## 'THIS IS YOUR RED CROSS' FROM THE CALL RED CROSS WEEKLY

The citizens of Cameron Parish, Louisiana, who suffered such severe losses in life and property last year as a result of Hurricane Audrey, one of the worst tropical storms ever to hit the Gulf Coast, have oversubscribed their 1958 Red Cross quota, and in the face of adverse economic conditions, gave their chapter 83% more money than ever before.

The Red Cross campaign in Cameron was held during the last two weeks of February in order that the residents could dramatically demonstrate to the nation their appreciation for the help the American people gave them through the American Red Cross.

The attitude and feelings of the people of the Cameron area toward ARC can be seen in the experience one solicitor had when he called at the home of a trapper only to find he was "on the line." The solicitor left word of the purpose of his visit, and that night the trapper walked four miles to give the solicitor his Red Cross contribution.

## WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The Wheeler Soil Conservation District needs more waterways. Many farms have a problem with water from adjoining farms or have long terraces or diversions with no place for the extra water to go. Heavy rains produce runoff that must go somewhere.

One of the most satisfactory types of waterway is a natural drain. Bob Seeds has a waterway of this type east of Kelton. It was made by converting an old gully into a Johnson grass meadow. In addition to disposing of the water without damage, it makes a good hay crop even in dry years.

Norbert Schlegel has converted an old land between two pastures into a waterway on his place west of Shamrock. The land was well grassed. It was much easier and quicker to fence off a new lane than it would be to seed a new strip of land to grass for a waterway. The same strip should not be used for both since cow trails will form gullies.

Usually, land in a waterway can be used for pasture or hay. In any case, excess runoff must have a place to go. Soil Conservation Service personnel will assist farmers in the design, layout and checking of waterways. The ACP and the Great Plains Conservation Program both offer cost share assistance for construction.

March 16 through the 23rd is National Library week. If you want your child to read books, in his pre-school years read books to him. Help him learn to read by placing good books before him. Reading like music is catching. You have to love it yourself in order to pass it on.

Have you paid for your 1958 car tags? The Tax Collector Office reports they are running about 75 tags behind last year. Davy's second wife was a Texan. A statue of her was erected at Acorn, Texas, and an unknown but enterprising lad, a William Tell, no doubt, shot her nose off - that is, the nose off the statue. I wonder where she was when the Alamo fell?

Ed Henderson who has been raising cotton for forty-three years in this vicinity says he has seen only two hard freezes on the cotton in all that time. One occurred in 1927, and the other in 1957. The rains came last year and washed the cotton out. With some re-planting a lush crop was coming on.
