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### Briscoe Students To Enroll Monday

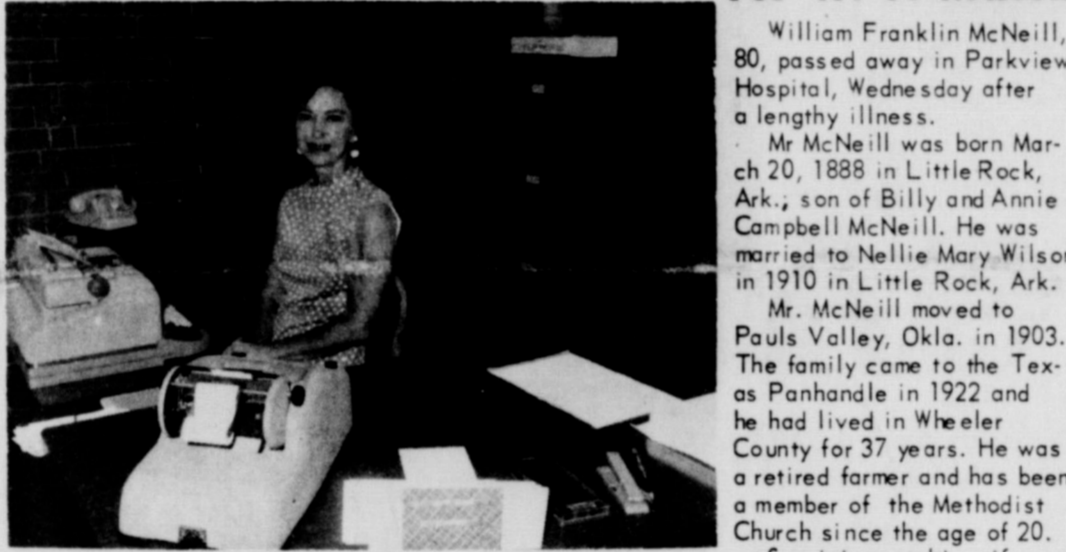

### RESOURCE CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT PROJECT EXPLAINED

An application for the organization of a Resource Conservation and Development (RC & D) project is being prepared to include Wheeler County. Other counties involved will be Collingsworth, Donley, Gray and Hall. An organizational meeting is to be held this Friday, Aug. 23 in Clarendon for the preparation of the application. People representing Wheeler County will be Clarence Zybach, Soil Conservation District Supervisor; County Judge G. W. Hefley, Mayor Don Earney of Wheeler; Mayor R. L. Roberts of Shamrock; John C. Vise, Wheeler Chamber of Commerce; Seibert Worley of Shamrock Chamber of Commerce and Harry Frye of Shamrock, who is Chairman of the five county organization. USDA agency people to attend are Bill Brooks, SCS, John Manning, FHA and Louis Grayson, ASCS and Max Hatter, County Agent. The purpose of the RC&D program is to make more efficient use of all natural resources and to create better living conditions in this area. This program is initiated and developed by local people, primarily through organizations such as the City Council, Chamber of Commerce, Soil Conservation District, etc. Present assistance that is available from federal and state agencies will be utilized. No new agency is to be formed. Some of the problems this project will be expected to overcome are: better use of agricultural land through expanded land use programs; development of adequate water supply systems; additional watershed protection programs; installation of low cost housing units; improvements of community facilities such as libraries, paving, airport, parks, community buildings, etc.; additional industries to utilize natural resources of the area; etc. Any organization, such as civic clubs, study clubs, FFA 4-H, Garden clubs, special commissions etc. that are interested in supporting this project should contact either Harry Frye, Box 310, Shamrock, Texas 79079, phone 296-1104 or Bill Brooks, Box 566, Wheeler, 79096, Ph. 826-4841.

### CITY COUNCIL SWIMMING POOL, DUMP GROUNDS ARE 'PAID OFF'

The City Council of Wheeler met Monday, August 19 in the City building. Completion of payments on notes and the possibility of constructing a maintenance shop for city equipment were the main topics of discussion. The final payments have been made on \$19,900 worth of notes. The Wheeler Municipal Swimming Pool is now "paid off." The pool was completed in 1958 at a cost of \$16,000. The note was not due until 1975. The Council made the final payment in June on the land purchased in 1965 for use as a dump ground. This was in the amount of \$3,900. The council is taking bids on the construction of a maintenance shop and garage. The building will be 72' x 32'; it is to be constructed of concrete block with four large overhead doors in the garage area. The shop will be at one end of the building and will be used for the maintenance of city equipment. The building will include restroom facilities. The new structure will be located east of the water tower. The building presently used for storing of equipment will be removed and the area south of the new building will be used for parking. Bill Brooks of the Soil Conservation office met with the councilmen and explained the Resources, Conservation and Development Program. The four county project is a program for helping city councils, Chambers of Commerce, federated clubs and other organizations develop a project and obtain the funds necessary to see the project through to the finish. The four counties are Wheeler, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall. The City Council adopted a resolution to back this program and will send Mayor Don Earney to a meeting in Clarendon Friday for the organization of the program in this area. The collection of \$162.64 in delinquent property taxes and \$140.09 in real taxes this past month was reported. Steps are being taken to collect the remainder of the delinquent taxes which amount to over \$9,000.00. The problem of loose dogs in the city limits is becoming a problem again. The council voted to contact a dog catcher from Amarillo to take care of the stray dogs.

