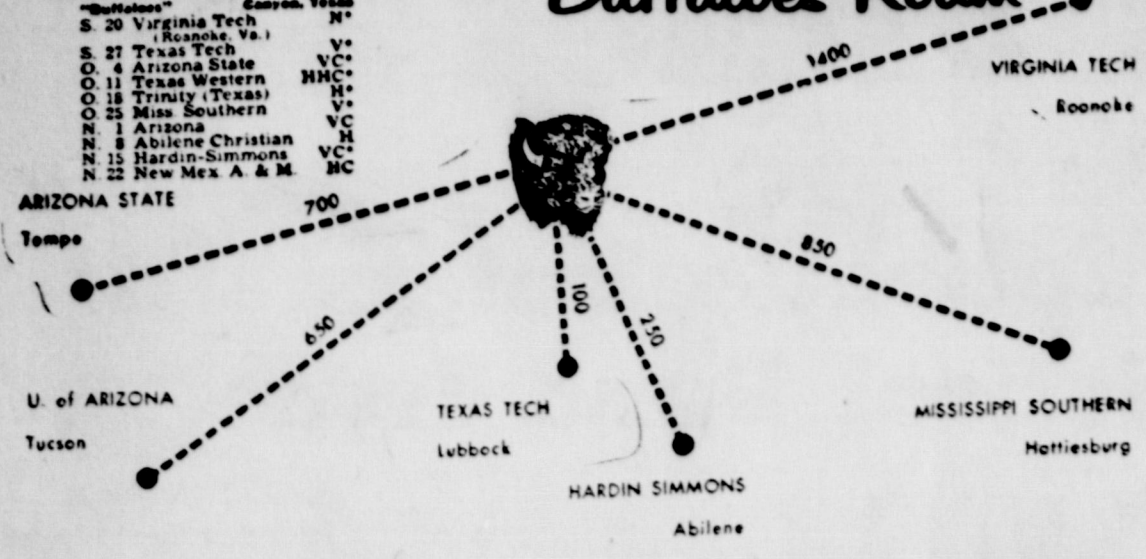


1958 BUFF SCHEDULE

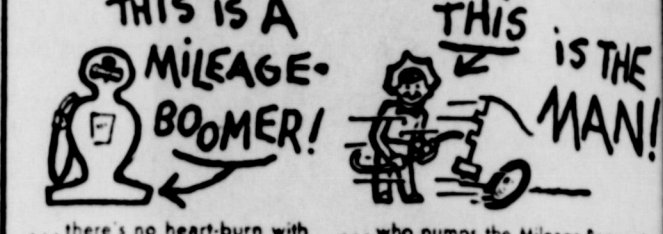

Beat one egg in cup. Fill cup with lukewarm water. Add 2 cups of flour (a good pint). Add a pinch of salt and mix well. Beat and knead (by picking up dough and throwing or hitting it on table) until white blisters appear. Divide into 4 parts and cover each. Let stand 2 hours. Roll and pull tissue paper thin. Spread with sliced apples, sugar, cinnamon, butter and sour cream. Roll up — place in greased pan. Bake in moderate oven for one hour, basting with hot milk. Apple strudel may be frozen unbaked.
