The Wheeler Mustangs pack their gear for their second game away from home Friday night and again they will be facing one of the top football teams in the Panhandle as the

Canadian Wildcats play host. The Dist. 1-A Wildcats are undefeated and ranked third in the Panhandle in Class A and haven't really been pushed in any of their four wins to date. Canadian is picked to fight the state ranked White Deer Bucks for the district crown and results to date back up this prediction. Carrying a 3-1 record into the game, the Mustangs

hope to derail the Wildcat express which has rolled easily over Booker, Follett, Erick and Clarendon. The Clarendon Broncos were the first to cross the Wildcat goal this year and they absorbed a 34-14 shellacking. The Mustangs should be in trap shape for the battle against their old time foe and for the first time in several years will be the underdog against Canadian.

Canadian will field a veteran ball club led by their classy quarterback, Bill Lynch and wingback Harold Paak. "Canadian can do everything real well and they have the speed and size necessary for a fine ball club", coach Bateman said. "We feel like our boys are ready for the game and will give a good account of themselves", he added.

"We played one of our better defensive games against Groom and our down people did a good job containing their offense and going to the football", the coach said in looking back at the Groom game.

# MUSTANGS WHITEWASH GROOM 20-0

Britt coming at the Mustangs and the Groom Tigers to move the ball at will against the fired up Tigers but an inconsistent offense was able

to get the ball into the end zone only three times after having the pigskin a total of nine times in the Tigers end of the field. The Mustangs took the opening kickoff and quickly drove to midfield but a miscue in the backfield resulted in a fumble at the Wheeler 47 and they lost the ball.

Rodney Weatherly got the ball back for Wheeler on the next play however as Groom went for broke on a long pass and he intercepted at the Wheeler 15.

Weatherly used the slashing runs of Roy Don Chick and Jimmy Cole to move smartly for their first score with Cole racing the last 29 yards on a trap play at right guard. Bill Tucker and Carroll Watson opened the gaping hole in the Tiger forward wall and there was no catching of Cole. Dale Stevens attempted to make seven out of the six but his kick sailed to the left.

Just five plays were needed from this point with Chick nudging the ball into the end zone from one yard out. Weatherly got the two points on a keeper and the large homecoming crowd was treated to a 14-0 halftime bulge.

Although never being able to break the game open, the Mustangs thoroughly shut down the Tiger offense. Groom picked up only two first downs in the contest and both of these came in the first half.

The Mustangs took the kick on their 15 but were penalized back to the 8 for holding. Wheeler drove to the visitors 15 but lost the ball on downs.

Nepper fumbled at that point for the Tigers and Jim Bob Brooks dropped his 148 lbs. on the ball and Wheeler had only 15 yards to go to paydirt.

A delay of game penalty cost Wheeler 5 yards and the Mustangs relinquished the pigskin at the Tiger 6 and again no lights came on the board.

Weatherly and Stevens hooked up on a 43 yard pass and ran to the Tiger 16 late in the first quarter but the next three plays saw the Mustangs loose 18 yards and a

fourth down pass from Gary Fischer to Stevens got only three yards. Wheeler had to kick from the Tiger 44 on their next possession and this set the stage for the second TD of the night.

Holding the Tigers and forcing them to punt, the Mustangs set up a wall of blockers for Stevens who gathered in the kick on his 45 and headed south. Not a hand was laid on Stevens as he galloped 55 yards to paydirt but a red flag came floating down at the Tiger 37 as the Mustangs were detected holding and the run was wiped out.

Not to be denied this time, the Mustangs used their ground game once more to move the ball to the Groom 30. An 8 yard pass completion from Weatherly to Stevens set up a first down at the Tiger 22.

Clark returned the kickoff to the Mustang 36 but the Mustang defense stiffened. Two passes were incomplete and Mark Argabright, Rick Heffley, and Glazner threw Terry Nepper for a 6 yard loss to force the Tigers to punt and kill the only threat the Tigers made.

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After a scoreless first half, the Wheeler B. Team erupted for 28 points in the final two periods last Thursday night against the Groom B Tigers and registered their first win of the season, 28-6.

The Mustangs had two promising drives in the first half stopped by fumbles and as the first half ended, an apparent touchdown on a pass from Lewis Britt to James Vise was wiped out as the official ruled that the was caught out of the end zone.

Following a fumble recovery at the Wheeler 49, the Tigers used most of the second quarter grinding out yardage to the Mustang 9 where Wheeler rose to the occasion and dropped the Tiger ball carrier for no gain on fourth and one.

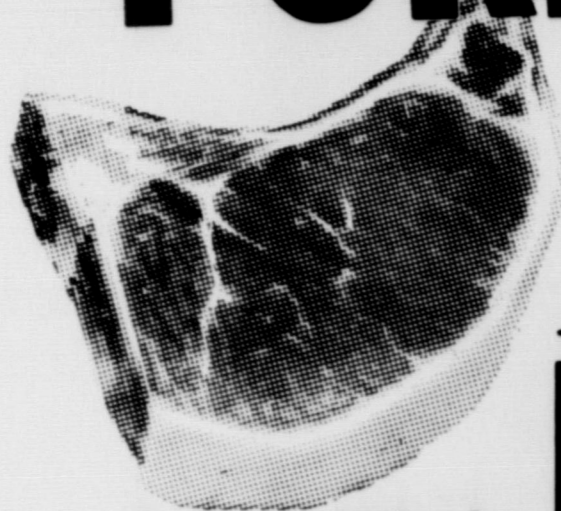

## Legal Notice

**Highway Improvement**

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvements on U.S. Highway 89, from 47 miles North of U.S. Highway 66 South to Shamrock, in Wheeler County.

This project will be developed in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration and financing of construction will be 50 percent State and 50 percent Federal; therefore, the Federal Highway Administration's approval has been requested.

The proposed improvement will consist of widening, reconditioning and resurfacing the existing highway to provide a 26-foot roadway surface with 8-foot 6-inch paved shoulders, 12-foot climbing lanes as required, and a 64-foot curb and gutter municipal section from one-half mile North of Shamrock, to Shamrock City Limit. Where additional right of way is acquired a minimum of 150 feet will be required there will be no displaced persons or businesses.

Maps, drawings showing geometric design, and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected at the office of C.V. Johnson, Supv. Resident Engineer, Wellington, Texas.

# Across the Fence

The hog price picture doesn't look as rosy as it's been. Hog Prices will decrease this fall to around the \$18-\$20 level, and by the

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January-February period prices could easily be in the \$17-\$18 range. Only efficient hog men, we predict, can continue to make a profit. Big increases in demand caused by a lot of people without jobs and paychecks have caused the crisis. Producers will want to buy feeders right with the market what it is. Since there's been a 17% increase in farrowings since 1969, a lot of pigs will be available.

The following feeder pig sales are coming up in East Texas: Oct. 14 Panola County Feeder Pig Sale, Catherino; October 20, "Big Four" Feeder Pig Sale, Queen City and October 28, Henderson County Feeder Pig Sale, Athens.

Opportunities in the church area or Merchandising the Church Program from A Full Wagon is the overall theme of the 25th annual Town and Country Conference.

Publicity Chairman Kenneth Wolf, agribusiness economist at A&M said discussions will center on positive programs that are working in rural areas. Activities start with registration at 8 a.m. in the All Faiths Chapel. Keynote speaker is Dr. Bardin Nelson of the A&M Sociology and Anthropology Department who will talk on "The Power of a Positive Ministry."

Wolf said ministers, lay leaders and other authorities will participate in discussions covering considerations for youth, ethnic groups, senior citizens, and the role of ministers in economic development.

A banquet is set for 7 p.m. Oct. 8 at which Charlie Scruggs of Dallas, editor of "The Progressive Farmer" magazine, will present the Rural Minister of the Year Award.

Banquet speaker is Dorris Rivers of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Division of Community Resource Development. The topic is "The Minister Can Be a Factor."

The non-denominational conference is planned by the Town and Country Church Committee, sponsored by Texas A&M University, and conducted by the A&M Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology.

Out of a total population of over 200 million, 1 out of 20 Americans lives on a farm. The Nation has 29 million farms and a farm population of 10.3 million. Of these farm residents, 1 million are Negroes and persons of races other than white. The U.S. Farmer produces enough food and fiber for 45 people--about 39 at home and 6 abroad. (A decade ago he supplied the agricultural needs of only 24 people.)

