



CITY OR DINANCE Ordinance No. 77 An ordinance prohibiting dogs from running at large on public or private property; defining terms; providing for impounding of dogs; providing for release of dogs impounded upon payment of fines; providing for the sale of destruction of dogs not redeemed; providing for redemption of dogs sold; providing for records; providing for unconstitutionality; providing publication; penalty;

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas: Section I Definitions For the purpose of this ordinance the following words shall have the following meaning: 'Dog' shall mean both

male and female. "At large" shall mean, any dog off the property of the owner and no tunder the comtrol of a competent person either by a leash, at heel beside a person and obedient to that person's commands, on or within a vehicle being driven or parked on the streets.

"Owner" shall mean any person, firm or corporation owning or keeping or harboring or having control of or custody of a dog.

Section II. It shall be unlawful for any owner of any dog to allow such dog to be "at large" within the corporate limits of the City of Wheeler Section III. It shall be the duty of the marshall or any of his deputies, to seize and impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, all dogs found "at large" within the corporate limits of the City of Wheeler.
