This beity might set up a school and twenty towns had as many as 1,- them. 000 population. Any school that could be set up was financially poor and the per capita distribution was fair and just. Now the per capita payment school aid is as out of date as a tallow candle.

Population and industrial investments have concentrated in certain localities. Industrial development, especially petroleum, has multiplied wealth in some comthe scholastic population has increased. A reasonable school tax will bring in several times the average amount of money to operate a school that size. Outside of oil fields, rural schools are little better than they were one hundred yeas ago. Texas has never es. had a school program with any part of it based on the needs of the small schools.

The staff is inadequate in any school if there is not enough teaccher-time for the recitations needed. Texas has never had a program that provided an adequate teaching staff for small schools. Therefore, we have never had a small school program.

I think it is better for rural children to attend rual schools. I think it is bad if the bus time is more than two hours per day. I think there are several small schools in the state that can be consolidated or abolished and say in or near these provisions. Somewhere along the line authority should be given to withhold state aid from a school that refuses to cooperate in improving the school and reducing the cost. Any school that is adjudged justified should have an adequate program. Small schools are more expenseive per student if the state helps finance. The state should help judge the need

of the school. Texas has catalogued a minimum of educational offerings.

There are thousands of children atfoundation schools and receiving far less than that minimum. The state does not have money enough to give what it has promised. Millions of dollars are poured through per capita payments into districts that need

it less or not at all. The Texas Research League gives average operating cost in 1952-53 as \$224 per student. Schools with less than 500 students averaged \$256, and schools with 1,000 or more averaged \$213. The Public School Directory (1955-56) gives Wheeler school average daily attendance as 349 and the tax value as \$1,794,000. A dollar rate will bring in less than \$52 per student. The per capita will leave Wheeler just under one half the average for schools under 500 students. The Directory gives Whiteface in Cochran county, an average daily attendance of 463, tax value \$28,000,000. A dollar rate will bring in \$604.77 per student. More than twice the average cost for schools with less than 500 students. The state adds \$76 for each person of school age whether they go to school or not. Surely there is greater need for approximately \$35,000. Then there is Plemons in Hutchinson county. Average daily attendance 46; tax value \$6,000,000. A dollar rate will bring in \$1,304 per student. According to the book, Plemons teaches only eight grades. Local tax alone is enough for the average cost of a twelve grade school with 234 students. The state pays

\$76 per capita to that district. It will take an act of the legislature to change this condition.