Crops were harvested from a total of 294 million acres in 1969--about 13 percent of total U.S. land area. However, 334 million acres were actually used for crops, since some acreage is double-cropped.

The top three crops, by volume, in 1969 were corn (4.6 billion bushels); wheat (about 1.5 billion bushels); and soybeans (1.1 billion bushels).

In 1969 average yield per acre for corn was 83.9 bushels per acre; sorghum, 55.2 bushels; wheat, 30.7 bushels; soybeans, 27.3.

Farmers' income was \$54.6 billion in 1969. Net farm income was \$16.2 billion--or \$5,437 per farm.

After taxes, farm income from all sources averaged \$2,432 per person in 1969--about 77 percent of earnings by non-farm residents.

Labor used on farms totaled about 6.9 billion man-hours in 1969. Of this 3.4 billion was to plan and harvest crops and 2.4 billion was for care of livestock.

Tractors on farms numbered about 5.6 million on Jan. 1, 1970. The per tractor average was 43 horsepower.

A total of 12 million tons of plant nutrients (nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium) were used in the U.S. and Puerto Rico during the year ended June 30, 1969. Approximately 15 percent of this was for nonfarm use.

Average fertilizer application per acre in fiscal 1969 was about 4 pounds nitrogen, 12 pounds phosphorus, and 19 pounds potassium.

Output of about 1 of every 5 acres harvested is exported.

Exports of U.S. farm products added up to \$6.6 billion during the year ended June 30, 1970. Imports of agricultural products were valued at \$5.5 billion.

Food grains, feed grains, and soybeans each account for about 15 percent of total export earnings.

