# RATTLERS FALL TO MUSTANGS

The Wheeler Mustangs, behind a ground eating offense, shellacked the Stinnett Rattlers last Friday night in blanking the visitors from the high plains 20-0.

Playing at home must have been a good tonic for the Mustangs as they calked up their second win of the season.

The Mustangs stayed on the ground to whip the Rattlers although the icing on the cake was a 7 yard pass from Roy Don Chick to Steve Simmons on fourth down gave the Rattlers a first down at the Mustang 7.

and drove to the Wheeler 15 before losing the ball. The Rattlers drive was aided by two successive 15 yard penalties against the Mustangs.

During the course of the game, the Mustangs were flagged down 15 times for a total of 123 yards and this hurt them time after time.

The Rattlers made their most serious threat early in the second period after getting the ball at the Wheeler 48 on a punt. A big pass play on fourth down gave the Rattlers a first down at the Mustang 7.

Two running plays netted a yard and the Mustangs were penalized half the distance for a personal foul down to the 3. The flag flew in favor of the Mustangs on the next play and Stinnett drew 15 back to the Wheeler 20. Jimmie Cole and Steve Simmons knocked down passes as the Mustangs had thwarted the

Rattlers deepest penetration.

The alert Mustang defense gave the Mustangs an opportunity in the third quarter and it didn't take the offense long to capitalize. Roy Chick pounded out 9 yards before Dave Britt broke free off the middle and bounced off a tackler and went 36 yards to put the Mustangs further out of reach.

Rodney Weatherly hit Keith Wood with a pass in the left flat for the two point.

Stinnett couldn't get anything going on the ground as the Mustang forward wall led by Buddy Wood, Gary Davis and Gail Leabetter threw up a stout defense and forced the Rattlers to go to the air. Little better success was gained by this avenue as the Mustangs played their best pass defense of the year.

Gambling in their end of the field late in the game was unsuccessful for Stinnett and the Mustangs had the chance for the final scoring. Taking over at the Rattler 30, the Mustangs used the slashing off tackle runs of Chick and the quick openers with Jimmie Cole lugging the leather to move to the Rattler 7.

Chick started to his right on the sweep when he slipped and tossed the pigskin to Steve Simmons who made a falling catch in the corner of the end zone. Wood's kick was good but nullified as the Mustangs were guilty of interlocking on the try. The next try was far enough but wide to left.

Stinnett made no headway in the 2:37 that remained.

Gold trophies will be awarded to the first place winners of each age group, silver to the second place winners and bronze to the third place winners. Registration closes Oct. 10th so all boys 8 thru 13 are urged to go with their mom, dad or legal guardian to registrations headquarters at Pete Burton Ford in Wheeler or Burton Ford in Shamrock.

Also, all District winners go with their parents to Area Competitions held in NFL team stadiums. The 12 national finalists compete during the half-time in the annual NFL play-off game in Orange Bowl in Miami, Fla. They and their parents also take an exclusive tour of Cape Kennedy, the history making site of the Apollo moon shots and the Air Space Museum.

The Wheeler County contest is being held this year in Wheeler under the direction of Wheeler Coach Jake Cottrell and his staff.

Plans are to alternate the location of the competition each year, being in Shamrock on even years and Wheeler in odd years.

## Silverton Owlets Defeat Colts

The Wheeler Colts were the victims of the big plays last Thursday night and lost their second game of the season to the Silverton Owlets by the score of 22-14.

Trailing 16-0 at halftime, the Colts made a gallant effort to garner a tie but a pass interception killed the threat at the midfield stripe with 31 seconds remaining.

A fumble recovery at the Colt 31 gave the Owlets excellent field position midway of the first period and it took only one punt by the fine Owlet tailback, Cardwell, to get the distance. Running the two point try, the Owlets built an 8-0 lead.

The Colts mounted a drive in the second period that culminated in a TD but it was wiped out by a holding fine. Lewis Britt circled his left end for the apparent tying touchdown but the Colts were guilty of holding and the Colts were penalized back to the Silverton 19.

