KIRK REPORTS WEATHER DATA IN ALARM SETUP

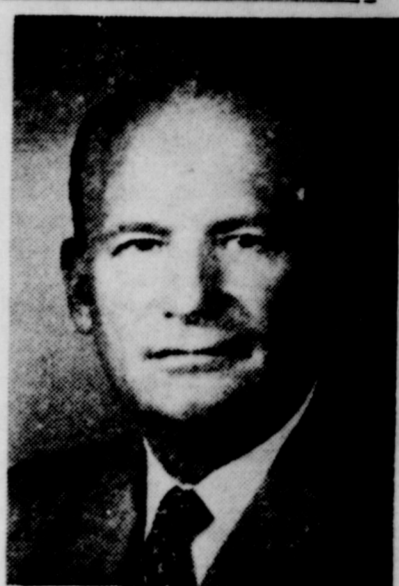

BRUCE PARKER SEEKS DISTRICT JUDGE POST

Bruce Parker filed Saturday for a place on the ballot in the July 26 Democratic Primary for Judge of the 31st Judicial District of Texas.

Parker, county judge for eight years, said he was seeking the promotion on a platform of integrity, qualification and experience.

Parker has held public posts for 12 years in Gray County. He was elected county attorney in 1944, served for four years and was elected county judge. He held that post four years, was out two years, and has been county judge again for the last four years.

Parker lives with his wife, Wilsie, and three daughters, Phyllis Ann, 16, Pamela, 8, and Debora Kay, 5, at 1202 E. Browning in Pampa.

Judge Parker came to Gray County in 1930, after graduating from the University of Texas Law School and has lived in Pampa since that time.

He has 16 years experience as a practicing attorney.

He says, "I have served for 12 years as county attorney and county judge and am now asking the voters of Gray County and the other counties (Roberts, Wheeler, Hemphill and Lipscomb) of the 31st Judicial District of Texas to promote me to district judge.

This is Condemnation, that Light has come into the World and men love Darkness rather than Light because their deeds are Evil. John 3:20.

Condemnation is the state of being condemned and feeling condemned. It is also a deplorable state that is self induced. Christ does not condemn us. We bring condemnation upon ourselves. That is exactly what the Bible says. Christ specifically says, "I came not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved."

We bring condemnation upon ourselves when we shut God out of our lives. And this is not difficult to do. It is often done by pre-occupation of our minds. In the parable of the Sower Jesus speaks of certain soil being unproductive because it is covered with weeds and briars. The most precious thoughts our minds can contain are thoughts of God. And anything which filling our minds keeps him out is as weeds and briars in comparison to Him. "Nothing is worth the making if it does not make the man," Mr. Pope, the poet, tells us.

Let us not make the mistake of letting the light of Easter fade from our experiences. Of course we are busy. But he who is too busy for Christ, too busy to nurture his Christian life, too busy to make room for Christ is too busy, period. And we bring condemnation upon ourselves when we allow it to happen. To be truly Christian means to be alert. Condemnation is the penalty for our failure to be alert.

**Merritt Is Chairman
Of Posture Week**

Appointment of Dr. C. C. Merritt of Wheeler as city - county Correct Posture Week chairman for this area was announced today.

His appointment was made by Dr. C. E. Henley of Amarillo, regional chairman for this area.

He is one of several hundred chairmen who have been named to direct Posture Week activities, May 1-7, in nearly 300 Texas cities and towns.

This will make the seventh straight year that the Texas State Chiropractic Association has sponsored the observance of Posture Week in Texas.

The purpose of Correct Posture Week, the sponsors said, was to stress to the public the importance of good posture and good health and the relationship of the spine to good posture.

A survey recently completed shows that at least 75 per cent of the people have imperfect distribution of weight between the right and left sides, the regional chairman said.

"Imperfect body balance is conducive to many nerve irritations and strains," he said. "For correct body balance the spinal column must be a straight line between the base of the skull and the pelvis, and true body balance must be preserved in order to avoid unnecessary nerve irritations."

