PEARMAN DEFEATS MUSTANGS

Britt Spearman Lynx put on the Mustangs winning Friday night 25-13 before the game against the powerful AA high plains. Spearman was able to move all the game against the Mustangs but two drives in enemy 10 yard line brought and this Mustang hopes of

kick to keep the Lynx margin to six. The Mustangs had taken the opening kickoff and driven to the Spearman 36 where they lost the ball on downs to set up Lynx's scamp. Lynx's TD was the first of two that he scored before he was taken from the game with a knee injury that required surgery Saturday morning. So well did the Mustangs move the ball, they didn't have to kick the pignin all night. Drives to the Lynx 36, 24, and 15 in the first half by Wheeler kept the pressure on Spearman and a 66 yard drive by the Mustangs gave the visitors a short lived 7-6 lead. Roy Don Chick gave the Mustangs their lead as he

capped the 18 play drive with a scoring smash at right tackle from 1 yard out on fourth down. Dale Stevens booted the extra point. The Lynx came right back with a 66 yard drive of their own and Lynx once more was the big gun and got the touchdown on the same play as he scored his first TD. Finding a gaping hole on the Mustangs left side, Lyon headed for the end zone from 28 yards out and put the Lynx ahead with 212 to play in the half. Failing to make the two pointer, it looked like the Mustangs were to be behind by 5 at the half but a fumble was costly to Wheeler and Spearman quickly cashed in on the break to run up their margin to 18-7. A pitch from Gary Fischer to Chick went awry at the Mustang 21 and when the bodies were unstacked, the Lynx had recovered. Just 5 plays were needed and 30 seconds remained when Tony Harper went in from the 2 yard line.

Dale Stevens brought the crowd to its feet on the ensuing kickoff as he broke loose and was dragged down on the Spearman 34. The Mustangs picked up a first down at the 24 and called time with 5 seconds to play. A pass fell incomplete as the gun sounded to end the first half with Spearman ahead 18-7 but having been played much closer than the score. The Mustangs took the second half kickoff and moved

methodically to the Lynx 5 but lost the ball on downs to stop the threat. Spearman fumbled the ball back to the Mustangs at the 20 but once more the Mustangs were unable to penetrate the stout Spearman defense and lost the ball for the second time via the fumble route as Rodney Weatherly coughed up the ball and Spearman recovered at the 17. Jimmy Cole put the Mustangs in good field position

several minutes later as he intercepted a Lynx pass at the Mustang 45 as time was running out in the third period.

Two personal foul penalties aided the Mustangs as they used Chick and Cole to get to the Lynx 3 yard line for a first and goal situation. Cole got 1 and then Weatherly pounded for one more to put the ball just yard shy of paydirt. Jimmy Cole seemed to slip as he made his cut at right tackle and was dropped for no gain. With fourth down facing them, the Mustangs called on Weatherly but he was stopped about a foot away and the Lynx had once more blunted a Mustang threat.

With 8:06 still to play, the Mustangs had time but the Lynx dashed all hopes as they ate up the clock and padded their lead with the 99 yard drive for their final touchdown. Gary Pool found Mike Floyd running free between two Mustang defenders in the end zone and hit him with a 14 yard scoring toss with 1:44 to go. Edgar Womble kicked the extra point.

Down but not out, the Mustangs came right back and with Stevens once more breaking loose on the kickoff return, the Mustangs had the ball at the Spearman 29. Racing against the clock, the Mustangs hit paydirt with 12 seconds remaining as Cole swept his left side behind a clearing block by Rick Heffey to go over untouched.

Jimmy Cole picked up 121 big yards to lead Mustang ball toters and Roy Chick was not far behind as he garnered 110 yards on 37 trips into the Lynx defense.

Albert Wayne Treadwell, 45, was found dead about 11 a.m. Tuesday behind his home in the Briscoe Community. Officers said he had been shot once above the left eye. A .22 caliber rifle was found near the body. Justice of the Peace Dick Gwynes ruled death by suicide.

Mr. Treadwell was born December 5, 1925 in Childress County, Texas. He was married to Mildred Grammer February 16, 1946 in Mobeetie.

Mr. Treadwell had lived in Wheeler Co. for the past 24 years. He was a veteran of WWII. He was a member of the Baptist Church and American Legion.

VANDALISM: The home of J. B. Tiner, northwest of Wheeler was vandalized recently by a group of Wheeler youths. The house, no longer occupied, was left intact when Mr. Tiner was taken to the rest home in 1966. The vandals tore the screens off and broke the windows, took an ax to four new screens stored in the house, turned over a late model refrigerator, rummaged through everything and destroyed everything breakable in the house. An old car parked in the garage has all the windows knocked out, ax marks different places on the car and paint poured over the engine. Sheriff Bus Dorman knows the youths involved in the incident and intends to file charges. Sheriff Dorman urges parents to check on their youngsters, know what they are doing and see that they are home at a decent hour. Youngsters have been known to stay on the streets until 4 a.m. Sheriff Dorman cited on a case in which he called a set of parents informing them of their sons activities; he was driving the family car, had had a beer or two and was spinning around on the city streets. The parents in turn asked if the youngster had done anything wrong; Sheriff Dorman feels this is the general attitude of the parent of youngsters involved in cases such as the one above. "These are the same people who are shocked at the activities on our college campuses," stated Dorman.

