Wheeler Mustangs To Meet Erick Squad On Home Ground

LOCALS HAVE GOOD CHANCE OF WINNING

Gerónimo . . . Semper-Par . . . Hot Dogs . . . Remember the Alamo . . . or in plain English, let's skin those Erick Bearcats Friday night.

This should be a cinch this week since we will be fighting on our own battle ground and besides Bearcats just aren't supposed to whip Mustangs.

Coach Louis Boynton and assistant Richard Gaines have been working hard this week to condition their gridsters for the important tussle with Erick. Boynton said most of the week has been spent on blocking and tackling and "they have been doing a lot better" he said.

However, "we are in poor physical condition . . . Gary Satterfield has a head injury, and Jackie Johnson has a sprained ankle. Childress has a broken hand and Jim Jolly who was Satterfield's number one replacement is out with an injured knee."

Boynton said Erick will be another tough one, but with plenty of team spirit and drive "we have a good chance".

SHAMROCK MAN IS KILLED AS CAR OVERTURNS

Jack Brown, 26, of Shamrock, died Monday morning from injuries received when his car overturned near Lela early Sunday. The accident was investigated by Highway Patrolmen R. C. Parker and Dave Croslin of McLean.

Brown was a pipeline worker with the R. H. Fulton Pipeline Company.

He was driving east on Highway 66 alone, according to the report, when he lost control of his car. The vehicle overturned, winding up in the westbound lane.

Taken to Shamrock General Hospital by Richerson Funeral Home ambulance, he died at 5 a.m. Monday. Funeral arrangements are pending the arrival of relatives from Alabama.

His wife, who was driving a car behind her husband, received treatment in Shamrock Hospital for shock.

Walter Roe Holbrook was born in Siloan Springs, Arkansas, May 28, 1882. He was married to Ann Harris, October 26, 1907 at Fredrick, Oklahoma and came to Allison from Kingston, Oklahoma in 1928. He was a retired farmer and had been in ill health since February of this year. He was a member of the Allison Baptist Church.

CROWDER HAS FIRST BALE OF COTTON

C. C. Crowder laid claim last Wednesday to \$50 in cash offered by Wheeler businessmen to the farmer who produced the year's first bale of cotton. He was also paid a premium price for the cotton and the first bale was given free by the Paymaster Gin.

A few minutes after the first wagon of cotton arrived, Walter Sorenson brought in the second load and while he was being weighed-in the third load was hauled in by L. A. McWhorter.

Sorenson's second bale will net him \$25 in cash. The Paymaster Gin also ginned his bale free.

Crowder's 420 pound bale graded middling light spot 31/32 and he was paid 35 cents a pound, including his bonus.

Sorenson's 530 lb. bale was graded middling 31/32 and he was paid 34.13 cents a pound.

COMMISSIONER TO BE PICKED BY WRITE-IN

The Wheeler County Democratic Committee, headed by A. B. Crump met Saturday morning in the Wheeler County courthouse to select a county commissioner precinct four nominee to run in the November 4 general election.

This action was necessary due to the recent resignation of Ernest Henderson.

After a discussion the committee decided to let the voters of precinct four pick their next commissioner by the write-in method.

Any qualified voter in precinct four is eligible for the position Crump said.

The three men were: James Winfield, 17; Jerry Green, 17, and Red Compton, 28. They were all from the Elk City-Sayre area.

