The following is a list of rules and regulations which paper cups, cigarettes, etc., govern the operation of the Vheeler Municipal Pool. These rules which were set up when the pool first opened in 1959 will be in force at all times and are posted at the pool.

MIGRATION TO BE STUDIED

How to check the flow of rural people into urban centers will be discussed at a regional meeting of the Farmers Home Administration to be held June 25-28 in St. Louis, Mr. L. J. Cappleman, Texas State Director for the agency said today.

Texas officials attending the meeting will include Mr. Cappleman, John L. Barnes, Assistant State Director, L.D. Smith, Rural Development Specialist, Arnold H. Paul Executive officer, J.C. Hayes. Assistant to State Director farm management, J.D. Mc-Kenzie, Chief, Operating Loans and W.E. Lawson, Chief, Community Services.

Agency leaders representing 18 states will attend. Mr. Cappleman said that the Farmers Home Adminis-

tration will loan about \$1.3 billion during the coming year to create jobs in rural America, improve rural housing, strengthen family farms, develop needed rural community facilities.
The main drive in all

Farmers Home Administration programs is to strengthen the economy of rural America, to make it a place that will attract rather then repel people," Mr. Cappleman said. He estimated that 4 mill-

ion people would benefit from the services of the Farmers Home Administration in fiscal 1969. The Farmers Home Ad-

ministration through 1600 county offices located in rural areas in all states provides development credit accompanied by management aid. Funds advanced by the agency are used to help low-income rural families obtain needed resources and raise their incomes and to help disadvantaged rural communities obtain modern community facilities.

As of December 31, 1967. the agency reported losses of less than one percent on funds advanced through current programs. Loans outstanding total

\$4.2 billion.

ved. Total purchases of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares in Texas during April were \$16,729,456 which is an increase of 21 percent over sales during the same period of 1967. Year-to-date sales were \$62,708,055---11 per cent higher than a year ago.

complete emulsification of 10 to 40 gall as of total carrier per acre. If weeds are difficult to kill, higher rates of oil, water and atrazine may be necessary. Weeds larger than six inches may not be killed if they are under moisture stress.

Sorghum should be at least two inches tall on silty clay loam and loam soild and six inches tall on fine sandy loam soil before atrazine treatment is used. If two with two gallons of oil in an oil-water emulsion, sorghum should be at least six inches tall. Do not apply atrazine or any of other herbicides over the top of sorghum in boot or flowering stage. Furthermore, do not use atrazine on loamy sand and

sandy soils. Aerial application of one to two pounds of atrazine per acre is an oil-water emulsion containing five to ten percent oil give good weed kill. Limit the total carrier to a minimum of one gallon for each pound of

atrazine applied. Band or broadcast treatments, either directed at the soil or over the crop, also gives effective weed control. Do not feed sorghum forage to livestock until 60 days after treatment. Plant only sorghum, corn or winter wheat the year following atrazine application. Drift at the time of atrazine application is not toxic to cotton.

Dicamba and 2, 4-D are effective for killing small annual broadleaf weeds. Yields were reduced considerably last year due to improper timing of application of these herbicides. They should be applied when sorghum is 6 to 15 inches tall. Use caution with larger sorghum. Do not treat after the seed head is beginning to emerge into the tip of the boot. Severe head blasting will occur if sorghum is sprayed over the top after this stage.

Apply dicamba at a rate of one-fourth to three-eighths pound per acre broadcast over the top of sorghum. Sprays directed at the base of the sorghum will likely cause lodging. Dicamba will drift if wind and application pressure is high although it is not as toxic to cotton as 2,4-D.

With regards to 2,4-D, one-half pound per acre of any of the formulations offers good weed control. Do not treat wheatland parentage hybrids as serious yields reductions and lodging may occur in some of these.

Since 2,4-D formulations are highly volatile and drift easily, sensitive crops such as cotton can be seriously damaged. Reduce spray drift by using high gallonage (10-20) gallons per acre) and low pressure (15-20 pounds per square inch). Diuron is another good

herbicide for controlling small broadleaf weeds in 15-inch sorghum, apply it as a directed spray to weeds at a rate of two-tenths to four-tenths pounds per acre

in 20 to 40 gallons of water containing one-half percent surfactant. This treatment controls carelessweed that emerge after late irrigation.

MCPA is a new herbicide that is similar to 2,4-D. However, it is somewhat safer and is less toxic to cotton. Treatment and precautions with this herbicide are the same as with 2,4-D.

Remember, time of application is the critical item with regards to post-emergenpounds of atrazine is applied ce weed control in grain sorghum. Severe yield reduction can occur if sorghum is too large. Also, get better weed kill by directing the spray on smaller weeds along rather than over the sorghum. LAWNS:
