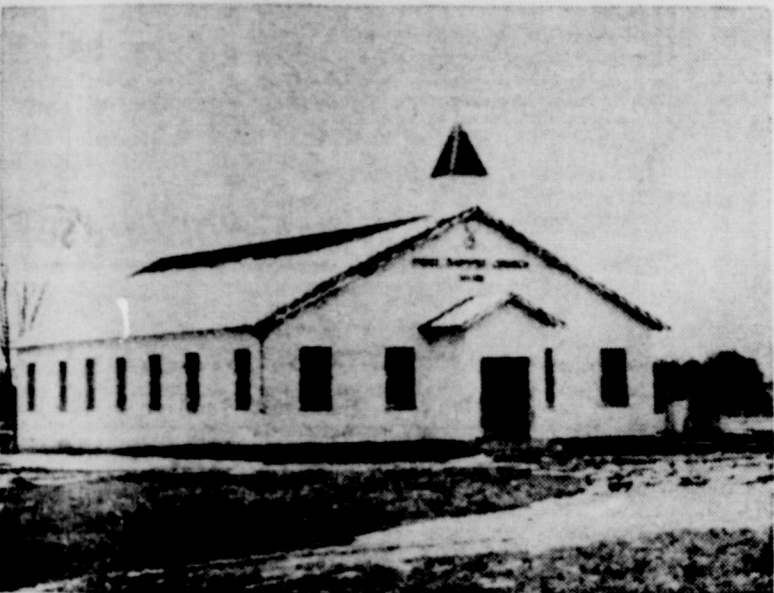

THE MESSAGE OF THE EMPTY TOMB

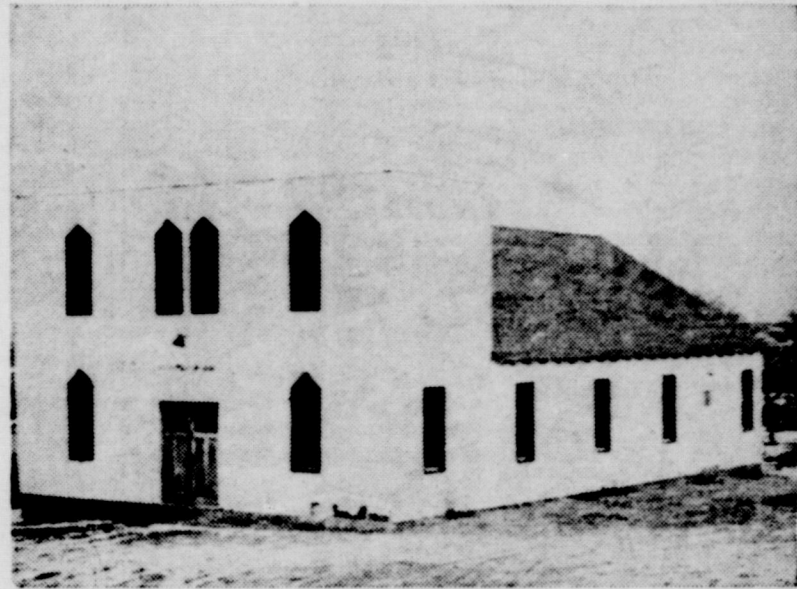
As we come to the season we call Easter, our thoughts go back across the centuries, and we visit a garden in which is a new tomb. This tomb had sheltered the body of one named Jesus. He had lived a unique life. Gathering about Him a small group of followers He had taught them that He was God's Son, come to redeem a lost world. In doing this He must die, and be buried, but He would rise from the death.

His followers had watched as He died on the cross. They saw His limp body taken down and placed in the Sepulchre. This bewildered and confused them. Their faith was in an eclipse. However, drawn by love and devotion to Him, the women visited His tomb early in the morning the first day of the week. As they approached they saw that the stone was rolled away from the door, and looking in they found the tomb empty. An Angel sitting by and knowing their fear spoke to them these significant words: "He is not here; for He is risen, as He said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay." (Matt. 28:6.)

This empty Sepulchre is a fundamental doctrine of Christianity, an absolute essential as a foundation of Christian faith. The fact that the body of Jesus was not there means this one thing: His Resurrection. Actually Jesus had staked everything on this. During His ministry He repeatedly asserted that this would be the only sign given. If He did not rise He had failed. Without resurrection, death would be complete defeat, and repudiation. Jesus died to make possible the redemption of the world, "and was raised again for our justification." Death and resurrection are a perfected plan of salvation. The empty tomb assures the world that Jesus was all He claimed to be.

The Resurrection of Jesus gives assurance of the existence of a future life. Men of all ages have asked the question voiced by Job 14:14: "If a man die shall he live again?" Jesus gives the answer in John 5:28-29. "For the hour is coming in which all that are in the graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation." Again He said to Martha, John 11:25, "I am the resurrection and the life."

