SAUNDRA MEEKS WINS GOLD STAR AWARD

Saundra Meek was recently awarded the highest honor that a 4-H'er can win in the county, that of Gold Star girl of Wheeler County for 1957.

Saundra has been in 4-H for seven years, and is a Junior at Briscoe High School. She was co-chairman of the county 4-H council for 1957 and attended the district 4-H Camp held near Canyon. She was also a member of the District 4-H Council.

As one of the group of six from Wheeler County which won district in leadership, Saundra attended the state leadership laboratory at Bastrop where she received special training in recreation and leadership.

In the County dress review she won second place and went to the District review as an alternate. All the girls were featured on the double trouble T. V. show.

As Wheeler County Bake Queen, Saundra entered her baked products in the Tri-state fair, and attended the 4-H Youth day program where Governor Daniel spoke, and presented each Queen with her prize.

Saundra also won first place in the District in individual leadership, based on her records. She always enters the local fairs with her baking, sewing and canned products. She won second place in the Wheeler County Fair, and first place in the Shamrock Fair in total points won in girl's division.

Wheeler School Enrollment Shows Substantial Increase

There has been a substantial increase in enrollment in the Wheeler Schools over the 1956-57 figures, principals reports for the six-weeks period ending Feb. 27, 1958 indicate. The enrollment now is 385 compared to 367 on the same date last year, and the average daily attendance has increased from 352 to 366.

This rate of attendance will include 15 classroom teaching units again sure the school an assignment of for the 1958-59 school year under the state minimum foundation program, according to A. E. Brown, superintendent of schools. However, Mr. Brown pointed out that the senior class is 28, the largest in a number of years, and only about 20 beginners are shown by the school census for 1958-59. Unless more children of school age move to Wheeler, the attendance for the next term might fall low enough to cause a loss of one teaching unit for the 1959-60 school term, he said.

One Man's OPINION

Efforts to sell the American way of life to other citizens persistently bog down in the difficulty of definition. The inspirational phrases by which we describe our institutions are beyond the comprehension of those who have never known a country where no one is too small to have a voice and no one is so big he doesn't have to listen.

This lack of understanding does not result because foreigners are stupid or Americans are inarticulate. Visitors from other shores who see our system at work get the idea readily enough.

The reason is that descriptions are made of words while the American way of life is made of actions. Some of these are individual actions, but, for the most part, true progress comes when many minds and hearts and purses are joined for the common good. In the field of community betterment, all advance must necessarily come that way. Even in this country such joint effort is seldom spontaneous. Few men with good ideas have the time, the patience or know how to build the civic organization needed to bring better schools, better traffic movement or better living conditions to their towns.

Fortunately in most towns today no man with a sound objective need go it alone. Fellow townsmen (who are alert) and dedicated to community progress are as close to him as his chamber of commerce. There he will find sympathetic hearing for his plans.

MOBEETIE TO GET NEW DIAL TELEPHONES

The start of construction on a new building to house Mobeetie's future modern dial telephone equipment was announced today by R. L. Brewer, District Manager for the General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

The letting of the contract has been made to Commercial Contracting Co. by the Company, Brewer said. Construction began March 1, 1958.

Brewer said the new unattended dial equipment that will be housed in this new building will bring to Mobeetie the most modern telephone facilities, permitting the customer to dial directly to the desired numbers, without the services of an operator. This will permit a much more rapid completion of local calls.

Before the cutover to dial operation, new telephone numbers will be assigned to all Mobeetie customers, said Brewer. This is known as the "2L-5N" numbering plan, where each telephone in Mobeetie will have the two letter prefix of "VI", followed by five numerals. The new prefix will assign this city to the national designation plan, and nowhere else in this area will the combination VI 5 be found.

At the present time completion of the new building is planned for March 19, said Brewer. The date of the cutover to dial operation tentatively is planned for June 4, 1958.

Fire Department Has New Life Saver Fire Jackets

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department received four "body guard" bunker coats this past week. Two of the fire coats were purchased by the fire department and two by the city, according to R. J. Holt Jr., Wheeler fire chief.

Holt pointed out that "each time our men answers a fire alarm their life is at stake, but with these new "Life Saving" coats the odds for being severely burned or even killed are greatly decreased". They also protect the firemen from chill during the winter months Holt said.

The coats cost \$28.00 apiece and can be seen at the First National Bank in Wheeler. Holt pointed out that any city firm or individual wishing to contribute toward the purchase of additional coats for the department would be greatly appreciated.