JAPAN—FIRST BILLION DOLLAR OFF-SHORE CUSTOMER FOR U.S.

Wheeler County residents are well aware that U.S.-Japanese trade is extensive. E. A. Zybach, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, commented recently.

"Almost everyone recognized that Americans are important customers for Japanese goods. I wonder how many of us realize that the Japanese are major customers for American goods, especially for American farm commodities."

"In fact, Japan imports more U.S. agricultural products than any other country in the world—a record \$1.1 billion worth during the 1970 fiscal year."

He pointed out that feed grains, wheat, cotton are important farm crops in Wheeler and that exports of these farm products to Japan have gone up dramatically in recent years.

More than 6 million tons of feed grains were shipped to Japan last fiscal year—just about 1/3 of U.S. feed grain exports. Soybean exports to Japan had a 251 million dollar value, and wheat exports \$136 million. Japan is our best cotton customer, taking 1/2 of its cotton from the U.S. and Japan bought \$50 million worth of tobacco from the U.S. during the fiscal year.

The ASC Committee Chairman reported that Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford M. Hardin recently took note of the American-Japanese trade story, calling it unprecedented.

Secretary Hardin also said: "The Japanese economy has paralleled that nation's growth in trade. In the years between 1960 and 1965, Japanese shipments in world trade, more than doubled. By 1969, they had almost doubled again, reaching \$16 billion. Shipments to the U.S. increased in those 9 years more than 4 times—\$4.9 billion.

"The Japanese household's disposable income has more than tripled since 1960. His demand for meat, milk, and eggs—a good 'horseback' measure of consumer prosperity—has increased by more than 4 times in 15 years. He is diversifying his eating habits as his income goes up. For example, per person consumption of wheat flour in this traditionally rice-eating society has increased by 30 percent in a decade and a half.

"Ten years ago, Japan's agricultural imports from the U.S. were \$440 million. In the fiscal year just past, they were more than twice as

great—nearly \$1.1 billion.

"But the agricultural exports are only one aspect of a beneficial trading relationship that can be summarized very simply: In terms of total exports, the U.S. is Japan's best customer and Japan is the U.S. best off-shore customer."

"As you might expect, 2/3 of U.S. shipments to Japan last year were raw materials, mineral fuels and foodstuffs, while 90 percent of Japan's shipments to the U.S. were manufactured goods. This is the basis of beneficial world trade—an exchange of goods based primarily on production efficiency."

"It is this principle that led Japan to look to efficient producers on the broad farm lands for the feed grains needed to satisfy its people's rising demand for livestock products."

"As a result, imported feed grains have triggered a rapid expansion of Japanese livestock production. This has brought Japanese consumers more meat and poultry at better prices; it has opened opportunities for Japanese farmers for new and profitable livestock enterprises; it has meant an important and expanding feed grain market for world agriculture."

"Almost the whole range of U.S. farm commodities finds Japan a leading customer."

"Japan wants, needs and can afford these products, and the U.S. can supply them in any system of international trade in which price, quality and availability are the primary factors."

"In a world of competition, export expansion means salesmanship and service as well as price, quality and availability. The producers and marketers of the major U.S. agricultural products have understood this, and they support some 68 private trade organizations formed to develop markets overseas in cooperation with the Department of Agriculture. This is, or course, a mutual effort—with many strong Japanese organizations bringing to it their special knowledge, their special abilities."

In closing, Agriculture Secretary Hardin gave special recognition to the trade organizations for the three commodities which last year accounted for 2/3 of total U.S. agricultural exports to Japan—feed grains, soybeans, and wheat.