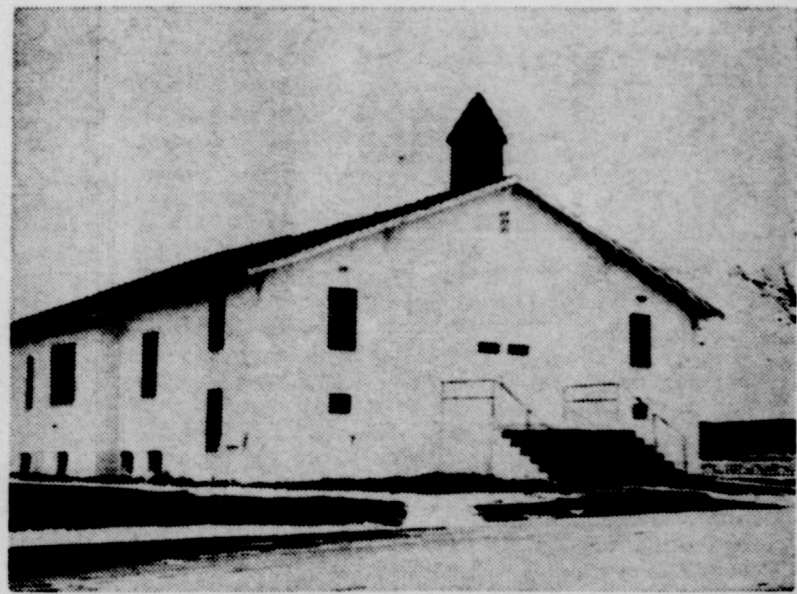
The resurrection of Jesus assures the ultimate triumph of the Christian. Jesus said in John 14:19 "Because I live, ye shall live also." In Romans 6:25 Paul says "For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall be also in the likeness of His resurrection." The victory of Jesus is the victory of all those who believe in Him. The deep longing of the heart of every Christian is complete freedom from all evil, and a life of perfection. Jesus gives assurance that we will realize this hope when He spoke to His followers these words, John 14:2-3. "I go to prepare a place for you, and if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." The earthly life of Jesus closed in triumph. He was dead, but is alive forevermore. "But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." 1 Cor. 15:57.

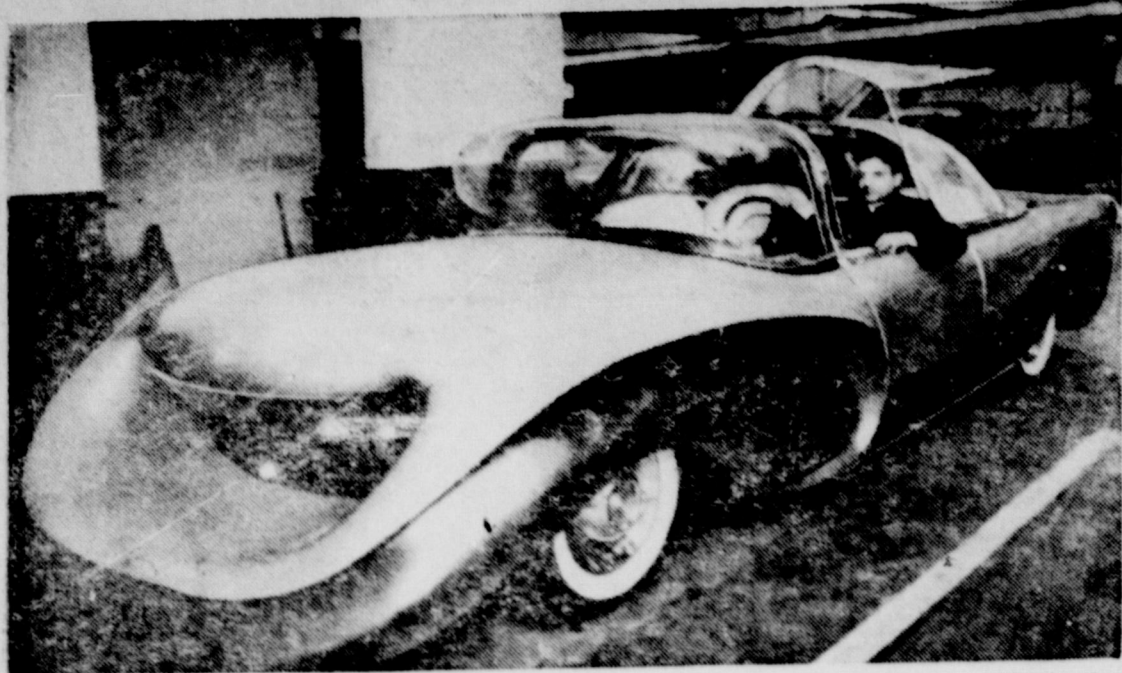

Self-Employed Must Have Tax Return to File For Social Security

Self-employed people who are planning to file claim for social security benefits should bring copies of their 1957 tax return, including their Schedule C or Schedule F, plus a money-order stub, Internal Revenue receipt, or other evidence that the return was filed, according to John R. Sanderson, District Manager of the Amarillo Office of the Social Security Administration. The original of this return should be filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue.