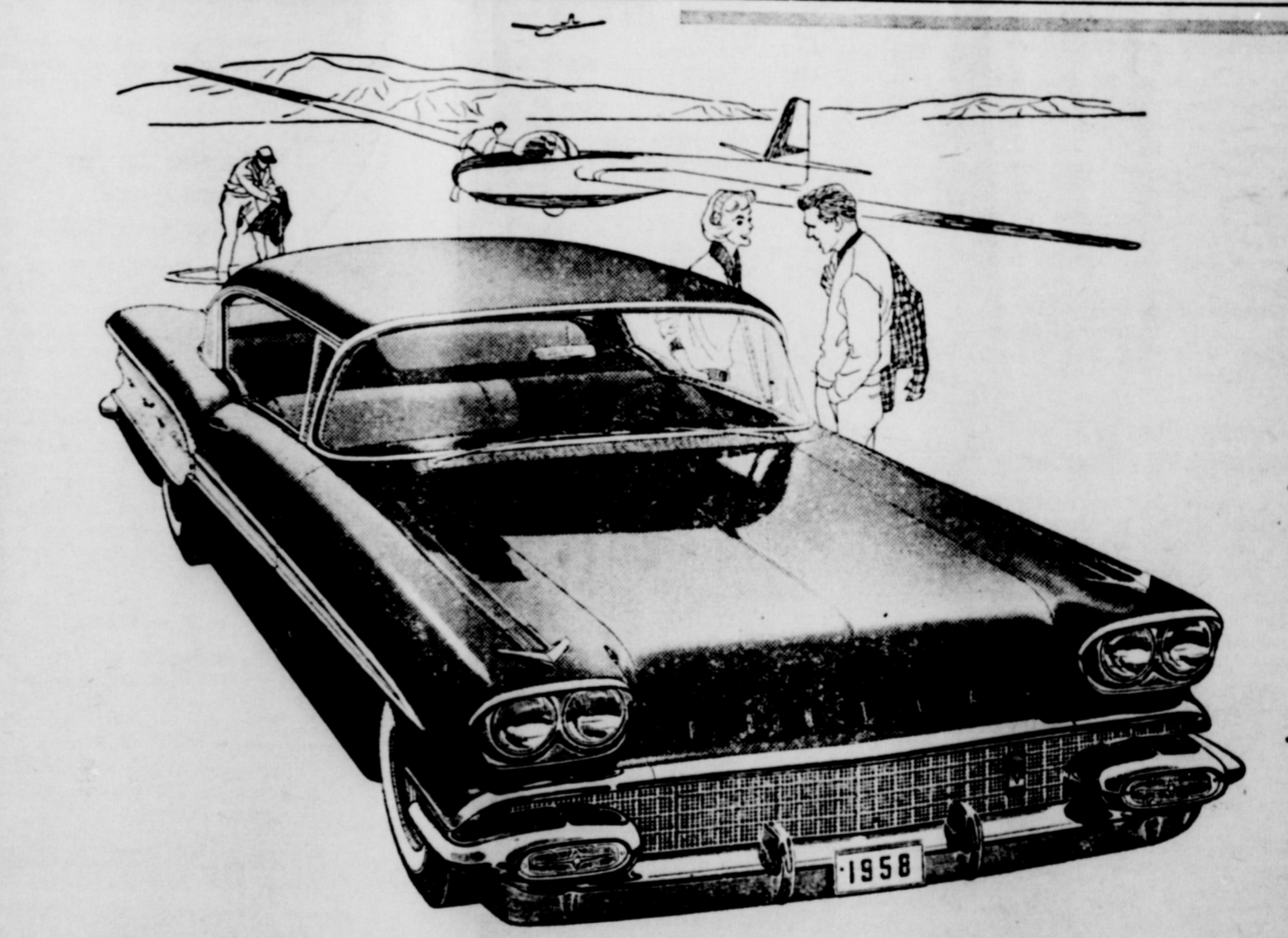

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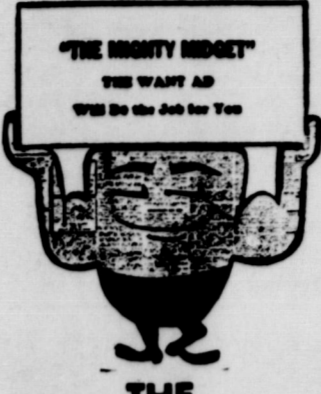

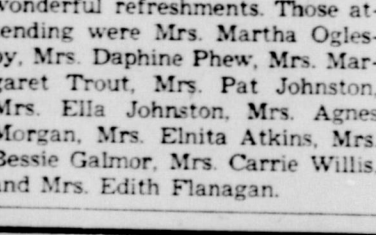

BAPTIST TO ORDAIN DEACON

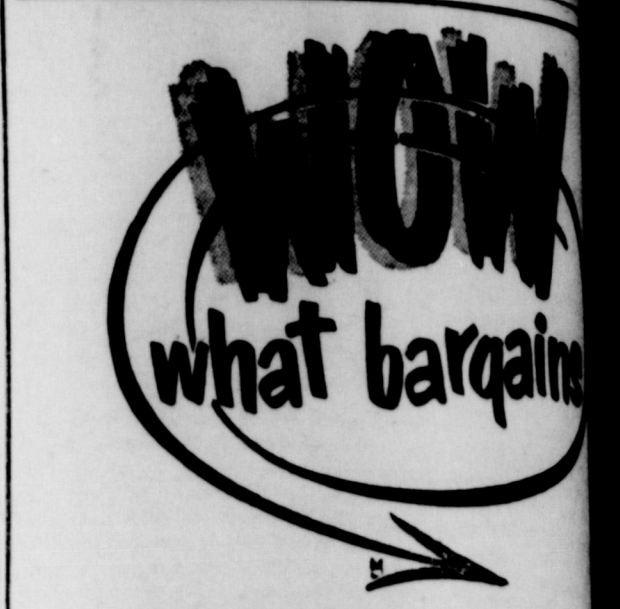
The First Baptist Church of Wheeler plans to ordain five deacons Sunday, April 13, according to Rev. Frank Ross, pastor of the church.