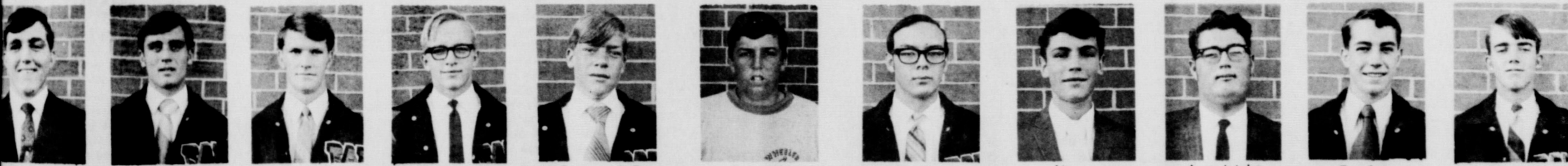

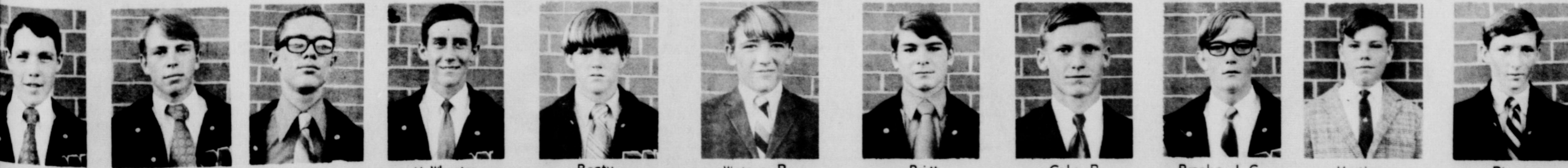

Legal Notice

CITY ORDINANCE
Ordinance No. 77
An ordinance prohibiting dogs from running at large on public or private property; defining terms; providing for impounding of dogs; providing for release of dogs impounded upon payment of fines; providing for the sale of dogs not redeemed; providing for redemption of dogs sold; providing for records; providing for unconstitutionality; providing publication; penalty; and declaring an emergency.
Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas:
Section I. Definitions For the purpose of this ordinance the following words shall have the following meaning: "Dog" shall mean both male and female.
"At large" shall mean any dog off the property of the owner and not under the control of a competent person either by a leash, or held beside a person and obedient to that person's commands, or on or within a vehicle being driven or parked on the streets.
"Owner" shall mean any person, firm or corporation owning or keeping or harboring or having control or custody of a dog.
Section II. It shall be unlawful for any owner of any dog to allow such dog to be "at large" within the corporate limits of the City of Wheeler.
Section III. It shall be the duty of the marshal or any of his deputies, to seize and impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, all dogs found "at large" within the corporate limits of the City of Wheeler.
Section IV. The marshal or his designated deputies upon receiving any dog, shall make a complete registry, entering the breed, color and sex of such dog and vaccination record and other information attached to the dog, if any, and place and time of taking into custody.
Section V. The owner of any dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to sale or destruction by the payment of Ten

(\$10.00) Dollars impounding fee and Two (\$2.00) Dollars per day for each day or part of day such dog shall have been impounded, and proving the dog has been vaccinated with anti-rabies vaccine by a licensed veterinary within the last twelve (12) months, if the dog is over six (6) months of age.
Section VI. No owner shall keep a dog over the age of six (6) months within the city limits unless the dog shall have been vaccinated by a licensed veterinary with anti-rabies vaccine within the last twelve (12) months.
Section VII. That within ten (10) days after any dog has been placed in the Pound, in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this ordinance, the marshal shall post, or cause to be posted, near the entrance to the City Hall, a notice describing said dog and stating the date it was impounded and the date and place that it will be sold, which date of sale shall not be less than three (3) days after posting such notice. The marshal, or any officer designated by him, shall sell such dog at auction to the highest bidder for cash, provided, however, that the owner of keeper of said dog may at any time before the sale of said dog pay the impounding fees and receive said dog from the Pound. At the auction sale of all dogs, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, the marshal or any officer authorized by him, shall bid in the name and for the City of Wheeler up to the amount of the impounding fees due upon said dog unless some other person shall bid such amount or greater amount therefore. Any person who shall bid the amount of the fees due for impounding and keeping any dog shall have such dog delivered to him at the pound upon payment to the marshal of the amount bid, and the person shall first have the dog vaccinated with anti-rabies vaccine by a licensed veterinary or prove the dog has been vaccinated within the last twelve (12) months if the

dog is over six (6) months old. If the marshal shall be the only bidder at the sale of any dogs hereinabove provided for, the City of Wheeler shall become the owner of said dogs and thereupon the marshal shall kill or cause to be killed all such dogs in said pound after the provisions of this ordinance have been complied with. At any time within six (6) months after any sale the owner may apply to the marshal and upon satisfactory proof of ownership he shall be entitled to receive the amount deposited on account of such sale, after deducting all fees for impounding costs and keeping such dog and such costs as may be necessarily incurred to establish his right thereto.
Section VIII. That at any time within thirty (30) days from the date of the sale the owner of any dog impounded and sold under the provisions of this ordinance shall have the right to redeem the same by paying to the purchaser thereof double the amount paid by said purchaser for such dog and his reasonable expenses incurred in keeping the same.
Section IX. Within seven (7) days after acquiring knowledge that his dog has been impounded by a rabid animal it shall be the duty of the owner or keeper to cause such dog to be given anti-rabies treatment, or to impound such dog for a period of six (6) months in a place approved by the City Health Officer, or destroy such dog.
Section X. That if any section, part, or provisions of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional or invalid, then, in that event, it is expressly provided, and it is the intention of the City Council in passing this ordinance that all other parts of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect.
Section XI. That any owner who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined any sum not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00)

Dollars, and each and every day of such violation shall be deemed a separate and complete offense.
Section XII. This Ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after its publication.
Section XIII. The fact the public welfare of the citizens of Wheeler needs to be protected creates an emergency and the rule requiring three separate readings of this Ordinance is hereby suspended.
Passed and approved the 21st day of September, 1970.