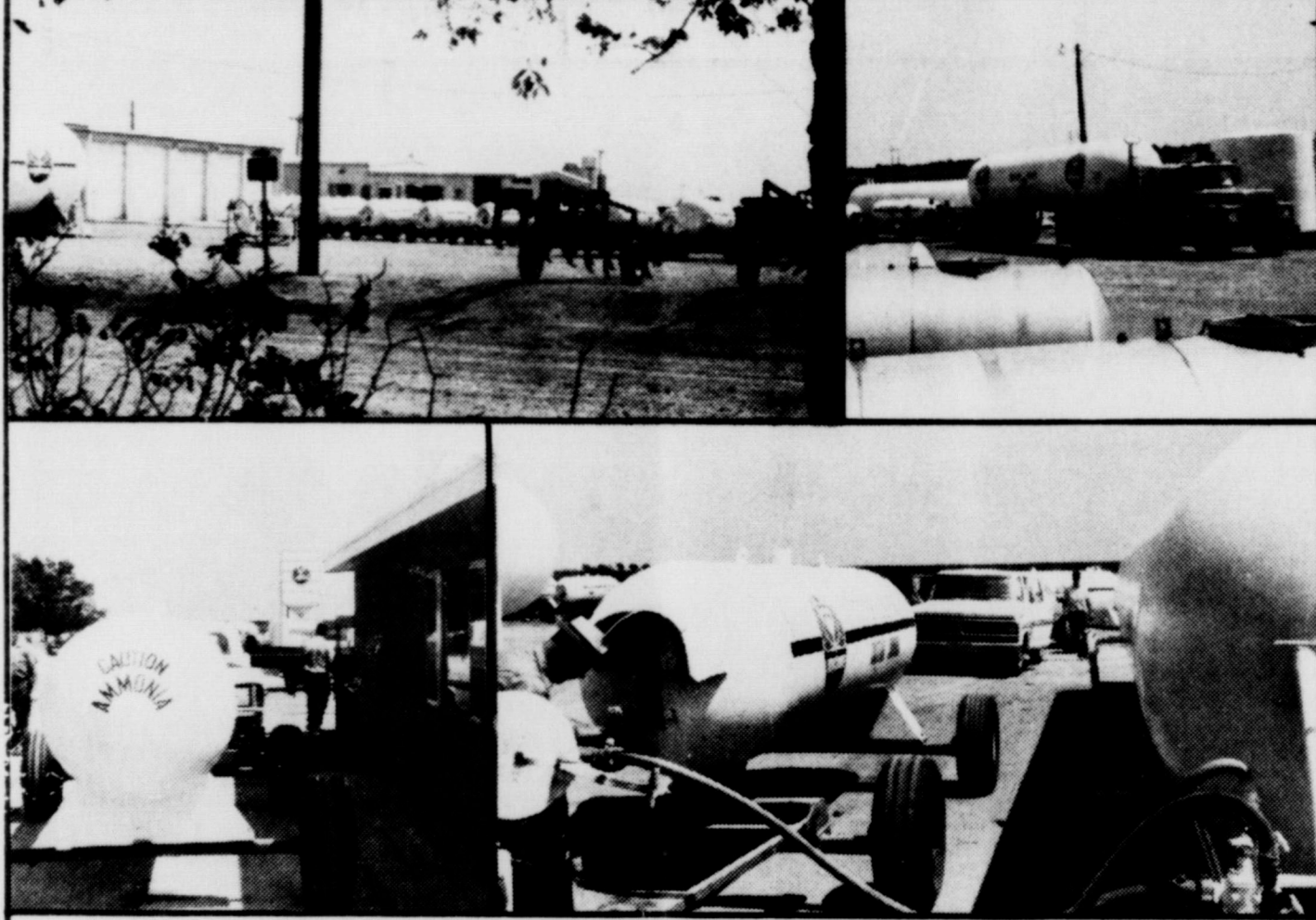

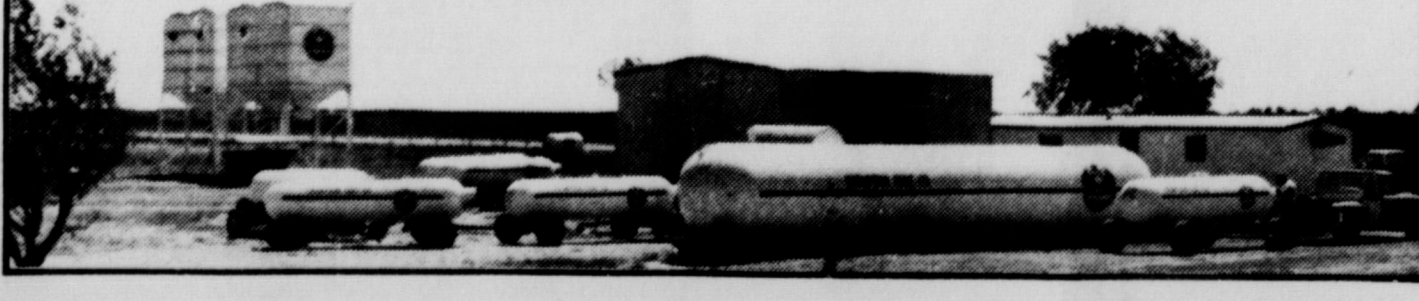

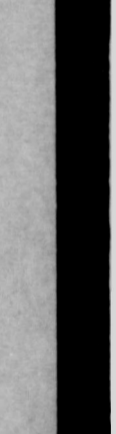

Irrigation continues to grow as part of the economy of Wheeler County. There is a great deal of interest in irrigation among farmers and ranchers at this time since we have had such a dry summer. One of the practices being applied by irrigation farmers that is growing in popularity is the underground pipeline. This is a very convenient practice as well as being a conservation measure.  
The following farmers and ranchers have installed underground pipelines recently: Grady Harris, Paul Hathaway, Harold Loyd and Loyd Lee, near Mobeetie, Earl Williams and Grady Dodd near Briscoe, Raymond Moore between Kelton and Shamrock, Joe E. Lee Estate near Allison, Emery Crockett near Kellerville, Dr. W. C. Jones and John C. Vise near Wheeler.  
One of the most important things to consider when installing an underground pipeline is to be sure that it is not too small for the amount of water to be delivered through the line. This would up the pumping cost and put extrapressure on the line that might damage it. Care should also be taken during planning that it is placed where it can be used to the most advantage.  
Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assists the Wheeler County Soil and Water District can help you with the planning and design of an irrigation pipeline. They can also help with the design of the
