CHAPMAN IS IMPRESSED BY CROW PROBLEM

More than 30 interested farmers, and ranchers attended the crow eradication meeting held at the courthouse last Friday.

Bryan Swaim, county agent, coordinated the program which was held for the benefit of Charlie Chapman, chief of the quarantine division of the Texas Agriculture Department, who was on hand to determine the amount of material, supplies and money needed by local men to curtail the crow problem.

A crow bombing which had been previously scheduled for the benefit of Chapman was postponed due to unforeseen circumstances, however later in the evening Chapman was taken to a crow roosting area and witnessed literally "millions of crows" as they came to roost.

Any doubt as to the seriousness of the crow problem was quickly erased as he watched the crows returning to their roost in Wheeler.

Chapman said he would take emergency measures if necessary to quickly get aid to area farmers and ranchers.

Technical Problems Slows Work On Community Television

Several setbacks have been experienced by the Wheeler T. V. Company in getting the T. V. signals properly adjusted on the new community television lines. Guthrie said, "This was caused by technical difficulties beyond our control, and also by the freakish weather conditions the past week." However, he feels that most of the trouble has been overcome, or at least detected, and that service will reach normal shortly. And for this reason, Guthrie pointed out that no one will be charged for the time they may have been tied on to the system during the month of February. Everyone who has been connected during this month will be billed as of March 1, and all prior to that will be "on the house".

Practically all the steel lines are now strung, and with another week or two of working weather the system should be almost completed. It is expected that during the ensuing week that channel 5 antennas will be erected, along with other refinements of the transmitters which will put each channel on a "crystal" and prevent any possibility of any interference to the general public.

Jimmie Cockerham Is Doing Nuclear Research Work

KIRTLAND AFB, N. M. — Airman First Class Jimmie D. Cockerham, USAF, son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Cockerham of Burleson, Texas, and husband of the former Miss Peggy L. McCracken of Box 192, Alanreed, Texas, is doing bomb and navigation systems maintenance work in the Air Force program of nuclear research and development at Kirtland AFB, New Mexico.

The Air Force Special Weapons Center at Kirtland (part of Air Research and Development Command) coordinates research, development, and testing to provide nuclear-carrying capability for USAF bombers, fighters, rockets, and missiles. Largely through the Center's work, nearly all front-line USAF air vehicles can deliver nuclear weapons to defend the U. S. against aggression.

AFSWC also evaluates personnel hazards involved in development, test, and use of nuclear weapons, and it provides support to the Atomic Energy Commission in continental and overseas nuclear tests.

Airman Cockerham is assigned to the 4924th Armament and Electronics Maintenance Squadron and he maintains and repairs bomb and navigation systems on B-36 type aircraft. His squadron maintains all bombing systems, turrets, fire control systems, automatic pilots, and fusing and firing systems of the 4925th Test Group (Atomic). The 4924th also performs special weapons handling, loading and storage.

The 4925th Test Group (Atomic) conducts tests, fly-arounds, and drops to determine ideal nuclear weapons shapes and compatibility of special weapons with Air Force systems of delivery. This unit also provides aircraft and crews to support continental and Pacific nuclear tests.

Cockerham reenlisted in the Air Force Oct. 11, 1956, after prior service began in 1954. Before joining the service, he attended Alanreed high school in Alanreed, Texas. His in-service training includes completion of maintenance training for K-series bomb and navigation systems at Lowry AFB, Colorado. The Cockerhams have two children, Gary Lynn, 3, and Cynthia Anne, 21 months.

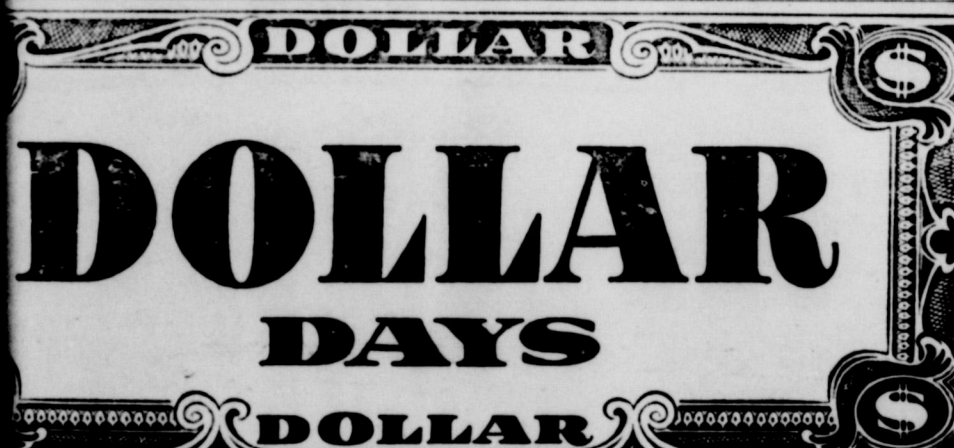

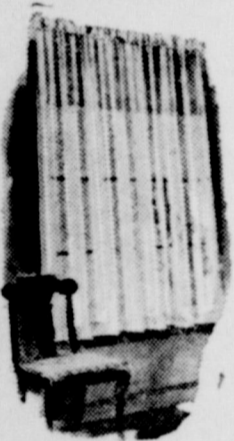

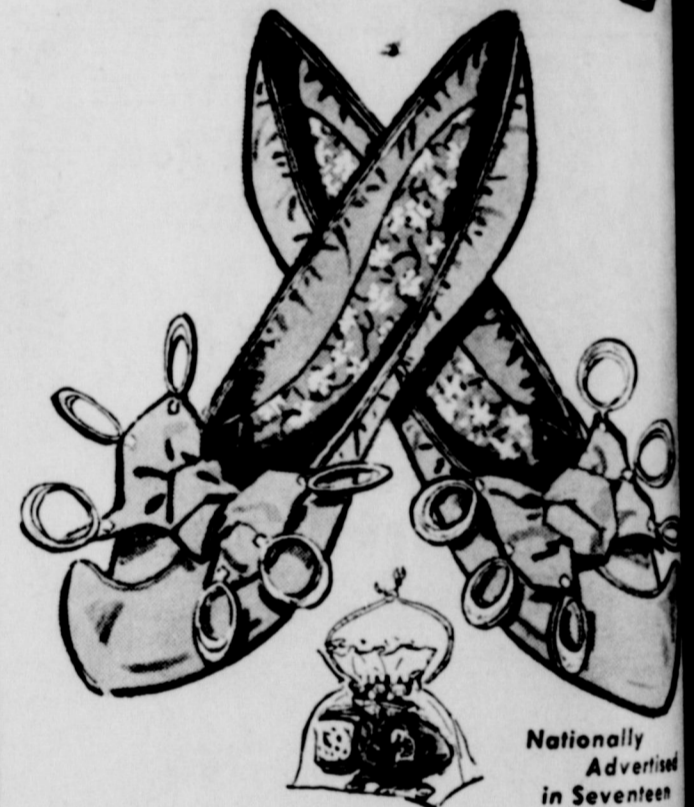
