Registration Deadline For Voters Is Near

Residents of Wheeler County have only until January 31, to register for voting in elections during 1969. Thurman Rives, tax assessor-collector, reminded citizens this week.

At the same time, he urged that residents not wait until the last minute to obtain registration certificates.

All persons over 60 years of age must register this year, along with those in other age brackets, if they wish to qualify to vote in all elections, Rives explained.

Persons may register at the county tax office in the

courthouse in Wheeler or at the City Hall in Shamrock. An application form appears on an inside page and also below in this issue of the Times.

There is no fee for registering in order to obtain a certificate to vote since the poll tax has been abolished.

Rev. Snell Rites Read In San Angelo

Chaplain Huey E. Snell, 63 of San Angelo died at Mc-Knight Hospital, Ja. 14.

Services were held at 10 A.M. Friday in Johnson's Funeral Home Chapel with Chaplain Wendell Russell, Director of Chaplains of State Hospitals of Texas, officiating and the Rev. Dr. Gordon Clinard, pastor of First Baptist Church and the Rev. Roy Shahan, retired Baptist minister, assisting. Graveside services were in Lamesa Memorial Cemetery in Lamesa.

The Rev. Mr. Snell retired in April 1968 after 14 years of service as chaplain at Wichita Falls State Hospital. He was the first and only Texan to have completed the required psychiatric training for chaplain duties in a mental hospital.

A graduate of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Ft. Worth, the Rev. Mr. Snell studied at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls and at Sul Ross State College. He authored a book and several magazine articles.

He was born Jan. 20, 1905 in Walnut Springs. He was married to Ethel Pruitt,

March 11, 1928 in Clyde, Texas.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. W. R. Champion of Atlanta, Ga.; two brothers; three sisters and four grandsons. He was the son-in-law of O. D. Pruitt of this city and a brother-in-law to Mrs. Walter L. Williams, also of Wheeler.

From Last Week . . .

ACROSS THE FENCE

Cold winter days slowed things down last week. Most of us found zero degree temperature undesirable, to say the least. Believe that's the coldest weather we've seen since we've lived in the county. At least we had the laugh on the folks watching the cotton bowl game in Dallas who were suffering in the low thirties while our temperature was in the low sixties, clear and warm.

Now that spring's just around the corner, home gardeners need to be doing some of the things that will help in the garden when time hangs heavy later on.

We ran across a good idea on controlling crown gall on fruit trees a few days ago. Crown gall is a cancer or tumor-like growth occurring on the trunks of fruit and ornamental trees. Rabbits and rats that gnaw on one tree can pick up the organism from one tree and spread it throughout the orchard. Placing hardware cloth around the trunk of the tree should give good protection from rabbits and other rodents.

Farmers and ranchers won't want to forget they can deduct 4¢ per gallon of gasoline used in farming or

ranching from their income tax report for 1968. The Federal Gasoline Tax refund is now claimed as a tax credit on the annual income tax report if the report is filed on time. In addition, a tax credit of 6¢ per gallon on lubricating oils and 2¢ per gallon on diesel and special motor fuels not used in highway vehicles are deductible. Details of these and other tax credits are available in the 1968 Farmers Tax Guide in our office.

A kind of dilemma is facing many cotton farmers on the Texas Plains concerning the growing of longer staple varieties. There has been a rapid movement to the production of longer fibered cottons over the last two years, but prices during the past season have been disappointing to growers. At present, textile mills are more interested in shorter staple cottons because they are cheaper.

A partial answer goes back to last year's market activity. Stocks of longer staple cottons have increased rapidly relative to short staple cottons. As a result, mills have a good supply of long staple cotton on hand. Furthermore, last year's

longer staple cotton is still bringing \$15 to \$25 more per bale than short staple cotton. Another encouraging aspect is that cotton breeders are developing longer staple, stormproof varieties which have the yield ability of the old 15-16 inch cottons.

In yield trials in Dawson County the past season, researchers from the Texas A&M University Center at Lubbock found that new stormproof cottons with an inch plus staple averaged slightly more in yield than old 15-16 inch varieties. Yield was 646 lbs of lint per acre for the longer staple varieties compared to 605 pounds for the short staple varieties.

