LAST RITES READ FOR BEN BARKER

Services for Ben G. Barker were conducted September 27, at 2:00 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Wheeler with the pastor Rev. Frank J. Ross in charge, assisted by Rev. Carlton Thomson.

Mr. Barker was born in Ranger, Texas May 27, 1895. He was a former Wheeler resident and lived at Mobeetie from 1918 until 1934. He was a resident of Dallas for the past 11 years, moving there from Phoenix, Arizona.

November 29, 1916 he was married to Myrtle Oswald at Wellington, Texas. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge at Mobeetie and the Baptist Church at Wellington. Mr. Barker was engaged in farming most of his active life but he had been in ill health the past 4 years and seriously ill since August 1, 1958.

Mr. Barker was moved from his home at Dallas and placed in the Wheeler Hospital September 19, where he passed away Thursday evening, September 25, at the age of 63 years 3 months and 28 days.

Survivors are the wife, Mrs. Myrtle Barker of Dallas; 1 son, Audie of Tucson, Arizona; and 1 daughter, Mrs. Berdiana Keyes of Dallas.

Surviving also are 6 grandchildren; 3 sisters, Mrs. Florence Dodd of Wheeler, Mrs. Maye Francis of Gagey, and Mrs. Iva Vise of Wheeler; and 3 brothers, Tom of Palm Desert, Calif., J. D. of Canyon and Claude of Gagey. His parents and 1 brother preceded him in death.

Pall bearers were Melvin Johnson, Aubrey Greenhouse, Clarence Dyson, Ed Johnson, Jess Godwin and Henry Flanagan.

Interment, with graveside Masonic rites by Mobeetie Lodge, was in the Wheeler Cemetery under direction of Kirk Funeral Home.

Hefley said Gregg had been hired on a 90 day trial basis.

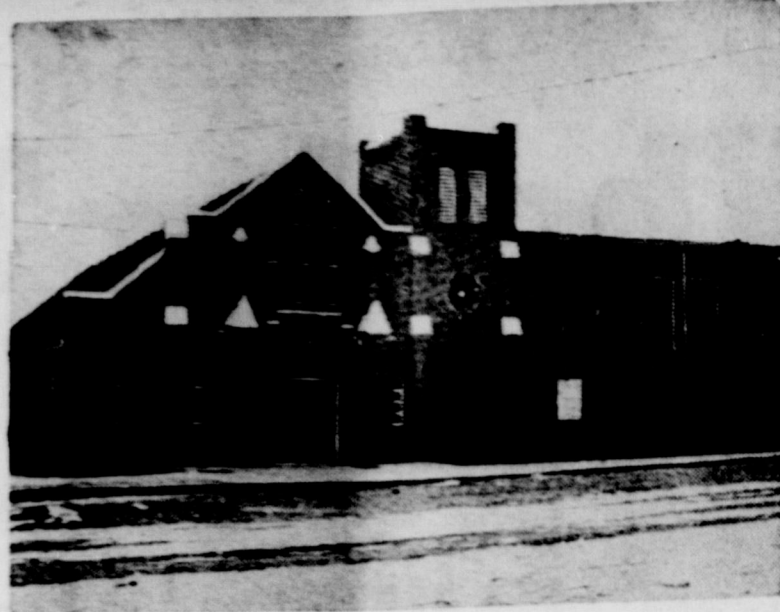

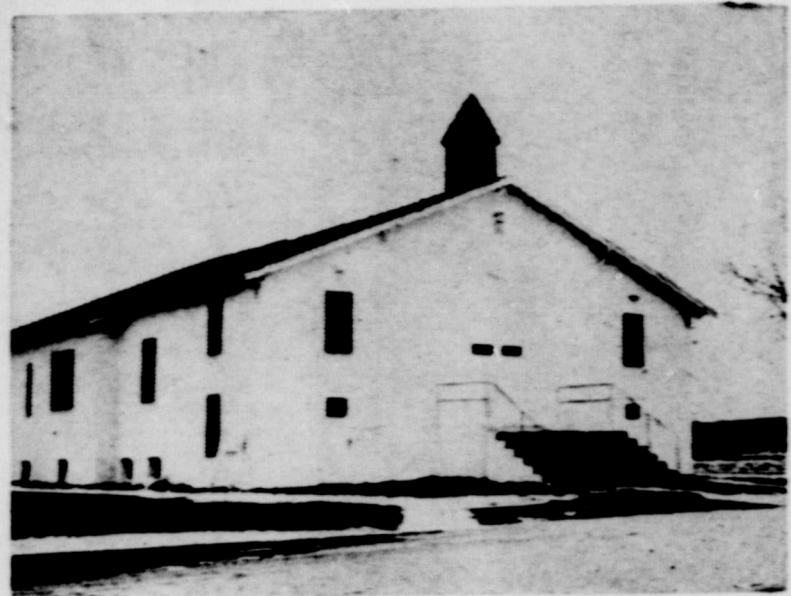

THE CHURCH IS BIG BUSINESS

When in the Great Commission Jesus Christ assigned the Church the task of making the world Christian, He assigned her the biggest job that was ever given to any institution or organization. But that is exactly the task He gave to the Church.

