ARMY WORMS MOVE INTO WHEELER AREA

Questions have been coming in from all over the county on how to control worms and grasshoppers according to Bryan Swain, County Agent.

Swain said the Army Worm could be controlled with a spray of Toxaphene and DDT (4 lbs. and 2 lbs. per gallon) at the rate of land 1/3 to 2 qts. per acre. Probably the next best thing would be DDT (2 lbs. per gallon) at the same rate as the two one mixture.

Grasshoppers may be controlled best by a spray of Aldrin or Dieldrin at the rate of 1/2 to one pt. per acre in crops that can be sprayed, but where a garden is concerned it probably would be better to use a bait such as: 400 lbs. bran, 16 lbs. sodium fluosilicate, about one qt. syrup and enough water to make a crumbly material. This should be put out early in the morning and new bait applied every three days until control is reached.

Swain plans to attend the district 4-H camp at College Station and will not be in his office this week. However, he pointed out that area farmers should be on the look out for army worms in their hay, cotton, gardens and other green growing plants.

KIWANIS SUMMER RECREATION PROGRAM IS UNDERWAY

Summer Recreation Program sponsored by the Wheeler Club and open to any in the area got off to a start Tuesday evening. Of there are a few kinks that ironed out as the heat of summer progresses, but Wheeler has a good group of enthusiastic and competent adults so it looks like an enjoyable summer for those who like ball playing and who like to have good clean fun in the town.

There will be three leagues of teams - one for girls' softball, one for boys' softball and one for three teams of boys who were in grades one through three. This league is called the Tee Wee League. Teams will play twelve games during the summer. Standings of teams will be kept as well as batting and pitching records.

The Little League, boys in grades 4 through 8 last term, each will play two games each week. The schedule is set up for Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday nights and covered the ball games.

In this league, too, and reported weekly in the Times. Each team in the three leagues has two efficient, adult coaches. In the baseball leagues, each team has points with which to buy new players. THE ABUNDANT LIFE.

Many of us seem inclined to take for granted the benefits offered to us by the community in which we live. In fact, many of us are not fully aware of the good things we are receiving and we have very limited knowledge of all that is involved in the creation and maintenance of these services. Of course, we pay for some of these things, but in many instances we are not required to pay on the basis of real values. Eliminating everything for which we pay, there are numerous remaining benefits available to us. It seems that there is an inclination to expect these benefits and privileges without any awareness of the attending responsibilities, and oftentimes without gratitude. The point is this: All of us owe a debt of cheerful service to our city.

Most of us can find some useful way to serve the community in which we live. We can serve as individual citizens, as members of organized groups, and by a constant realization of and expressed appreciation for the service that others are giving. 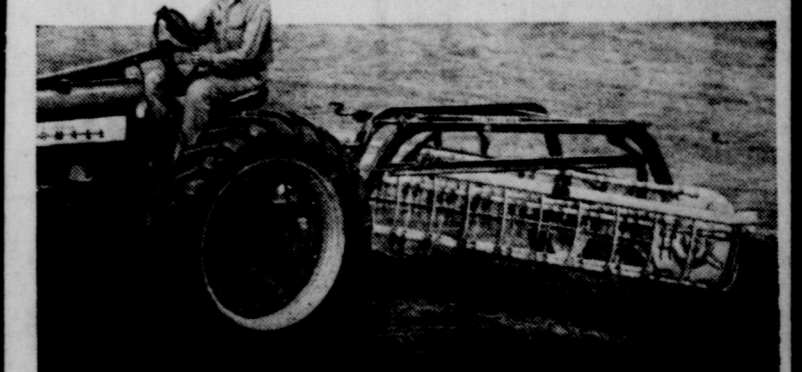

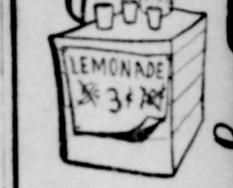

"The good old days, those were the days that I could master; the pace was slower, and I was faster." Many middle-aged people in our country are retired today with nothing to do; so it is with us, the Wilsons. We still awake at the crack of dawn as we did during the years that we lived on a ranch. So if the author of this column seems like a gadabout, she is one.

Yesterday we went to Amarillo, Canyon Goodnight, and Clarendon. We were interested in Colonel Goodnight's old home. It is located half-a-mile west from the Conoco Station on Highway 287 that skirts the town of Goodnight. The house is well preserved and belongs to the Hedgecock Estate in Amarillo. 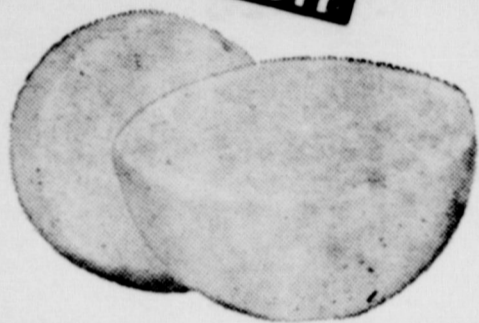

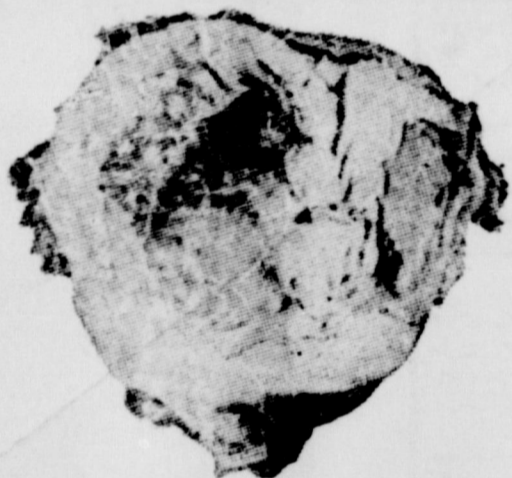
