**Cheyenne's New Convalescent Hospital Opens Sunday, June 1**

Cheyenne's new 35 bed Convalescent Hospital will be officially opened Sunday afternoon, June 1, between 2 and 4 p.m. The entire public is invited to attend the open house activities and inspect its facilities.

This one-story hospital is the most modern hospital of this type established in this part of the country, being completely fire-proof with complete air conditioning and central heating in every room.

In addition to the wards, which accommodate 3 to 5 beds either private or semi-private rooms with appropriate bathroom privacy, are available to the patients. The bath rooms are styled of ceramic tile in pleasing color arrangements. Each room is handsomely furnished with colorful fixtures.

Recognizing the need for this type of installation, and a new trend in hospital care for the chronic diseased and convalescent the management of the Cheyenne Convalescent Hospital has planned appropriate recreational facilities for patients and guests. In addition to a TV and game room, the hospital provides an outdoor patio and recreational area.

The persons who pioneered Western Oklahoma's first such venture, Dr. Frank K. Buster, the medical director, Glen F. Crane, business manager, and Joe Frank Mosd, planned the physical location for the Cheyenne Convalescent Hospital for the convenience of its patients. It is located within walking distance of churches and other parts of town and is adjacent to the city's general hospital.

A registered nurse will have general supervision of the hospital which is equipped to care for any kind of convalescent or geriatric patient.

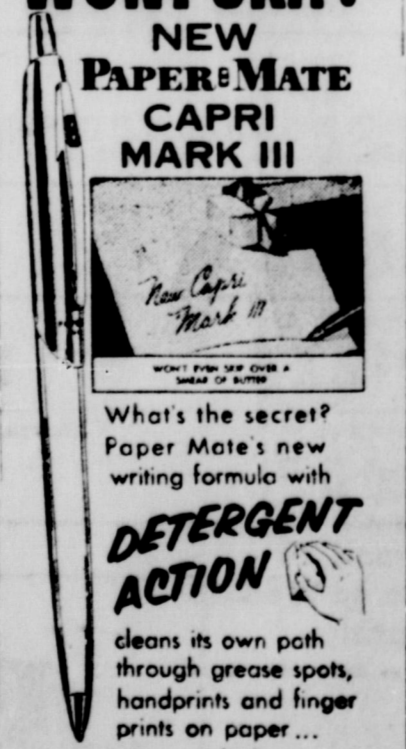

### DOROTHY BOYNTON WILL CONDUCT TWIRLING SCHOOL IN WHEELER

Dorothy Boynton has announced that she will hold a twirling school from June 2 through June 20 this summer. The classes will be held Monday through Friday from 2:30 to 4:00 at the High School Gym. There will be a free Public Recital held Friday evening June 20. There will be a fee of \$7.50 for the three week baton course. There will be extra classes in flag spinning, rope spinning, fire baton twirling, novelty dancing and strutting offered. Due to the added materials needed there will be an additional charge of \$2.50 for these courses (as a whole not individually). Thus the charge for the complete course of everything offered will be \$10.00. All interested pupils and their parents are asked to be present for registration of the course held Sunday afternoon June 1 at 3:00 p.m. The course will be explained at this time. There is no age limit to the pupils. Pre-school age as well as school age, male as well as female, are invited to attend. Also pupils from the surrounding area schools are welcome. If there are interested pupils who do not have a baton please contact Mrs. Boynton or the band director. Mrs. Boynton is quite qualified as she was a majorette in the Midwestern University Indian Marching Band for three years. At the time of her participation this band was honored as Gov. Shivers' official band through the Texas Legislature as the Official Band of the State of Texas. This band attended Gov. Shivers' Inauguration in a body. They took a 2 week tour each year with its stage musical show, "The Cavalcade of Melody." One year the band toured Colorado to Denver and the other two years the band toured Texas to Dallas and on to Houston. Mrs. Boynton was a member of the novelty dancing organization known as the Cavalcade Cadets. She has an outstanding record during high school. Receiving a total of 14 twirling medals. She holds 9 First Place or Superior ratings and Certificates with one of them being a Superior Double Plus which is one of the highest known ratings. It was given her for a baton solo performed before Judge Buddy Postelthwaite of Arlington State College. She also holds 5 Silver of Excellent medals or certificates. Both her junior and senior years she was chosen the outstanding twirler at the Altus band festival. Her senior year she was chosen one of the outstanding Oklahoma majorettes. She has attended numerous twirling schools and contests in Texas and Oklahoma. She studied under Bill Allen, from University of Florida; Charles Scott of University of Tulsa; Buddy Postelthwaite, Arlington State College; Tom Britton, University of Oklahoma; Pewee Crupler, University of Arkansas; Norma Kniffin, Sequine; Joyce Godwin, Orange, Tex.; Floyd Zarbock, Michigan State and Bruce McCaeron, Midwestern University. She holds a standing in the Vandercook School of Music, Chicago, Illinois. She wants to offer some of this specialized training to the young people of our community. ### DO YOU KNOW - -