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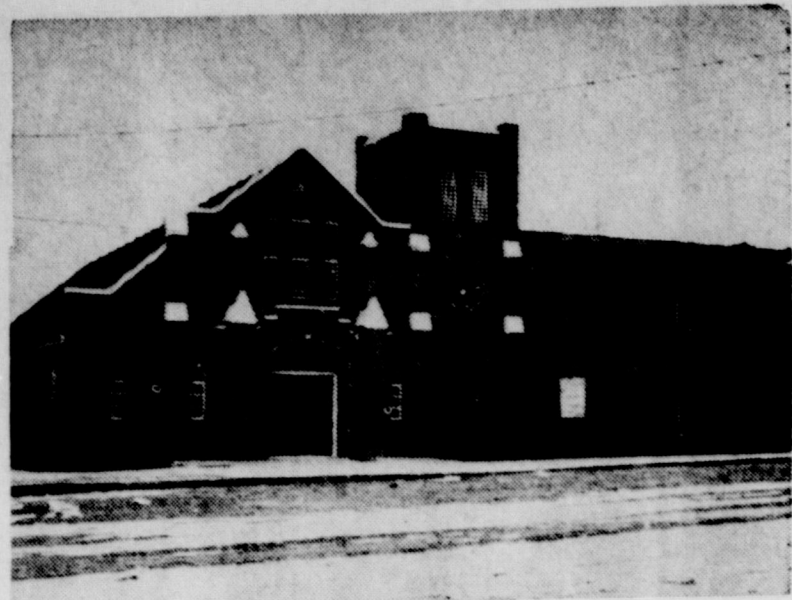
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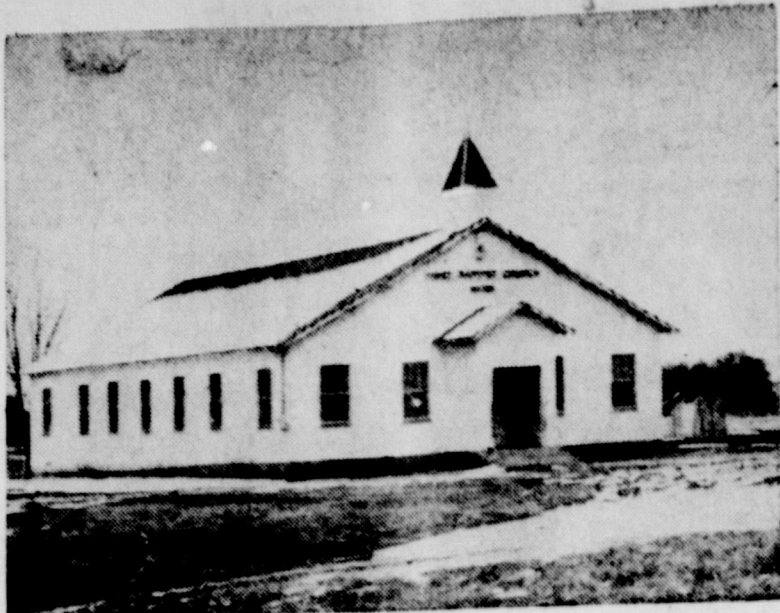

DOING WHAT COMES NATURALLY

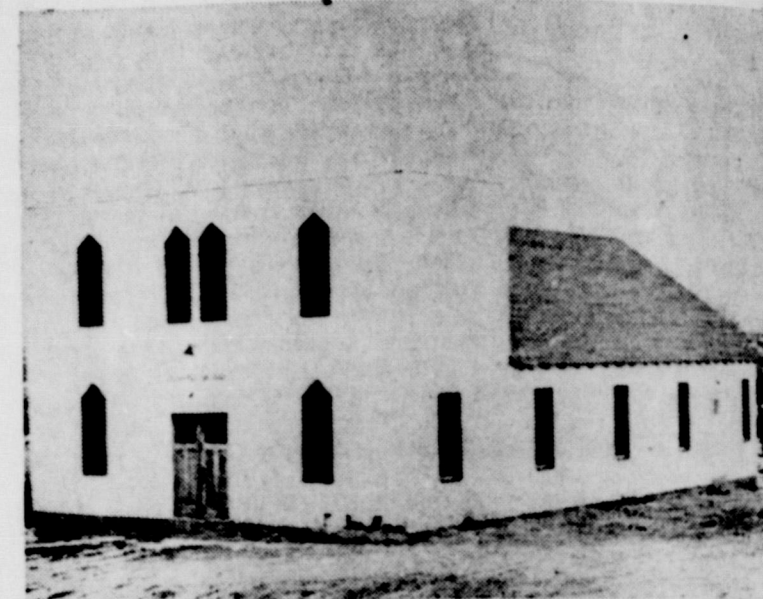
"Doing what comes naturally" is a philosophy extolled in many ways in this generation. Many of us would like to meet each day with no more responsibility than to do whatever might come "naturally". But before giving ourselves up to this view we ought to ask ourselves what we "naturally" want to do.

No one really likes to feel that he is insincere and doing things which are "unnatural" might be hypocrisy. This would serve to indicate that there should be a consistency between "being" and "doing."

Man is both a physical and a spiritual being. If, in doing what comes "naturally", he is guided solely by the physical, then, at best, he has little more than animal existence. After a while he finds that this falls far short of the kind of living necessary to a sense of fulfillment. It may seem unfortunate to our limited understanding that this dual nature of man causes the fulfillment of one nature to be subject to the guidance or limitation of the other. If we satisfy our hunger by taking what belongs to another we experience the disapproval of our conscience. If we neglect the needs of the physical to the extent that inadequate provision is made for good health then we experience the limitation imposed by sickness and disease.

The "doing what comes naturally" philosophy is fraught with selfish implications. Jesus said, "For whosoever will save his life shall lose it; and whosoever shall lose his life for my sake shall find it." This would teach us that selfishness in the guise of self-preservation or any other guise is self-destructive.

Doing what is "unnatural" may be insincere but naturally wanting to do what is right is the only satisfactory solution. To naturally want to do right we need to be born again so that doing good becomes the natural fruit of a redeemed spirit within us, a proper relation between "being" and "doing."

The Briscoe boys baseball team played Kelton recently and won 14-4. Jack Helton knocked a home run for the winning team. Jim Wright was the winning pitcher.


