HALE AIKIN COMMITTEE HAS MEETING

A meeting of the Panhandle Hale Aikin Steering Committee was called Tuesday, Jan. 28, 1958 at Amarillo Palo Duro high school. Practically every county in the Panhandle was represented. Approximately 150 were present. Seven Wheeler County members including president, T. M. Britt were present.

After a delicious dinner the program got under way. Introductory remarks were made by Mrs. W. D. Degraasi. Emmett Harris of the Education Department made a speech on the advancement of science being necessary in our studies but we should not allow other essential subjects to lag—among other subjects was the benefits of American Democracy.

Mrs. J. R. Shackleford spoke on How School Related Organizations May Cooperate in the Hale Aikin Study.

Mr. Elmer Wooten of Dumas, Texas gave a talk on possible methods of approach to study on a county level.

The group was then divided into four study groups for a thirty minute discussion circle. Jesse J. Dyer was assigned to "The Teacher Demand Supply" group by Wheeler County president T. M. Britt. Wheeler County was represented in each group.

Mrs. W. D. Degraasi led "Teacher Demand and Supply" group and stated that plans for further study had been made by the state committee and that they had, or was getting, out questionnaires for the various phases of the study, which would be available early in February.

It was suggested that the County Chairman call a county level meeting at an early date for further study of the problems.

Wheeler County president T. M. Britt authorized secretary Jesse J. Dyer to announce that a meeting of Wheeler County members be called for Thursday February 6, at 7:00 p.m. in the district court room of the Wheeler County court house, Wheeler, Texas.

All members are urged to be present.

E. E. BARNES IS STRUCK BY AUTO IN PAMPA

E. E. Barnes, Pampa, Texas, 71-year-old father of Mrs. Buster Callan and Earl Barnes, both of Wheeler was struck by a car Tuesday while crossing the street in Pampa.

The accident occurred about 2:30 Tuesday, less than a block from the elderly Barnes home. He was enroute to a neighborhood grocery store at the time of the accident.

Mr. Barnes was rushed to the Highland General Hospital where he was treated for bruises and an injured right leg which was broken in two places below the knee. He was reported to be in "good spirits" Tuesday night. The leg was put in a traction Wednesday morning.

A Pampa youth was driving the auto which struck Mr. Barnes. Investigating officers said no charges will be filed against the youth, since it was an "unavoidable accident."

Barnes is a former Wheeler resident and has lived in Pampa for the past 15 years.

Wheeler County was well represented in the Amarillo Stock Show this past week by the following feeders, Nancy Whitener, two calves, Bob Martin, two calves, Frank Walker, one calf, Richard Kiker, two calves and Kenneth MacCasland, one barrow. Nancy Whitener had the highest placing of the Wheeler County 4-H members as she showed her light weight 750 pound, C. J. VanZandt bred calf to second place in the light weight division of Hereford calves.

Bob Martin was second high for Wheeler with the sixth place light weight Hereford calf, also a C. J. VanZandt bred calf, weighing 780 pounds and Nancy was seventh with her other light weight Hereford calf bred by her father Gordon Whitener.

The other calves placed down the line in the medium and heavy classes. Nancy had the highest selling calf from the Wheeler County 4-H in her second place light weight Hereford as it was bought by Mr. Forrest of Canadian for 46 cents a pound. The other calves brought from 35 to 37 cents a pound sold by Wheeler County 4-H members. Kenneth MacCasland and Bob Martin placed third in the 4-H Grass Judging Contest and District One Contest during the Amarillo Stock Show. The boys named the grasses and gave it's characteristics such as annual or perennial, cool or warm growing season, introduced or native, and good, fair, or poor grazing value. This was two of the boys first time to judge grasses. Both were excellent. Bryan Swain, county agent said. Kent was fourth and Don was seventh high individual in the Grass Contest.

The 4-H Livestock Judging team placed fifth in the Amarillo show and third in district contest this past week. Team members are Dean Sims, Max Sheaffer, George Harris and James Henderson. Dean was fourth high individual with a total of 410 points and was beat by three boys tying for high with 411 points. The Wheeler team was second high team in both beef cattle and sheep, but dropped off in swine judging to come up fifth in the Judging Contest.