THAT in the spring of 1919, amidst complete devastation, the poppies bloomed in abundance on the battlefield of France, where so many of our men had fallen in battle and that a replica of this poppy has become in Memorial Flower of The American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary? THAT the American Legion was the first national organization to adopt the poppy as its Memorial Flower, having taken this action at the National Convention in Cleveland, Sept. 27-29, 1920? THAT the American Legion Auxiliary adopted the poppy as its Memorial Flower at its organization convention held in Kansas City, in October 1921? THAT at the time the American Legion Auxiliary adopted the poppy it pledged the Poppy Day contributions 100 per cent to welfare for service men and women and their families, thus fulfilling the true meaning of the poppy emblem of faith, faith which is being kept with all who died through service to the living? THAT the American Legion Auxiliary in order to protect the memorial poppy from the inroads of commercialism, adopted a national poppy program at the St. Paul Convention in 1924 which eliminated commercial poppy? THAT the memorial poppies are made of red crepe paper, by hand by disabled veterans in hospitals and poppy workrooms in forty states and that the workers receive pay for each poppy made, the material being furnished free by the Auxiliary Department in the state in which the hospital is located? THAT the more than 25,000,000 poppies made by the disabled veterans are distributed on the streets under supervision of the American Legion Auxiliary on Poppy Day by approximately 125,000 volunteer workers who receive no compensation? THAT through the American Legion Auxiliary poppy program more than \$300,000 is paid annually to needy and disabled service men and women for making the poppies? THAT all contributions given to American Legion Auxiliary poppy workers go entirely to aid needy war veterans and children of veterans? THAT the public is given an opportunity each year to help the great work of the American Legion Auxiliary as well as opportunity to pay tribute to all who died in service, by wearing a poppy on Poppy Day?

New Face of the Old South  
I have just returned from a convention of the National Federation of Press Women at Jackson, Miss. This is an organization of women writers and publishers. It was organized separately from the men because in the men's press clubs, the women almost never got to be the president. And as any husband will tell you, women will do nearly anything to get elected president of a club! Aside from that, women do things differently from men. They are strong on charities, and education. Sometimes they are actually kind to one another despite the rivalries and jealousies among themselves. This is especially true of Press Women because they have been trained to write the truth and nothing else; so they are more democratic and less snobbish than any organization to which I have ever belonged. This is true of the Texas gals. It is true of the Mississippi women, and I'm sure it is true for every state that was represented.

three days. And she took notes eagerly in detail. Mississippi rolled out the red carpet for this little writing wren. All the banquets, breakfasts, and dinners were for free. The hosts over-ferd her but made sure she wouldn't get sick by passing a long cotton-pickin' sack filled with loot which included a box of Milk of Magnesia pills. She also received: a miniature bale of cotton, a Negro Mammy doll, a towel, a bottle of starch, a bottle of deodorant, cleaning fluid, a woven basket, numerous other items, and enough literature on the South to keep her reading steadily for a year. Door prizes were the custom. This reporter won: one throw - rug worth about \$12, 2 pairs of nylon hose, and 2 quarts of pickles. Laura V. Hammer was there and passed out literature on her new book, LIGHT AND HITCH. We helped Laura into several taxi cabs. One of these took her to the Governor's tea. After the tea we went on a tour of the city. There I saw my other Texas friends. "Where is Miss Hammer?" asked Eva Bartlett of San Antonio. "I hope nothing has happened to her," said Florence Eosl of Schulerberg. "Nothing has," I assured them. "I left her with Governor J. P. and Mrs. Coleman." "Osie, you didn't!" "Yes, I did. The Governor and Deolce Parmelee of Amarillo are cousins. She will have a nice visit with the Governor; as Deolce is one of her favorites, then the Governor will put her in a cab and send her back to her hotel." This was exactly the way it happened. The Governor lives in an old mansion of ante-bellum decor, with high ceilings and ornate antique furniture. And people go through it every day; as they would a museum. The Governor himself is a tall, kindly man who must have the patience of Job and the dexterity of a tight-rope walker. The theme of the convention was "The Role of a Free Press in a Changing World." And all the way through, the speakers (several were men) hued to this line, some with wise-cracking and jokes, and others with great seriousness. Joe Ellis, Editor of the Clarksdale Register, made it clear that the fight to maintain a free press is a fight for the survival of our system of government and our way of life. He pointed out that the newspapers of Europe are subsidized as organs of one political party or another. This could happen here! Wagfish Stella Keith of Flagstaff, Arizona said, "He means we go home and report honestly for liberty!" A few "blows were struck for liberty" too. There were perhaps a few less than two-hundred women at Jackson. Each woman represented her state organization. Texas had fourteen. ### Hemphill County Is The First to Receive Right-of-Way Payment

CANADIAN, TEXAS — Hemphill county last week became the first in the state to receive right-of-way payments from the State Highway Commission for highway right-of-way purchased under the new 50-50 Right-of-Way bill passed by the last Legislature.

Several other counties in the Panhandle district have contracts now being processed, and are scheduled to receive cost-sharing right-of-way payments as soon as final details are worked out, according to Pete Styner, district right-of-way engineer.

Among those slated to receive payment are Deaf Smith, Randall, Potter, Armstrong, Moore, Gray, and Hutchinson Counties.

Styner came to Canadian to make a formal presentation of a \$9,163 check to Hemphill County officials. A special meeting of the Commissioners Court, with County Attorney William J. Jackson, who had assisted with the contract work, present was called by Hemphill County Judge E. C. Fisher to receive the check.

"All of the Commissioners, the County Judge, and the County Attorney should be complimented," Styner said. "They have been most cooperative and we really appreciate it."

Styner presented a letter from Charles W. Smith, District Highway Engineer of Amarillo, who wrote:

"I am sure you will be interested to know that Hemphill county is the first county in Texas to be reimbursed under the new 50-50 right-of-way law. We feel that this accomplishment is due to the cooperation and hard work of the representatives of Hemphill county, and we wish to express our sincere appreciation for your efforts. We feel your method of handling the right-of-way acquisition was very efficient and a saving to Hemphill county and to the state.

The payment covered purchase of right-of-way for new construction on U. S. Highways 60 and 88 southwest of Canadian.
