ACROSS the FENCE

Wheat Farmers who were going to water at the heading stage can forget it. We've got the moisture now. Wheat that was in the critical stage was really helped. Planting of cotton and maize will begin in earnest in a few weeks. Bob Zybach, Briscoe, reports that he is grazing most of his wheat out and is getting a lot of good grazing and will get more with the good rain.

With all the emphasis on herbicides in maize and cotton, let's don't forget that mechanical cultivation is still a necessary part of almost any weed control program. We suggest a combination of tillage, herbicides and crop rotation. That is unless a farmer has a lot of surplus labor to hand-hoe it, however, we haven't met any farmers in that situation recently.

We have observed at least 15 to 20 farm auctions this part year held in our county. Something we might as well get ready for is that it's going to take less people to run

cattle than it is to run tractors with row crops.

We'd like to invite folks to attend the 30th Anniversary Celebration and Open House of the recently expanded facilities at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center, Bushland on this coming Saturday, May 17. We will have an opportunity to meet and hear an address by our new Secretary of Agriculture, Dr. Clifford M. Hardin. The open house will begin at 9 a.m. and following the secretary's address, research plots will be toured. Several County Agents will be serving as tour guides. Noticed that Bryan Swain, a former County Agent from Wheeler County will be serving as tour guide. It's my understanding that Bryan took Joe Van Zandt's place as County Agent in Moore County. Joe's dad, C. J. Van Zandt tells us Joe is liking his new job with the Texas Cattle Feeders. We wish Joe a lot of luck in his job. We understand Joe was doing a top-notch job up in Dumas

town.

This Soil Stewardship Week. Conservation of our soil and water is everyone's responsibility. Wouldn't it be nice if we could save some of the moisture we have now for use later when we need it?

We've been flooded with calls from homeowners concerned about outer space looking orange globs occurring on Junipers in their yards. It's really not anything harmful to humans but it is unsightly and damages evergreens. The name of the culprit is Cedar Apple Rust. Later on large galls will form. These will serve as sources of infection for next year's outbreak. Any rust is helped by high humidity and moisture like we've been having the past few days. Folks should avoid planting Junipers near apple trees or hawthornes. The cedar apple galls should be removed. Lime sulphur and copper sulphate sprays are recommended. The high humidity is also favorable for development of fire blight on apples and pear trees. If your trees look like a blow torch has gone over the growing tips, you can mark this up to fireblight.

TEXAS POLITICS

The fat is in the fire on the Appropriations Bill. Speaker Mutscher has gone along with Lt. Gov. Barnes on the one-year bill. The play is that we can pass a one-year bill with no new taxes and then come back next year in a Special Session and pass a tax bill for the next year.

Certainly this sounds real good to all of us, but I just can't see how it could work. We are supposed to have a surplus of around \$75 million as of August 31 and the talk is that we need around \$250 million in new revenue for the two-year period.

This would make about \$325 million besides what comes in. So, it would look to me like we would have to raise close to that much money in one year instead of two. Besides that, there is the cost of \$500,000 for a Special Session in addition to that fact that by next year there would be a lot more people wanting more money.

Be that as it may - Governor Smith remains to be reckoned with. He has consistently opposed the one-year plan and I feel sure that he will veto it if we pass it. Now, when you read this, several days will have passed and maybe something will already have happened. He

can call us back in a Special Session anytime he wants to and it would take a 2/3rds vote to override his veto.

So, as of Friday, the question is who's bluffing and who has the best hand. The way I see it, Barnes and Mutscher probably have Kings back-to-back, but I think Smith has an Ace-in-the-hole which would give him a pair of Aces. You don't have to have ever played any

poker to know that Aces beat Kings. Of course, they may each have deuces-in-the-hole. Anyhow, there's a big pot in the middle and it's going to be an interesting game to sweat out.

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PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations and other restrictions, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. "Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution, provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state. "Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-d of Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature. "Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. "Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successors or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. "Sec. 2. The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such laws shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature. "Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

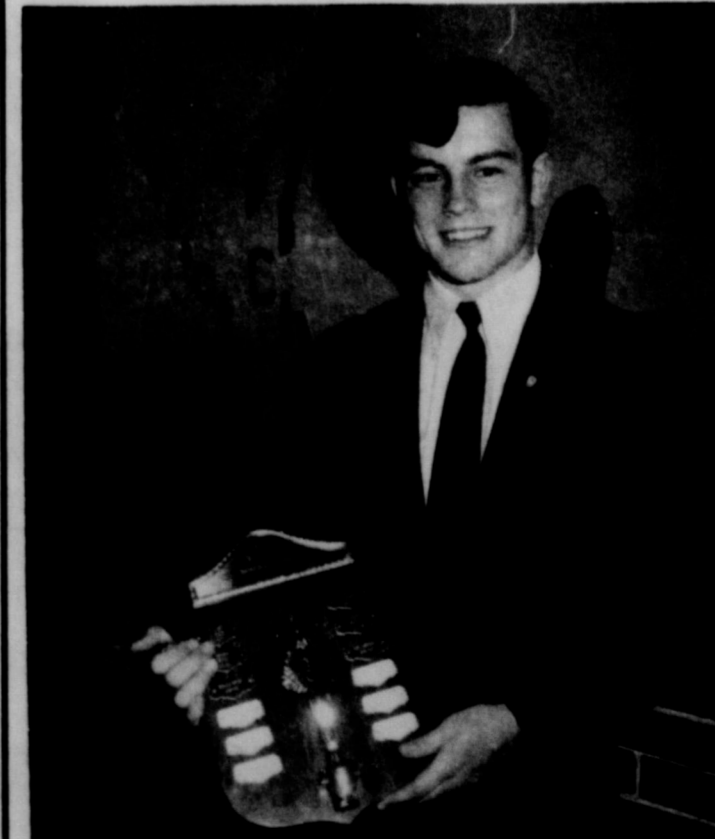