Wheeler Cub Scouts Win First Place At Exposition

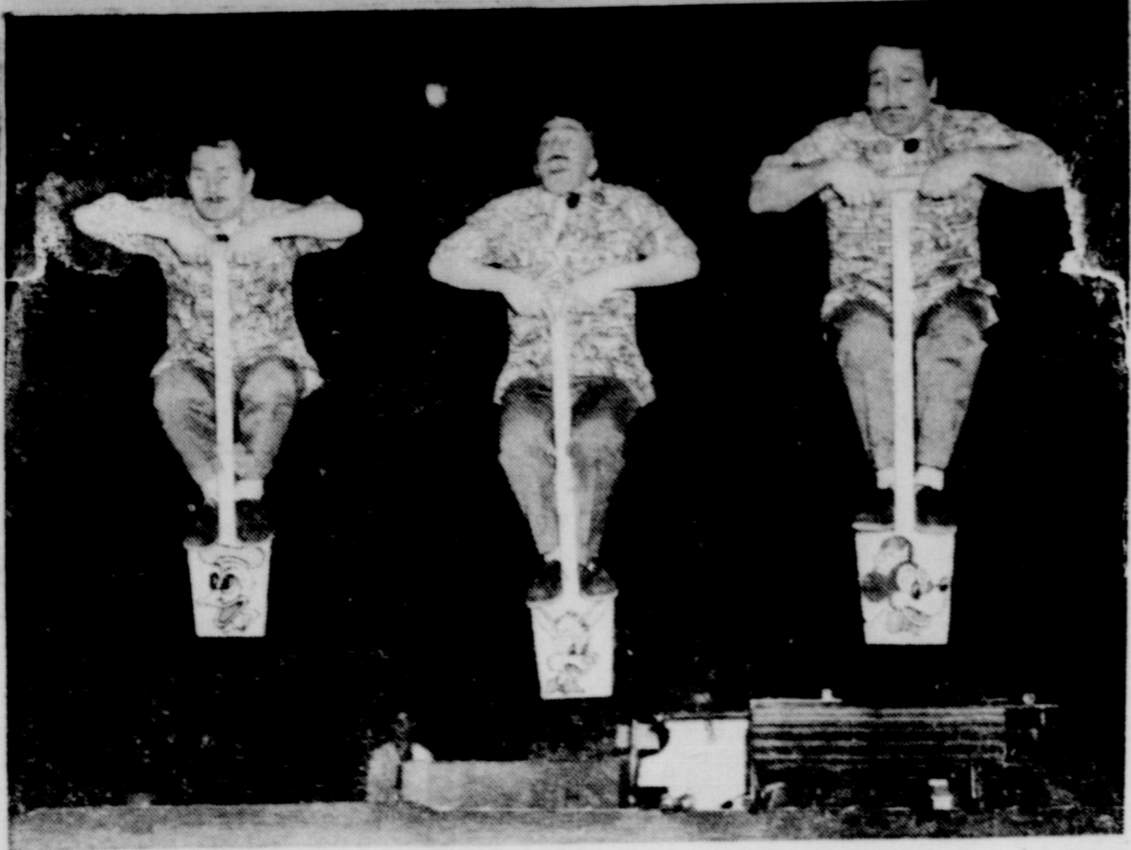
Wheeler Cub Scout, pack 72, won first place at the Exposition in Wellington Saturday on their booth of Indian Craft and Costume.

**Game Commission
To Limit Waterfowl
Hunting to Half Day**

Members of the Game and Fish Commission have been asked to limit waterfowl shooting to a half-day during the next duck and goose hunting season. At a meeting of the Game and Fish Commission at Lubbock last week Panhandle residents asked the Commission to set up North and South Zones for hunting geese during the open season.

It was at this point that Commissioner Henry LeBlanc of Port Arthur suggested the half-day shooting period. He said that ducks and geese are being driven from the coastal area by the increasing gun pressure of all day shooting.

"Our waterfowl must have some place to feed and rest," the commissioner said. "If we are shooting at them from before sun-up until sunset, we'll be driving them away."

Many individual lease holders along the coast already are permitting only morning shooting now, according to the Executive Secretary.

He said that the Central Flyway Committee will meet in Corpus Christi in June. At that time the question of the half-day shooting period will be presented to the committee.

Panhandle hunters said they were deprived of much goose shooting because most of the early geese pass on through going south. Later in the season they become plentiful just about the time the season is closed. They recommended that goose shooting be permitted until the middle of January, the same as duck shooting, or that a split season be ordered.

