MALOUF ABRAHAM IS CANDIDATE FOR SENATOR

Malouf "Oofie" Abraham, State Representative from the 79th District has announced his candidacy for Senator from the 31st District.

Abraham, well known Panhandle Republican, first expressed his appreciation for the thirty years of excellent service rendered to the Panhandle by Senator Hazlewood. In the event he has no opposition in the Republican Primary, he will not launch his active campaign until late summer. However, he plans to do extensive visiting over the twenty county area in the meantime.

Along with most Panhandle residents, Abraham is concerned about the rapid increase in cost of running our State Government. With over a sixty per cent increase in four years time, Abraham has consistently urged a modernization and consolidation of State Agencies and has opposed non-essential spending. He feels that he can accomplish more towards these ends in the Senate.

A lifetime resident of Canadian, he has had a vast experience in many phases of business, especially Agriculture and the Petroleum Industry, which are the main resources of this area. His two terms as Mayor of Canadian and his two terms as Representative are among his assets. He has served on the Education, Urban Affairs, Revenue & Taxation, Parks & Wildlife, Livestock &

Stockraising, and other important committees and is presently serving on two special interim committees. He has the distinction of being the first Republican to run unopposed for re-election to the Legislature.

He stated that he planned a low pressure people-to-people type campaign, running on his own merits and would do his best to serve the people of the district, regardless of party or place of residence.

He is married to the former Iris Lewis of Canadian and they have three children: Dr. Malouf Abraham, Jr., of Canadian, Mrs. Mert (Betty) Cooper of Stinnett, and Bill Ed Abraham of Dallas. They have five grandchildren, but you better not get him started on that.

At the banquet, the new Chamber of Commerce officers for 1970 will be installed. Master of Ceremonies for the evening will be Jim Wright. James Verden

will introduce the guests and present the special awards.

Wright will install the officers for the coming year. Chamber president for 1970 will be N. D. Ware, Jr., owner of Ware Chevrolet Co. Vice President for a second term will be Cecil Pierce, employee of Lee Hardware and Furniture and area farmer and rancher. Mrs. Richard Wallace will serve as Chamber secretary. Directors for the coming year are John C. Vise, Cecil Pierce, John Manning, Kenneth Carter and Stanley Jagers. Retiring officers are Garland Abernethy, president; Cecil Pierce, vice-president; and Inez Erwin, secretary. W. D. Mitchell will retire from the board of directors and John C. Vise will continue in this capacity.

O. F. "Pappy" Holt announced this week that he will be a candidate for the office of Constable in the May 2, 1970 primaries.

School Census is Being Taken

The School Districts in the State of Texas are required to make a school census enumeration during the month of January.

All persons between the ages of six and seventeen are to be included in the school census. Census blanks have been distributed to all students in the Wheeler Schools, who are currently enrolled. The most difficult part of census enumeration is to get an accurate count of all pre school students who will be six years of age before September 1, 1970.

Parents with pre-school children are urged to make every effort to have their children included in the 1970 school census. School census blanks are available at the Wheeler School Business Office.

After two years of experience each patrolman is eligible for promotion to Sergeant in the uniform services and also eligible for transfer into the Narcotic and Intelligence Sections.

All interested young men who feel like they meet these requirements are urged to contact the nearest Texas Department of Public Safety office or patrolman for an application and details.

Mr. Frye, who was born on his father's ranch in Wheeler County, was one of the first students to attend the Old Rock School House which is now a historical site in the county.

He had lived in the county all but five years of his life.

Mr. Frye started a chain of lakes on his ranch in 1937 and later leased them to a

fishing club. He was a former cooper of the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District.

Survivors include a daughter Mrs. Leah Belle Adkins of San Bernardino, Calif.; a son, Clint G. of Chickasha, Okla.; a sister, Mrs. Nelie Puryear of Boulder City, Nev.; a brother, Harry T. Frye of Wheeler; three grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

The rancher raised one granddaughter, Mrs. Robert Hayakawa of Aniak, Alaska, during her childhood.