This task would appear stupendous even today for the Church with her 800,000,000 members. But when Christ said to the Church "Go into all the world and make disciples of all nations, teaching them to observe all things what so ever I have commanded you..." you could almost count the members of the Church on your fingers and toes. And the infant Church was completely without prestige, or worldly power.

No honest person would deny that the Church has had and does have her faults and her foibles. But faults and foibles are one thing, and failure is something entirely different. Much that has characterized the Church across the centuries has been the result of the immaturity of her members and not a consequence of the hypocrisy in the Church.

The Church still has a long way to go in fulfilling her task on earth. This Christians must recognize. But let us look briefly at some earth-wide accomplishments of the Church. She has in some measure tempered the spiritual atmosphere of the earth. In some countries the change has been so great that statesmen and scholars have found no single word to describe it except the word "Christian".

The Church has taught the world to sing. Song is a symbol of a virile faith. That faith the world did not have until men began to look up to God and worship Him. But today singing has come to be a universal language.

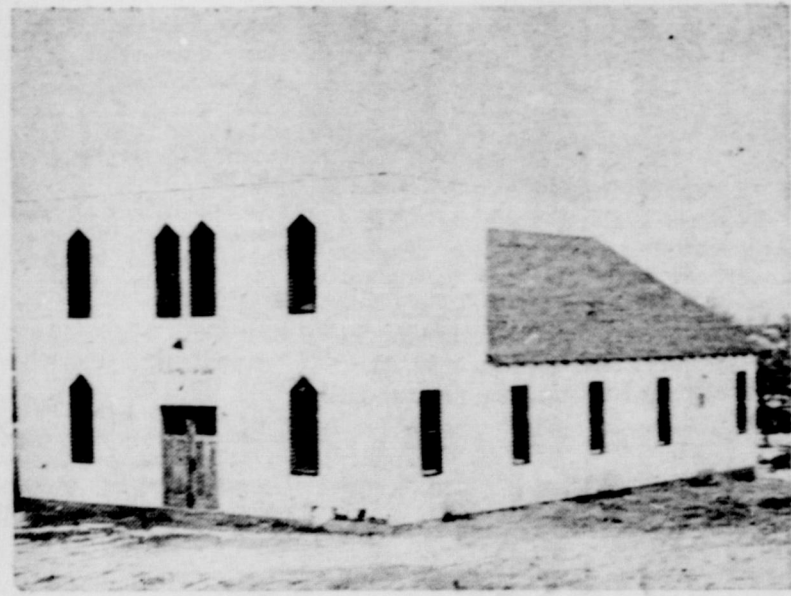
Hospitals, homes for homeless children, homes for the aged, and nearly all other institutions of mercy have followed in the wake of the Church.

Through the influence of the Church mankind has come to have a conscience. Few people anywhere today can look upon injustice and cruelty with impunity. Whether people respond to dire need or not they are aware of it and are condemned by it.

The Church has breathed the spirit of generosity into the life of the world. Hundreds of thousands have left homes of comfort and ease to carry the message of salvation to the ends of the earth. The Christians of the world gladly contribute more than a billion dollars every year to the missionary enterprise alone. Yes, the Church of Jesus Christ is big business. Are We helping to make it so?