Cardwell intercepted a pass at his ten yard line after the penalty and dashed 90 yards for the second Owlet touchdown with 2:29 to play in the half. Once more the two point try was good and even though the Owlets had only one first down at the half, they had 16 points on the board.

The Colts recovered the second half kickoff at the Owlet 42 and proceeded to drive the distance in seven plays with Rusty Cole going over from one yard out. Cole added the two points and the Colts cut the margin to 8.

Another fumble recovery, this one at the Silverton 43, set up the Colts last touchdown. The Colts were quick to take advantage of the situation and hit paydirt in 3 plays. Britt got 27 yards off his left tackle and Cole came back for 13 more at the same spot for another first down at the Silverton 3. Cole banged into the end zone on the following play. The run was no good for the extra points.

Cole's kickoff was fielded by Cardwell at the Silverton 35 and played his blockers perfectly to break in the open and go in for the final score of the night.

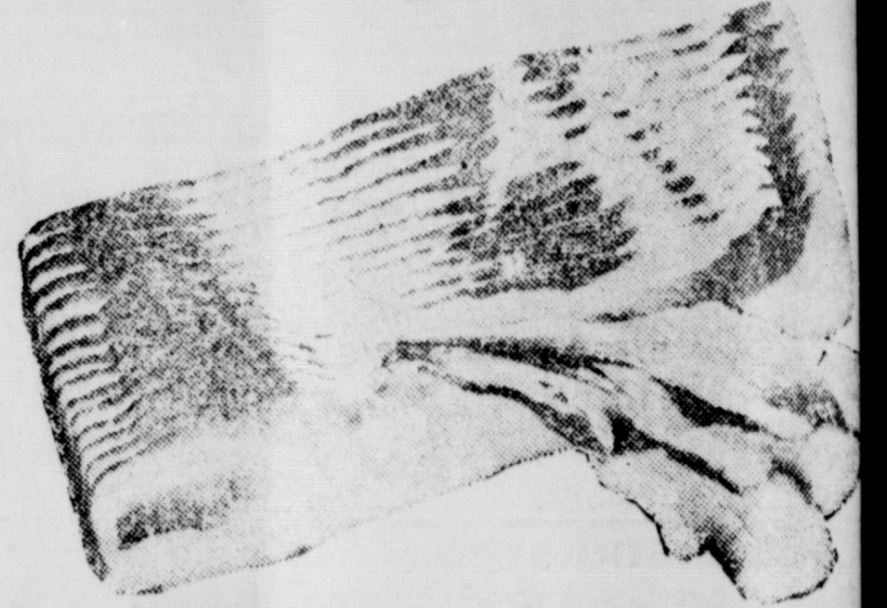

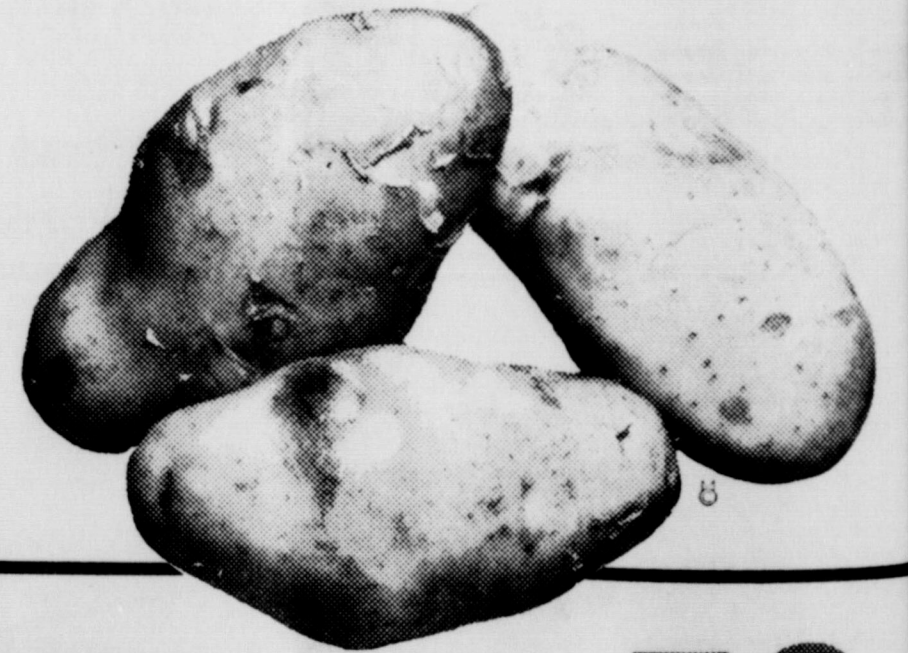

## Across the Fence

Excellent soil moisture for growing wheat is in the ground. A lot of folks have put off planting wheat in hopes the fall armyworm would fizzle out. In the meantime, a lot of wheat already up and growing has been sprayed. Joe Shelton, Mobeetie sprayer pilot, told us he had sprayed 6,000 acres. Control has been excellent. This is the third week of infestation and we look for the armyworms to let us. While serving as county agent in East Texas, we looked for an invasion of worms nearly every other fall. They leave almost overnight. At the same time, a man that has worms working in his wheat, can not afford to wait for the

liquid fertilizer carrier has given excellent control. Of primary importance is the compatibility of the insecticide with the fertilizer.

Worms do not appear to be too selective. They feed on small grains, native and lawn grasses and young alfalfa. Warm weather has been the best deterrent in our experience, since cool weather is unfavorable to the production of many insect enemies of the worm and the favorable moisture situation provides conditions for good plant growth, upon which the larvae thrives. Warren Pickens, the Hemphill Co. Agent told the Amarillo paper, he had been at Canadian and on Lady in Shamrock told me she saw armyworms there 20 years ago when she first moved there. Since residue problems in spraying may be encountered, especially where hay crops are nearby, we suggest that you come by and secure control measures from us if you feel the need to spray.