Lee Roy Reeves Wins S. M. U. Scholarship

Lee Roy Reeves, superintendent of schools at Mobeetie, has been selected as one of thirty participants in the summer institute in science and mathematics at Southern Methodist University.

His tuition will be paid by a tuition scholarship provided by the National Science Foundation. He will also receive a stipend of \$425.00, plus an allowance of \$85.00 for each dependent. A travel allowance equal to a single round-trip ticket at the rate of four cents per mile from his home to the institute will also be paid.

The purpose of the training is to better acquaint area teachers with the coming atomic and jet ages. Classes will begin June 4th and continue through July 10.

Wheeler Struggles To Maintain School Lunchroom

There has been a drastic decrease in the amount of meat furnished the Wheeler school lunch room during the current year, an analysis of a report prepared by school officials shows. During the first six months of the 1956-57 school term, 2563 pounds of hams, luncheon meat, pork and gravy, turkey, and frozen hamburger was received, while during the first six months of the current year, the only meat received was 330 pounds of hamburger.

Other food items show a similar decrease. Only 29 cases of canned vegetables and fruit have been received this year, compared to 42 last year, and 100 pounds of dried beans compared to 700 pounds. Also, during 1956-57, there were 270 dozen eggs and 324 pounds of lard, while none of either item have been received this year.

Local school officials have been informed that no more meat will be available this term, and that the only items in plentiful supply are butter, flour, cheese, corn meal, dried eggs, dried milk, and rice.

Local school officials say that these conditions are the main causes of the deficit which has been piled up in the operation of the school cafeteria. They point out that as a result, an increase in the charges for meals was necessary. At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees, Thursday, March 6, it was decided to continue operating with the present prices with the hope that the deficit may be partially made up by the close of the school term.

The ball games sponsored by the Wheeler and Kelton PTA's brought in \$133.49 which has been added to the lunchroom account. School officials expressed appreciation to the PTA officers and members for this much needed help. It is hoped that it will not be necessary to close the lunch room, as it provides a much needed service.

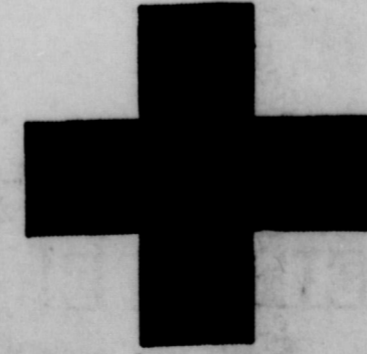
The North-South game will be played during the 26 annual coaching school which will be attended by practically every coach in the state. L. W. Boynton, Wheeler Coach, will attend the school.

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Grass planting time is here again. Results of last years plantings were good. In fact they were the best of any year the district has had. Excellent stands may be seen everywhere. Jess Moore has some very good weeping lovegrass east of Wheeler. W. E. Weeks has some good sand lovegrass southeast of Wheeler. Joel Gooch has switchgrass and sideoats grama on his farm southwest of Shamrock. Plantings of native mixtures on Clem Hamilton's place northwest of Shamrock and on E. Ray Miller's place north of Mobeetie are quite promising. These should be fine pastures in a year or two.

The Soil Conservation District supervisors still have the grass drills located at the same places as last year. There is one with the Vocational Agriculture teacher at Briscoe, Mobeetie, Wheeler and Shamrock. In addition, Marl Jacob has one at Wheeler and Milan Mertel has one at Pagan. Several farmers in the District have drills that may be rented.

Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the district will be glad to help farmers in any way possible with their grass seeding problems.