Longer staple varieties in the trials included Pam-master 111, Lockett 4789, Lockett 4789A, Lankart 3840, Lambright X-15-5, Stripper-Cala S and Tamco 788.

Let's continue to strive to produce high quality cotton. This means cotton with a relatively long, strong fiber that is well matured. Mills with increasingly higher spinning speeds will continue to need and demand longer, stronger fiber in the future.

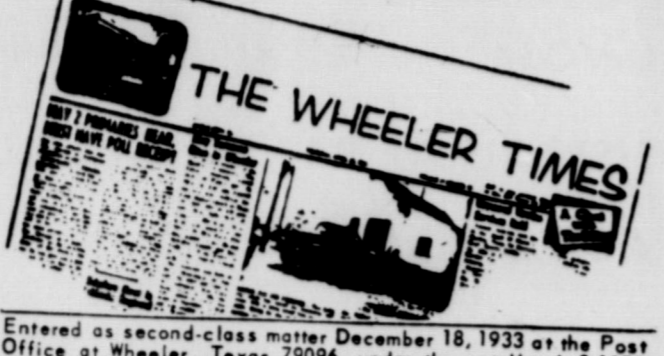

INTERESTING HINTS

BY BRENDA HOFMANN, CHDA

The following are some miscellaneous hints that you might find interesting.

- Whipping cream does not freeze successful. However, cream may be whipped, sweetened, and flavored and then froze in individual serving portions.

- A storage temperature of 0 degrees F. or lower is needed to maintain the best quality in frozen foods. At higher freezing temperatures chemical changes cause food to lose color, flavor and characteristic texture. Use a thermometer and take the temperature reading in several locations to check accurately.

- Premiums paid on health insurance policies usually can be deducted from income tax - up to a certain point. Deduction of insurance premiums as a medical expense are limited to payments which cover medical care such as diagnosis, cure, treatment, or prevention of disease. Be sure to keep a record of all medical costs.

- If a few drops of lemon juice are required for a recipe, just stick a fork in one end

of a lemon and squeeze out the needed juice instead of cutting the whole lemon in half.

- Add a cup of crushed cornflakes to a favorite chocolate chip cookie recipe for an extra crisp cookie.

- Try a new flavor for pot roasts or meat loaves by basting them during cooking with the spiced vinegar left over from canned sweet pickles.

- When packing, wrap your jewelry and other fragile items in tissue paper or in a pair of socks and pack into shoes. Anytime you pack at night for an early morning departure, leave the bag open overnight. The air will keep things from wrinkling.

- Is food more expensive? Today food is one of our best values. Americans now spend a smaller part of our income for food than ever--in 1961 the average American spent 21% of his income after taxes on food. In 1968 he spent 17% of his income after taxes.

Control Brush like we did the Screwworm? This is the problem and opportunity facing the newly formed Texas Brush Control Association. In many parts of the state, carrying capacity of rangeland has decreased by at least 50% and it is estimated that nearly 82% of our rangeland is plagued by this problem. By banding together and pledging a penny an acre over a 5 year period, ranchers in Texas will try to find a solution to their problem and more economical and practical ways to control brush. We salute the ranchers. They are not waiting for the government to solve this problem. This effort should start with the people most concerned, the ranchers, since they will profit most from an effective brush control program. A coordinator for the Wheeler County Brush Control and Range Improvement Foundation has been named. He is Clarence Zybach, Briscoe. Mr. Zybach is on the board of Supervisors of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. In addition he is chairman of the Live-

stock-Crops Subcommittee of the County Program Building Committee. Folks like Glen Bell, John Vermillion, Dusan Pakan, Tom Puryear, Dan Macina and John Daberry are backing this program. It is anticipated that the County Organization will help raise the necessary funds with the help of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee. With rancher support and interest, we predict an effective attack can be made on brush similar to the recent screwworm campaign. How many horses do we have? This is a question asked frequently. A study made by Theracoin, Inc. of Topeka, Kansas estimates the total Texas horse population at close to 580,000 head. The value of the horses based on an average of \$234 per head comes to almost \$136 million. That's greater than the value of all hogs, sheep, goats, turkeys and chickens in the state.