Sanderson pointed out that it is expected that many self-employed persons who have reached retirement age, 62 for women and 65 for men, will retire or limit their activities this year and apply for their social security benefits. He emphasized that the self-employed applicant's claim will be processed much sooner if he presents a copy of his income tax return, along with evidence that it has been filed with the Director of Internal Revenue.

Most people self-employed in a trade or business were covered by social security beginning with 1951 provided the annual net earnings are \$400 or more. Net earnings from self-employment as an architect, professional engineer, accountant or funeral director, are covered by the Law for taxable years ending after 1954. If you are a self-employed lawyer, dentist, osteopath, veterinarian, chiropractor, naturopath, or optometrist, your earnings for taxable years ending after 1955 will count toward social security benefits. The self-employed farmer is covered by the Law for taxable years ending after 1954, if his net earnings from self-employment are \$400 or more in a year.

If you desire more information relating to old-age, survivors and disability insurance you should contact your social security district office in Amarillo.

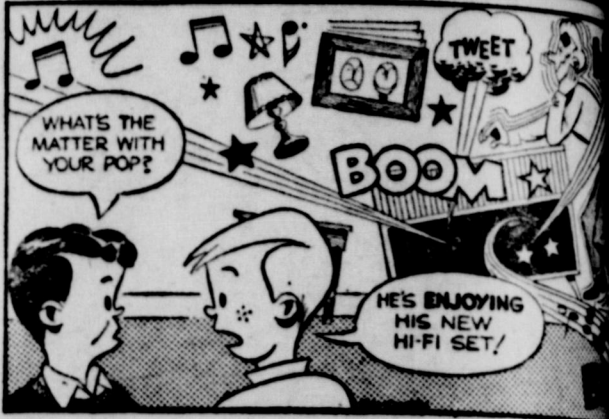
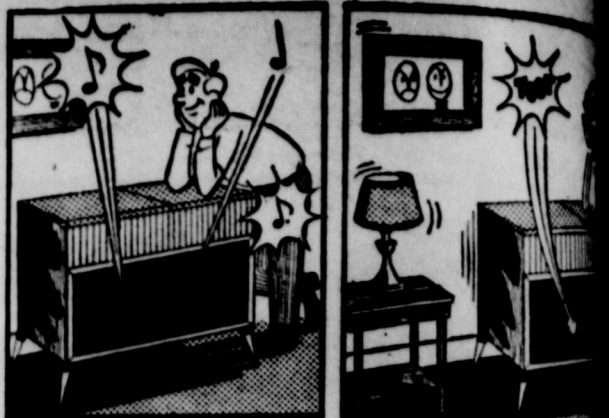

The hygrothermograph records changes in temperature and relative humidity which are known to be important factors in the development of tornadoes.

Information will be channelled to the Fort Worth Regional Office of the Weather Bureau for examination and local use and sent on to Washington, D. C., for scientific analysis. The success of the program will depend to a great extent on the endeavors of the co-operative weather observers who give much of their time and effort without personal recognition.

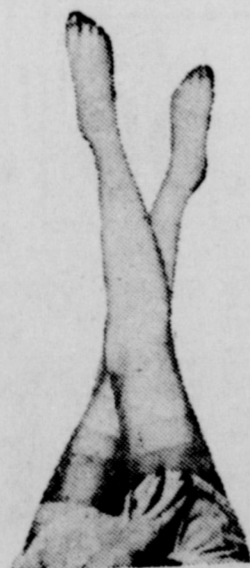

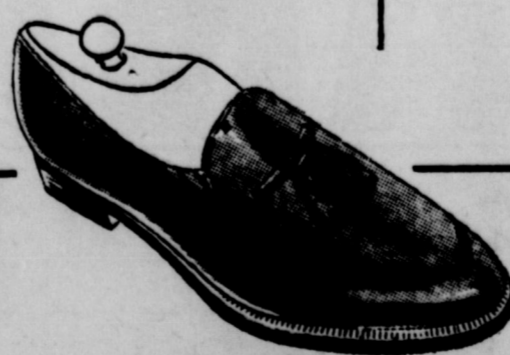