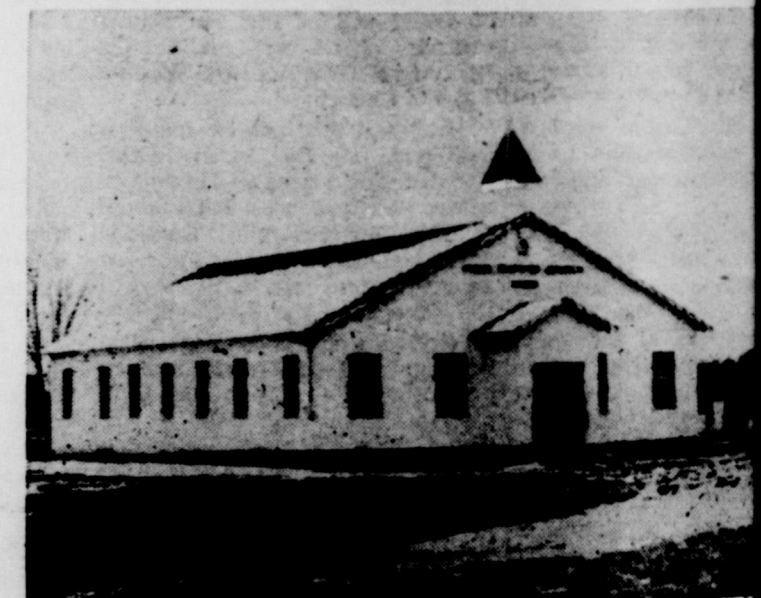

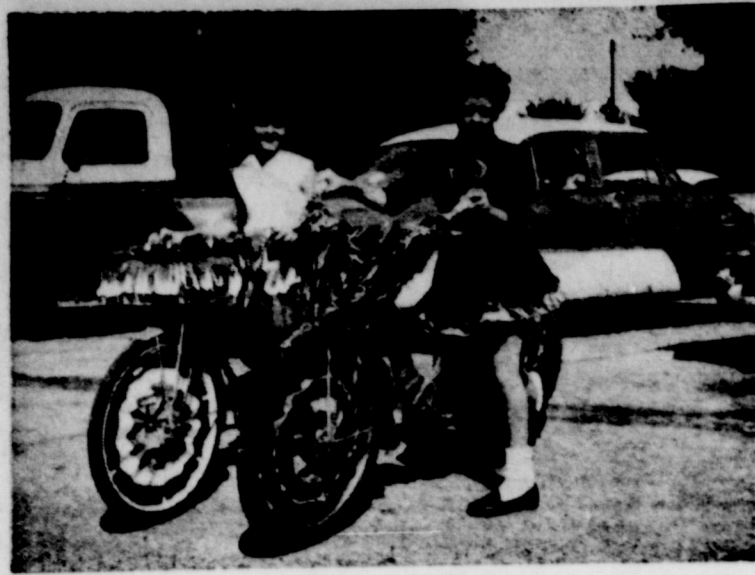

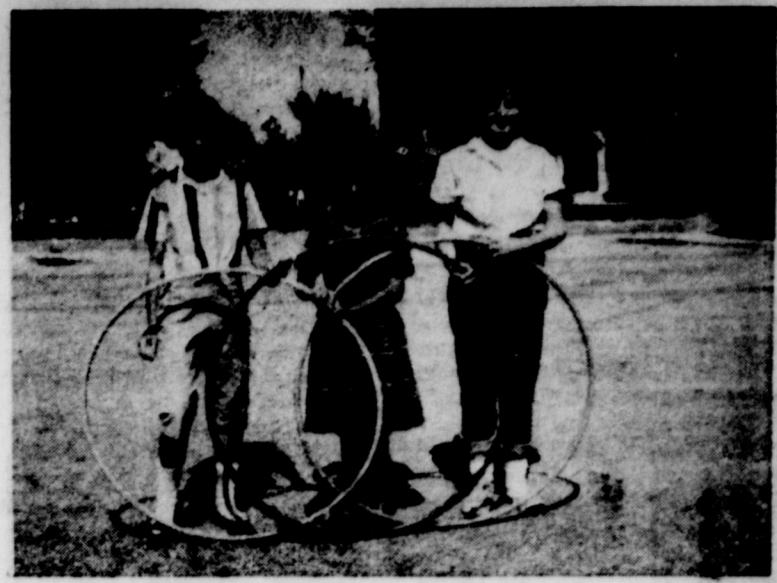

Over 4,000 Vehicles To Be Inspected In Wheeler County

On September 1, 1958 Texans began having their vehicles safety inspected for the 1959 inspection period. Captain Alan Johnson, of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded motorists that there are over 4 million vehicles registered in Texas, and 4,361 vehicles registered in this county which must be inspected, approved and bear the new inspection sticker prior to midnight, April 15, 1959.

Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items as required by law. Due to the fact that in 1957, 5 out of every 100 accidents were caused by a mechanical defect, motor vehicle owners are urged to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible, to be sure their vehicles are as safe as possible. There are 7 inspection stations in this county at which owners can get their vehicles inspected now, without having to wait in line as thousands of motorists did as the deadline neared at the close of the last inspection period. Motorists arrested for not displaying a current inspection sticker on their motor vehicle are subject to a fine up to \$200.00 and cost of court.