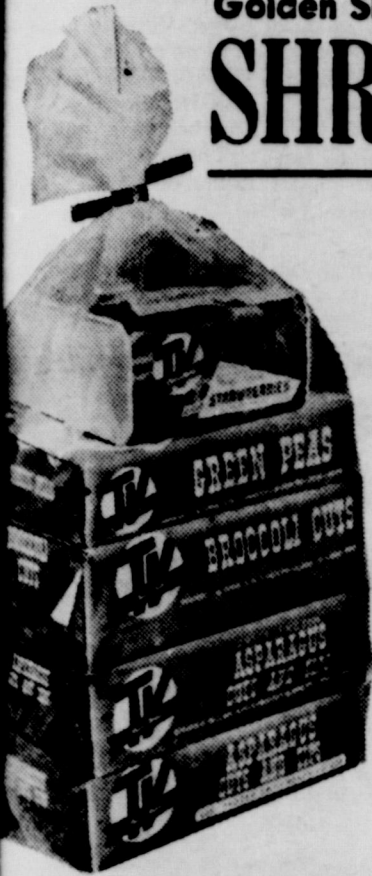

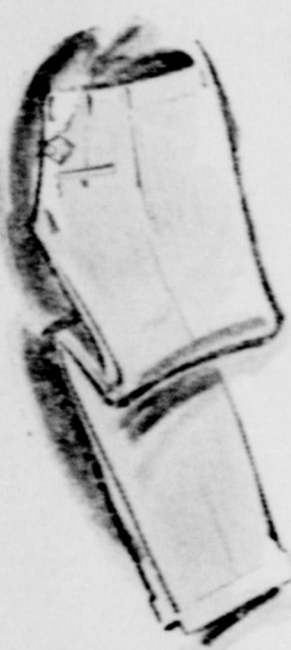

SOIL BANK PAYMENTS AND S. S. CREDIT

By Albert Marshall

According to a notice from the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, Social Security credit for self-employed farmers is based on net earnings from self-employment. To count, the net earnings must be \$400 or more in a year. Acreage Reserve and Conservation Reserve payments made under the Soil Bank program to farm operators should be included in determining the amount of a person's net earnings.

Farm rental income, including rentals paid in crop share, does not count for Social Security, unless (1) the arrangements between the landlord and the tenant-operator provides for the landlord's participation in the farming operation; and (2) the landlord participates materially in the crop or livestock production on the rented farm. The share of the Acreage Reserve or Conservation Reserve payments received by a landlord for placing his rented farm in the Soil Bank counts for Social Security only if he is a materially participating landlord.

Therefore, an individual is subject to payment of the self-employment tax if his net earnings from self-employment are \$400 or more. Soil Bank payments received by farm operators and materially participating landlords must be included in determining the amount of the net earnings. Where the net earnings are \$400 or more, the self-employment tax must be paid.

Soil Bank payments that count for Social Security may affect the right of a Social Security beneficiary to receive one or more of his monthly benefits, the explanatory notice also states. Under the retirement test, a beneficiary may earn as much as \$1200 in a year and still get benefits for all months of that year. If earnings exceed \$1200, then under certain conditions a part of the benefits may be withheld.

Farmers who have questions regarding the relation between Soil Bank payments and Social Security are urged to get in touch with their County ASC Office for further available information.