Prospects for a cotton crop appear to be dim at present. Boll weevils, the cotton boll worms and excessive moisture causing boll rot will contribute to the pessimism for this year's crop. E. B. Stevens, Wheeler says he isn't getting optimistic about the cotton crop either.

It's an idea of ours that much of the acreage of small grains grown in Wheeler Co. would produce more grazing or grain if it were adequately fertilized. Nitrogen and phosphorus are the nutrients most often deficient in soils of this area. Research studies show that phosphorus is needed during the early growth period of the plant; therefore we feel it should be applied before or at planting.

Nitrogen is required throughout the growing season and part of it should be applied near planting time to stimulate early vegetative growth; especially if the crop is to be grazed and aid in developing a root system that can withstand low winter temperatures. Late winter nitrogen top dressings are needed for continued grazing and grain production.

Community Water Systems Boom to Texas Rural Areas: One of the most far reaching economic and social developments in Texas is the rural community water system program. As you drive down the road, chances are that you won't go far until you spot one of these systems. Water

is vital for progress. These systems have eliminated many of the unpleasant tasks of water hauling, pump repairs, freezing, and low wells. Many areas are adding new homes as the result of an adequate water supply. At the present time a survey is being conducted to determine the need for these type of systems in our country. Bill Lawson, Farmers Home Administration, Temple, the man who heads the agency that underwrites local bank loans for the project, told me this week that Texas now has 513 operative water systems, 62 under construction, 70 being processed and 78 applications being considered. This is a total of 723 systems for Texas and exceeds all other states. Mississippi is second with approximately 400 systems.

**Rural Sewage Disposal System:** Another development that means much to Texas is the rural community sewage program. Twenty of these systems are in operation, 16 are under construction, 18 are being processed and 27 applications are being considered. Complete details of this program can be secured from John Manning, Farmers Home Administration, Wheeler, Texas.