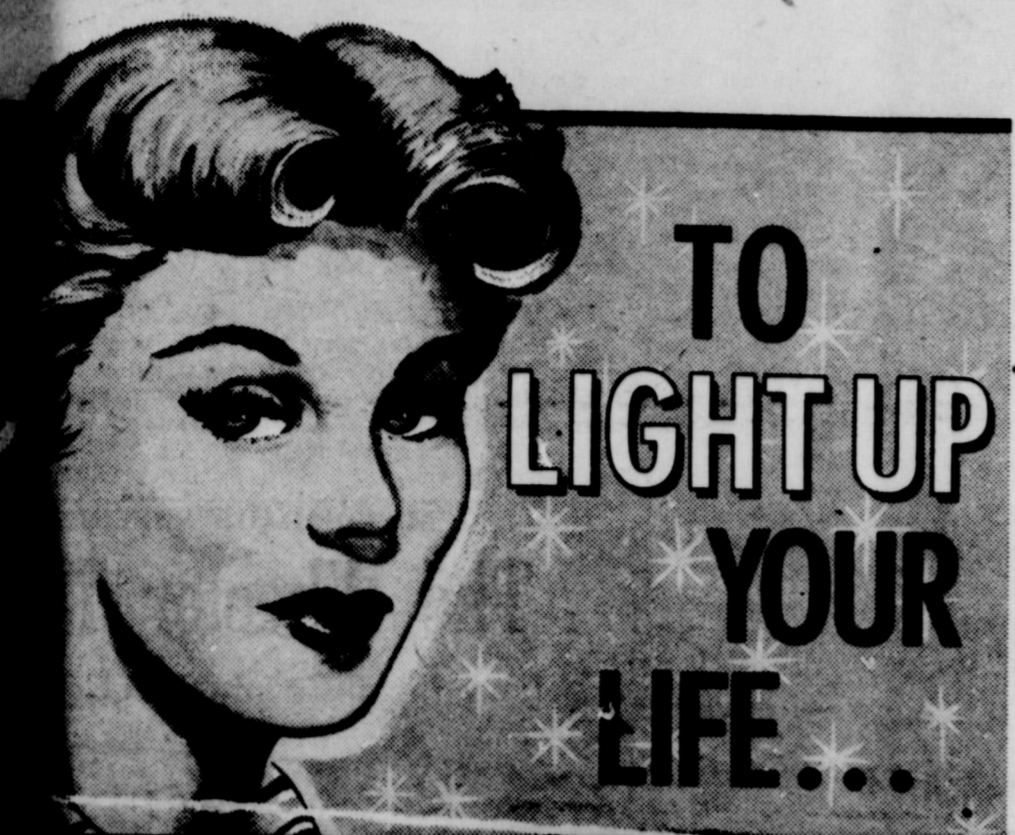

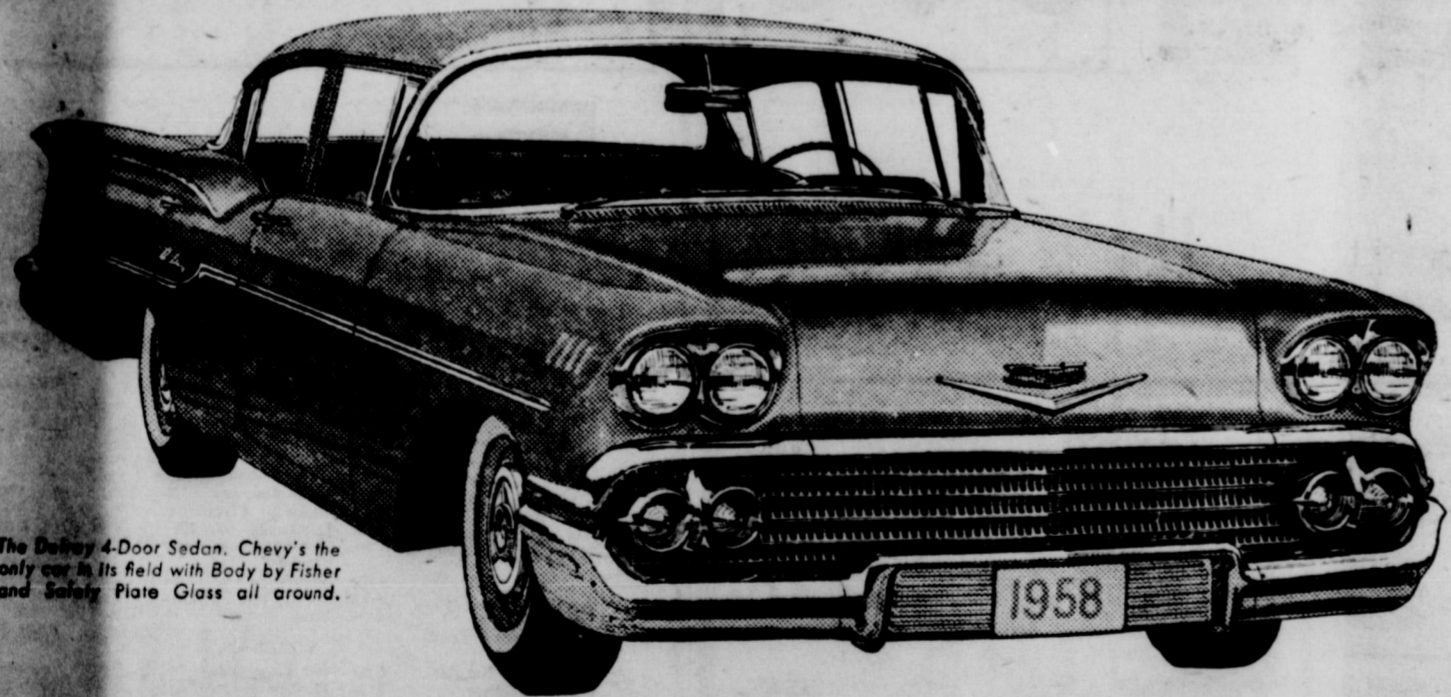

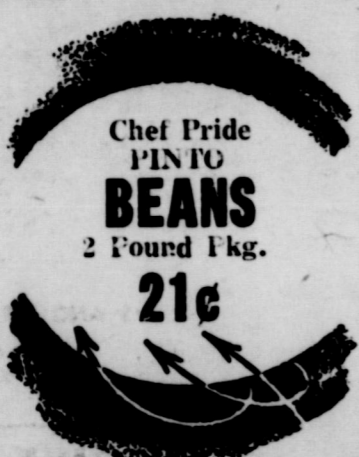

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Wheeler County Soil Conservation District cooperators has started terracing their cropland now that the fall harvest has been completed.

District cooperators constructing terraces are: H. L. Trimble, four miles west of McBeete, Homer McCormick, one mile east of Twitty; John O Boman, one mile south of Twitty; Norbert Schlegel and B. A. Scalegal, four miles west of Shamrock, and L. E. Clay, three miles west and one mile south of Shamrock. Other cooperators are expected to begin soon.

Terraces are constructed primarily to control the gullying and washing of the land by water. They will help conserve the topsoil for years to come so that the land can be kept in production. Terraces will also help increase production by slowing water down so that it can be stored in the soil. Water stored in the soil can be used for crop production, water that runs off your place cannot.

Peggy Shannon Pride is 'Betty Crocker' Homemaker in Wheeler

Peggy Shannon Pride has been named the Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow in Wheeler.

She received the highest score in a written examination on home-making knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating girls in Wheeler Highschool.

Her examination paper now will be entered in competition with those of 6,8 other school winners to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and will also be considered for the runner-up award in the state. For her achievement, she will receive an award pin designed by Trifari of New York.

Each State Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an education trip with her school adviser to Washington, D.C., Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York City. A \$500 scholarship will be awarded the second ranking girl in each state. The school of the state winner receives a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

A record 32,000 young women in 11,800 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools participated in the fourth annual Betty Crocker Search sponsored by General Mills. This year's huge entry brings the four-year participation over the million mark. A total of 1,071,000 girls has enrolled in this national homemaking project since it was launched in 1955 to assist schools in education for home and family living. A total of \$106,000 in scholarships will be awarded this year.

The national winner will be named April 17 at a banquet in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City. The scholarship of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$2,000 for girls who rank second. The girls who rank second in the nation will receive \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

Science Research Associate Chicago prepared and scored the examination through which the state and national Homemaker of Tomorrow are selected.
