





Get Rid of Ball Fast After Tagging Runner

Here is one thing to remember when you tag a runner. Tag him in almost the same motion you get the ball and then get rid of the ball as fast

Pop flies and pop fouls can take many a pitcher out of a jam and the shortstop who can master these plays will belp his team greatly.

Size up a pop fly right away and if you think you can catch it, yell for it at once. If you can't take it, holler for either the left fielder, the center fielder, the second baseman or the third baseman to make the play.

This is one of the phases of the game that requires con-stant practice. If the sun is shining brightly, the shortstop should take all pop flies back of third base because he comes in for the ball at an angle and the sun won't get in his eyes as easily as it does the third baseman's.

Another difficult play for a shortstop is the play at home plate with the infielders in close on the grass. The shortstop and second baseman play a trifle deeper than the first and third baseman. A sharply hit ball should enable the shortstop to cut off the run at

On a slowly hit ball, the shortstop may find it impossible to get his man at home and it is always best to remember to make the play at first base and retire at least one man. A late throw to the catcher could lead to a big inning and affect the result of the game

Our Pirate catcher and I used to have a signal for a pitchout to catch a runner sleeping on second base. We used it successfully against the Giants early one year.

The next time it backfired. at third base and when the runner got to second base, I gave the signal to the catcher. Out of the corner of my eye, I saw McGraw moving about more and more in the coaching box.

The catcher threw the ball and just as the ball left his hand, the runner on second dashed for third. McGraw had detected our signal.

Later, we met the Giants again and the same situation cropped up. I signaled the catcher and glanced at Mc-Graw. He was showing unusual activity in the coaching

This time, however, the catcher bluffed the throw to second. The runner started for hird and the catcher fired the ball to the third baseman and we had the runner out with plenty to spare.

We crossed up McGraw by changing the signal which he had previously stolen.

Almost every play on the liamond involves the shorttop-a pitched ball, thrown pall or a batted ball. A good shortstop must always be ready for any emergency and must be alert. He must be smart. And he must possess the natural equipment to play the position.

If he is all of these, baseball will be good to him.