At noon, a mammoth pit barbecue will be served at the county fairgrounds in the west part of Perryton, with a charge of \$1 per plate, but free tickets are available from Perryton merchants. Fiddlers will tune up for the annual contest, offering \$250 in prize money, beginning at noon. At 2:30 p.m. some 20 of the nation's top money winners will be competing in Championship Steer Roping at the fairgrounds rodeo arena. Rhodes Carnival will be open every night of celebration week and will begin operations at 11 a. m. on Saturday. The sponsoring Perryton Jaycees will man the ticket booths. In addition to the Wheatheart Beauty Contest Saturday evening, the official celebration dance will begin at 9 p. m. in the Veterans Memorial Building with Lou Walker and his band.

The feed lot project is reported to be moving at a satisfactory pace. Wheeler's contribution to the Adobe Walls Scout Camp west of Wheeler is still in the fund raising stage. The project is to enlarge an existing building which is used for storage. The Chamber must raise \$1500 plus donated labor for the completion of the structure. It was agreed by those present that Wheeler is in need of rent houses NOW! 15 families moved into Wheeler the past week; the supply of rent houses in Wheeler is nearly exhausted. A committee began checking Wednesday for ways of filling the need for housing. Bill Brooks explained the Resource Conservation and Development Program and asked that they adopt a resolution to back the program. The Chamber adopted the resolution and voted to send John C. Vise to Clarendon Friday for a meeting to complete the organization of the program in this area.

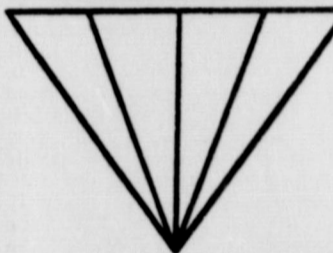

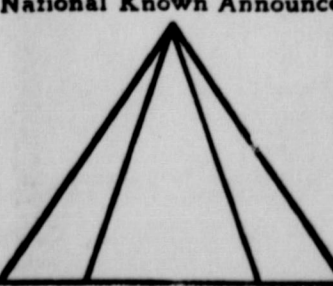

## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR60)

IT IS RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

IT IS RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 1-c.

From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied on any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

2. The State ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974:

## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

IT IS RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. (3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who are dependent on their caretakers of such children. The Legislature may define

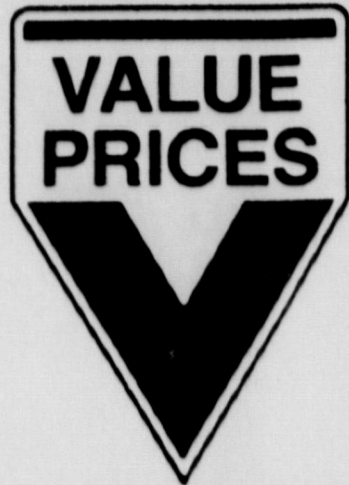
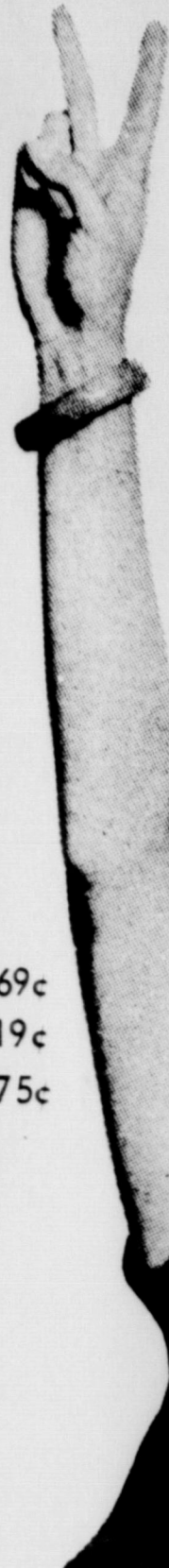
