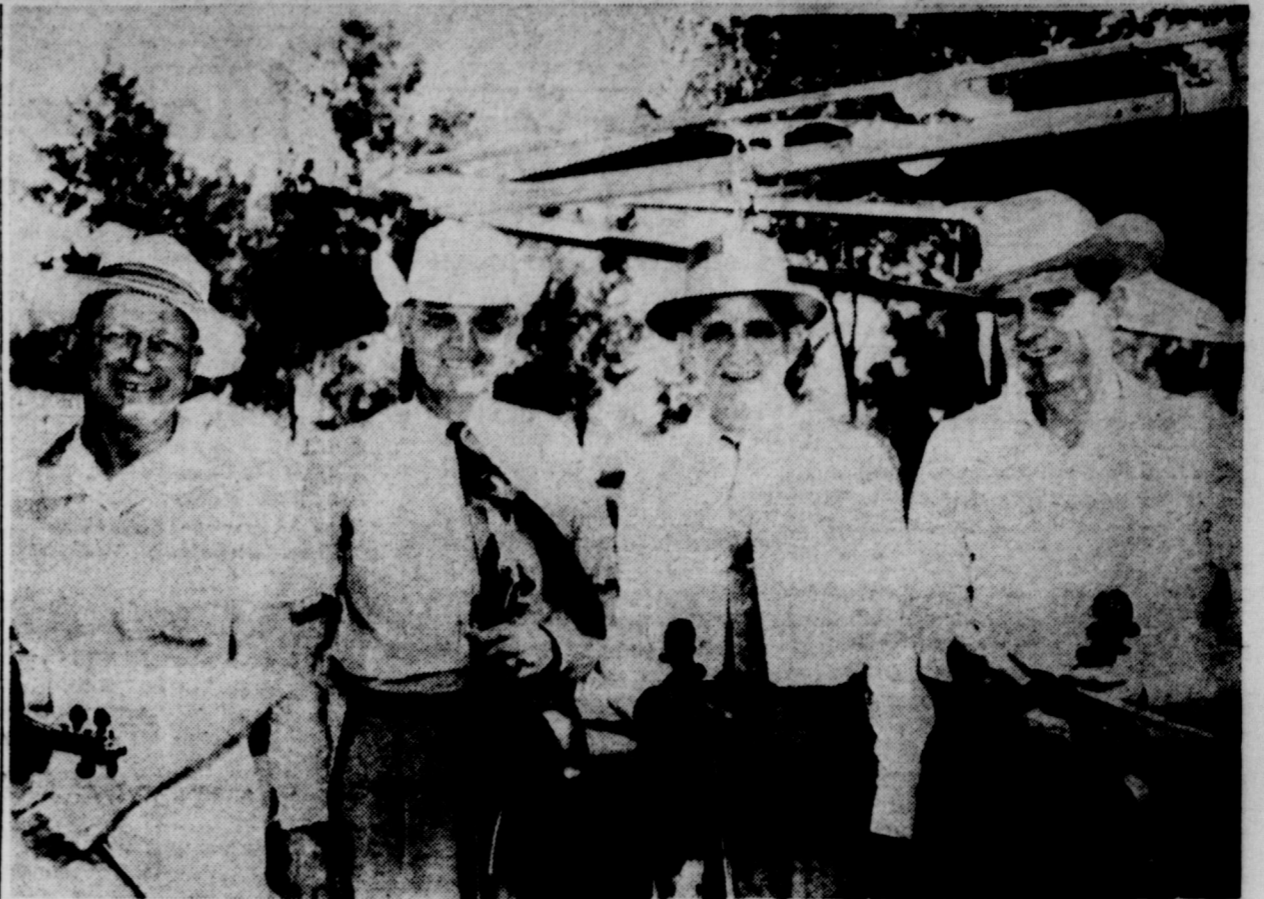

AN IMPORTANT QUEST
The Bible admonishes us to: "Seek the Lord while He may be found, to call upon Him while He is near."

This does not mean that God is lost. But it does mean that we are until we find God as our personal Saviour.

We need also to remember that God seeks us. Not that God does not know where we are. He does. He seeks to woo us into a frame of mind where we will realize our need of Him, and recognize Him, and open our hearts and our lives to Him.

A saint of the fourth century said "Our hearts can find no rest until they rest in God." This is fundamentally true, and being true it necessarily follows that our most urgent business should be to seek the Lord. Life pressures us in so many ways from so many directions that it becomes easy for us to lose sight of God. This we cannot afford to do.

God will never forsake us and He will not let us go. A great modern poet has described the Spirit of God "as the hound of heaven" who searches for man as a hound dog searches for a lost trail. This figure of speech pungently suggests God's great interest in man. Jesus said of His mission to a lost world: "I am come to seek and to save that which was lost." Not only to seek, but also to save. Man seeking God is his answer to God seeking man. And the consummation is salvation, and peace, and eternal life.

ELK CITY TO HOLD RODEO OF CHAMPIONS

Elk City's 20th annual "Rodeo of Champions" is on western Oklahoma's activity calendar for September 1-2-3 with one-time daily performances starting at 8 p.m.

This year's Elk City rodeo has been tagged "Rodeo of Champions" because of an influx of professional rodeo champions, former champions and current contenders for championship crowns which has been assured due to the Elk City show not conflicting with the dates of any other major rodeo in the U. S.

The rodeo festivities will unwind with a Labor Day opening traditional rodeo parade at 4 p.m. Monday, Sept. 1, with a two-mile procession of riders, horses, floats and practically all conceivable early and present day travel conveniences passing through Elk City's downtown business district.

In addition to the regular six-event rodeo contests - bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling - this year's Rodeo of Champions will include the finest assembly of specialty acts ever booked for the annual Elk City arena show.

Specialty attractions will include a Roman fire act in which Jimmy Murphy, a youthful and daring cowboy-turned-showman, puts his two white Albinos, "Frosty and Snowman," through an act which includes performing with walls and rings of fire; Bull Doughitt, roping expert; Gene and Bobby Clark, nationally famous rodeo clowns who will have numerous arena comedy skits; Jay Sisler and his Australian Shepherd dogs, stars of one of Walt Disney's movie series, and a cowgirl team riding demonstration.

Background music will again be furnished by Ruby Nance and his professional rodeo band, and Cy Tallion, r o d e o c o n t e s t a n - Elk City show.

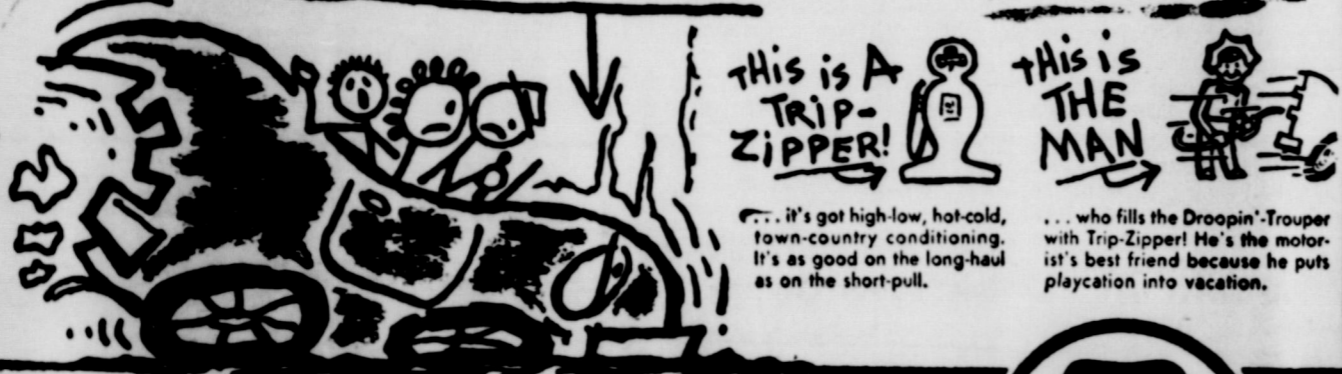
An added attraction in the rodeo parade and at each of the three night performances this year will be Abe Schiller, Las Vegas hotel man and his \$6,000 western wardrobe.
