Wheeler Countians Take Top Honors

CLAY FOOD BURGLARIZED; LOOT IS RECOVERED FROM OKLA. YOUTHS

Three suspects have been apprehended according to Bus Dorman, county sheriff, in connection with the burglary of Clay Food Store in Wheeler last Friday morning.

Randall Duren, 18, Willard Farrow, 14, both of Purcell, Okla. and Lavon Austin, 18, of Lexington, Okla. were arrested in Lexington, early Friday morning after Pampa police phoned the city marshal of the small Oklahoma town to be on the look out for the trio who were suspected of robbing a gas station in Pampa.

Burglary charges have been filed against the youths by Dorman. Duren and Austin are being held in the county jail at Wheeler, while Farrow is being held in Norman, Oklahoma.

At the time of their arrest the boys were driving a 1954 Oldsmobile and pulling a two wheel trailer. The Oldsmobile was borrowed from a friend.

Only two dollars was reported missing from the Pampa Filling Station, but several hundred dollars in silver and merchandise was taken from Clay Food Store.

Following is a list of items which police recovered from the boys auto.

Colt 38 caliber pistol, 40 records, 2 cartons of cigarettes, 11 T-shirts, pipe tobacco, 23 pair of socks, shaving lather, dental cream, underwear, samsonite luggage, razor blades, shaving kits, cookies, and many other small items. The police also found a Wheeler First National Bank money bag which contained \$118.65 in silver in the car.

A check by Dorman revealed that Austin was on suspended sentence and had been convicted of more than 20 burglaries in the Norman, Oklahoma area.

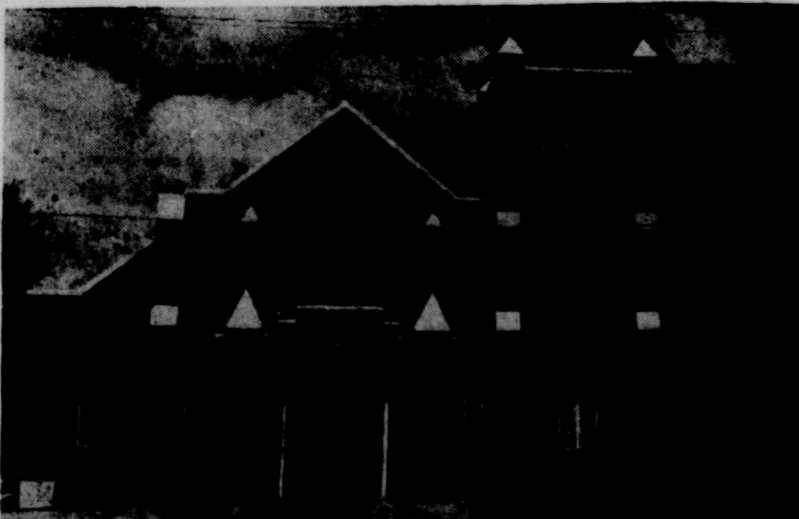

Sunday, March 16, the Wheeler Methodist Church will dedicate the Sanctuary in which they have worshipped since 1953. The structure cost \$45,000 when built and the last payments on the indebtedness were paid March 1. Methodist Churches are not dedicated until they are debt free.

Bishop William C. Waid Griffin, now pastor of the Spearman Methodist Church, and was completed in October, 1953, under the ministry of Rev. O. A. McBrayer, now pastor of the Wesley Methodist Church in Borger. Rev. 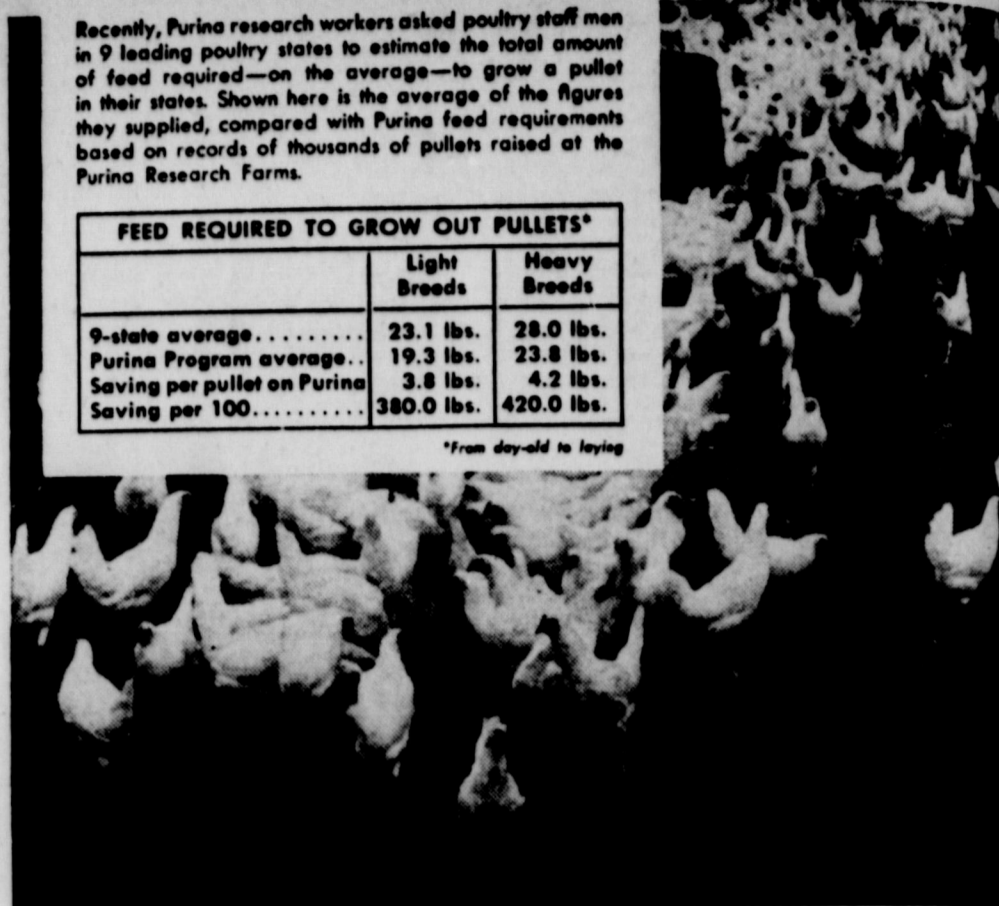
