ELEVEN ATTEND SEMINAR AT AUSTIN OCTOBER 31

A Texas Industrial Planning Seminar for Wheeler was held in Austin Thursday, October 31 in the Sam Houston to fix it up, a plant is going State Office Building.

Four members of the Texas Industrial Commission met with the eleven representatives from Wheeler to give them a program to follow in improving Wheeler with the goal of attracting an industry. Topics of discussion were 'Five Steps in Industrial 1690 Development," "Ideas for Improving the Appearance of Wheeler," "Developing Your Tourist Poetential" and "Research Analysis and Candidate Industries.

> Paved streets, or lack of paving, are one of the first things noticed when a town is being considered for industry. This point was brought out in the Community Development part of the program. The company will want their branch manager to live in a nice house on a paved street.

The people of a community must show enough confidence and have enough pride in a community to fix it up. "If

the people in a community do not have enough confidence and pride in a community to pass it by. They will not put a plant in a dead town!" Eye sores need to be spotted and corrected. Empty store fronts may either be covered over or used by other businesses for display windows. "How much dust needs scraping off our community?"

It was pointed out that Wheeler has a tourist potential. According to records of the Texas Industrial Commission, 1,200 cars pass through Wheeler daily. To attract these tourists and develop tourist industry, Wheeler needs to provide tourists with an enjoyable experience, tell them about Wheeler - through brochures or bill-boards and treat each visitor as a guest.

If Wheeler could keep 24 tourists for 24 hours each day it would be the same as having an industry with an annual payroll of \$100,000.

Wheeler's Industrial Development Committee found at the end of the day that they have a lot of work ahead of them. But the people of Whee ler cannot set back and let the committee do all the work Attracting an industry will have to be a community effort. The first step in the right direction will be paying the streets. The second thing the citizens need to do is correct the eye sores.

Wheeler has many fine points, but the few bad points overshadow the good.

Greenbugs in Wheat: Populations of Greenbugs in the county are ranging from one to five per foot. We encourage farmers to check their fields periodically, about once a week, as long as weather conditions are optimum for greenbug reproduction. Once the temperature dips below the 50 degree Mr. and Mrs. A. C. D'Spain mark, greenbug reproduction and activity will amost reach a standstill. Only those populations of 25 to 50 greenbugs per linear foot of row on young plants will warrant treatment. A guide to follow in determining the need for treatment based on plant height (in inches) and the number of greenbugs per linear foot is: 3-6 inches, 100-300 greenbugs: 4-8 inches, 200-400 greenbugs, and 6-16 inches 300-800 greenbugs. We'll continue to make surveys from time to time and try to

she'd like to come by again. Peach Tree Borers: We've had several calls recently about the control of peach tree borers. We believe the most satisfactory way to control them is to spray the trunks with dieldrin in early July and again in mid-September. However the lesser peach tree borer can be con rolled by applying a mixture of 2 pounds of Paradichlorobenzene (PDB or mathball crystals) disolved in one gallon of miscible dormant oil and mixed with two gallons of water. This would be applied by painting this material on the trunk of the tree in the warmer days of this month and December. Treat-

from now till December 15. Directions for treatment with the crystals can be obtained from us. Application techniques are important as the mounds of treated soil must be removed in the spring to prevent damage to the trunk. That's the big reason we prefer the Dieldrin treatment in