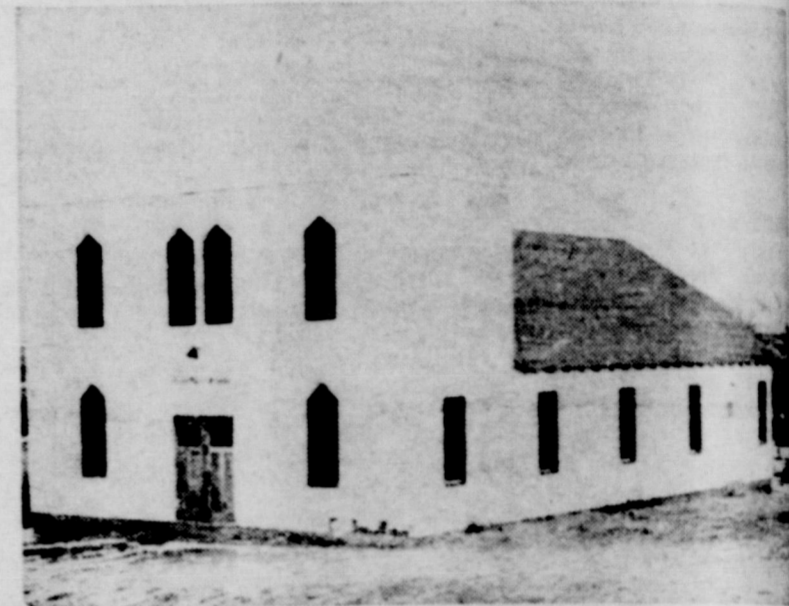

FELLOWSHIP

Much can be said concerning this subject, but in brief it is the commonwealth of any place. To the non-christian it is the community and the nation wherein he lives and usually is limited only to his present environment. To the Christian, fellowship carries a great deal more meaning. To him it is salvation, the salvation of the soul wherein it is the Christian's chief desire to have fellowship with God. Man beginning with Adam lost his fellowship. As a result, he searched for thousands of years for a way to return to this fellowship. Some sought for it in the worship of idols and other items which could be made with the hands. Some sought for it in nature and in the heavens above, thus becoming worshipers of a creation rather than of the True and Living God. And then some sought for it in the revelation of God; for these found favor in the sight of God and to them God gave the right to find this fellowship but only on the terms which God stipulated. In the beginning God commanded obedience to His will which is righteousness unto sanctification. Rom. 6:19. A Christian's righteousness is not of himself but of God. His sanctification is of God and by Him alone; for there is no salvation other than through Christ Jesus. Salvation is fellowship with God, and fellowship with God requires obedience. A man may be a good moral citizen, but what does it profit a man if he forsakes the commandments of God? Does this not condemn his soul? Or again, will any one according to the Scriptures other than God's elect, this is the Christians, be saved? If so then how is it consistent to say that Christ died for the church? Or again, if Christ died for every soul, apart from faith, then why be a Christian? If one can be a Christian and not attend the services of the church, then why is the commandment given to attend? See Heb. 10:23-31. Fellowship with one another is essential unto the fellowship with God. If a man will not have fellowship one with the other, he can not have fellowship with God by whom we receive salvation. For fellowship is the manifestation of Love. I have heard this statement from many: "There are hypocrites in the church is the reason I don't attend." and such other excuses upon the lips of faithless "church sometime attenders." Isaiah spoke concerning our generation as well as of the generation in which Christ was born: "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me". Isa. 29:13; Matt. 15:8. Unless we return to the Lord with all our power and love, will we not be cast off as were the Jews who would not believe on Christ? Read the following passage: Rom. 11:7-27.

A summary of the matter is this. (1) Fellowship is essential to salvation. I John 1:3-7; 2:3-3:24. (2) Fellowship is Love. Col. 2:2. (3) Fellowship with God is only in obedience to his will. I Jn. 1:3-7. (4) Fellowship is essential with God for the peace of mind. Jn. 8:32. (5) Fellowship is the manifestation to the world that God is our Father and that Christ is our Lord. Jn. 1:1-12. So let us stand firm in the faith which was once and for always delivered unto us.

Most small town chambers of commerce are criticized for not bringing in industries but the critics are not properly informed as to what it takes in work, time, and money to sell an industry the idea that they ought to pack up and move into their town.

Here are some of the musts that you have to have or you had better have before inviting an industry into your town, an adequate supply of electric power, which we have, an ample supply of natural gas and or coal as must meet the needs of some particular industries, an ample supply of the right type of labor, and you must have an over supply of the most needed of all natural resources, Water, and then, in all probability you will be asked as to the adequacy of the town's sanitation system. You may be asked to forget taxes for say a five year period, you may be asked to send a delegation to California as was McLean, or to Chicago or New York or Pittsburgh to present your facts and figures, as to why it would be to their advantage to come to Wheeler.

Because of better roads and changing times and conditions some small towns are going to die. Will Wheeler be one of them? Wheeler is losing its most costly investment: Its young people, who have to leave town to find a better job after the town has spent thousands of dollars on their education.

Wheeler County has fewer and fewer farm jobs, but industry in Wheeler could keep those jobless farmers at home - Industry would mean better paying jobs all over town - How does Wheeler look to strangers? Would its appearance appeal to an industrialist? Developing industry takes time, desire, work, and money. Industry is moving to Texas, and Wheeler should prepare to put the welcome mat out. Wheeler County is getting less and less of its share of Texas' rising income. Wheeler County has more low-income families than the state average and fewer high-income families. For small towns like ours, it is the chamber of commerce which must lead the fight. So some of you like Wheeler just the way it is? Even a good town needs a good selling job. The drought proves that Wheeler can't go on betting on the weather (depending solely on an agricultural economy). Industry would bring new problems but would build a better town. Business men, who pay a big portion of the taxes, can't build a town people want if sales continue to decline. Citizens can help by knowing their town and giving it a boost. A community worth living in, is worth improving.

Lets get away from selfish motives, quit bickering, get together, talk over the towns problems and get to work. Bro. Yarborough reminded us at the Kiwanis luncheon Monday that you are not going to have anything handed to you on a silver platter you have to work, slave and sweat for what you get and because of these requisites, you will enjoy your labors all the more.
