. J. VanZandt is helping Swain train the team and both will work the boys on reasons at least twice before the contest in Amarillo. At the end of the week the total grades will be added and the four boys with the highest grades will be on the Amarillo judging team for Wheeler County 4-H according to Mr. VanZandt and Swain.

### 'Teaching Taxes' Course Is Popular With Students

The "Teaching Taxes" course offered for high school and college students by the Internal Revenue Service is more popular this year than ever before according to Mr. Davis, Administrator Officer of the Pampa office.

The supply of the "Teaching Taxes" kits furnished to school officials for training students in the basic fundamentals of preparing their income tax returns has been exhausted. The Internal Revenue Service is scheduling a reprinting of this popular course on February 1. The Internal Revenue Service will print sufficient copies to fill orders received by January 15. They will not be able to fill orders received after January 15. Teachers in this area who plan to use the "Teaching Taxes" course this year, and who have not yet ordered their supplies, should do so immediately according to Mr. Davis.

### Employees Are Entitled To Two W-2 Forms

Employers were reminded today that their employees are entitled to receive two copies of a "Withholding Statement," Form W-2, on or before Friday, January 31.

In making this announcement, Wiley Ellaviv, of Internal Revenue Service, Pampa, said, "This Statement shows the total wages paid and the income tax and social security tax withheld, if any, during the calendar year of 1957."

Total wages shown on an employee's W-2 should include amounts received as sick pay from his employer, even though no tax has been withheld on such sick pay. Sick pay is not required to be shown separately.

Mr. Davis stated that if it becomes necessary to correct a W-2 after it has been given to an employee, a corrected statement must be issued and marked "corrected by employer."

### WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The Wheeler Soil Conservation District Board has completed their annual report for 1957. The year was exceptionally good for grass-land conservation. District cooperators seeded 12,693 Acres to grass, deferred grazing on 41,000 acres and properly used 61,000 acres of range. Brush control was applied on 7,249 acres.

District cooperators built 23 miles of terraces on cropland. They also planted cover crops on 14,550 acres and practiced stubble mulch tillage on 1,500 acres of small grain land.

The Board assisted in getting a flood prevention survey started on the Gageby Creek watershed late in the year. This survey will not be completed until late in 1958 or 1959.

One change was made in the Board in 1957. J. M. Mixon of Mobeetie replaced Clifford Walker, also of Mobeetie.

The Board gave special recognition to George Gandy and to the Vocational Agriculture teachers of the District. These men have been looking after district owned equipment. The Board appreciated the time these men have spent assisting with district business.

A combination of the Soil Bank program and good spring moisture resulted in more than three times as much grass seeding as in any previous year. A very high percentage of the seedings have a good stand. Benefits from brush spraying were outstanding this year. A good example of the results can be seen on the Stiles Ranch east of Wheeler.