HIGHS SPEED CHASE ENDS NEAR CANADIAN

The robbery of a service station West of Shamrock was followed by a high speed chase through Wheeler and the arrest of five hippie type characters a mile South of Canadian.

The Standard Service Station, one mile West of Shamrock on Interstate 40, was robbed Saturday evening at 8:15. Using a hunting knife, \$150.00 was taken from the attendant. The thieves pulled out from the station, headed East on I-40.

Leaving Wheeler to investigate the burglary, County Sheriff Bus Dorman met the automobile six miles South of Wheeler. The car was traveling an estimated 80-90 miles per hour. Deputy Doyle Ramsey in Wheeler was notified of the car's approach. The car passed under the red light in Wheeler, traveling an estimated speed of 90-105.

The chase was continued North on highway 83. The car ran a Highway Patrol roadblock on the Washita.

With the help of a cattle truck the Hemphill County Sheriff was able to slow the car and stop it a mile South of Canadian.

The five men were taken into Canadian. They were

later taken to Shamrock where Justice of Peace Cecil Emerson set bond for three of the men at \$5,000. Two were denied bond.

Four of the men were from Minnesota and one was from California. Those arrested ranged in age from 17-21. All the money was recovered.

Employment- Applicants are urged to contact any Texas Department of Public Safety office or patrolman for an ap-

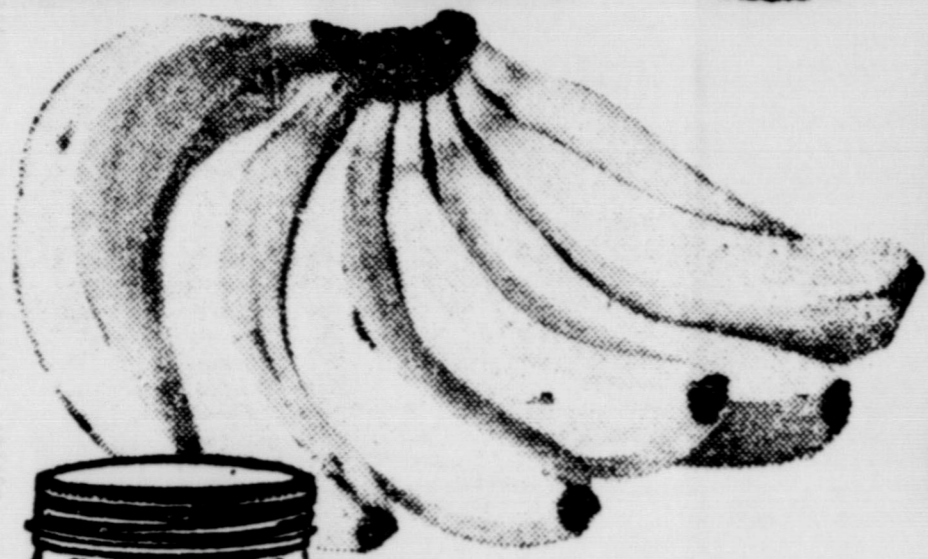
Training School for Area Police

The FBI will hold a thirty-day Training School here at Clarendon College January 12th thru the 16th. The Clarendon Police Department is sponsoring the school along with the FBI which include fingerprinting, narcotics, safe burglaries, counterfeiting, traffic investigations and other law subjects.

This course will be good toward the 140 hours now required by the state for law officers. There are some of the best instructors available to direct the course. The special agent, Thomas O'Maley of the Amarillo office, to be the main coordinator. Police Chief Gary Gerdes and Daniel Archuleta now have 48 hours credit toward the two weeks of school held by the FBI recently in Pampa. As indicated by the title, the publication has been prepared as an aid to help farmers with tax problems peculiar to their industry. Sample forms, filled out as examples, together with explanations, are used liberally in the guide.

Such subjects as income to be reported, farm business expenses, operating loss deductions, capital expenditures, farm inventories, depreciation and depletion, capital gains and losses, the sale of a farm, soil and water conservation and many others are covered in the 48-page publication.

Farmers may pick up a single copy without cost at Wheeler.

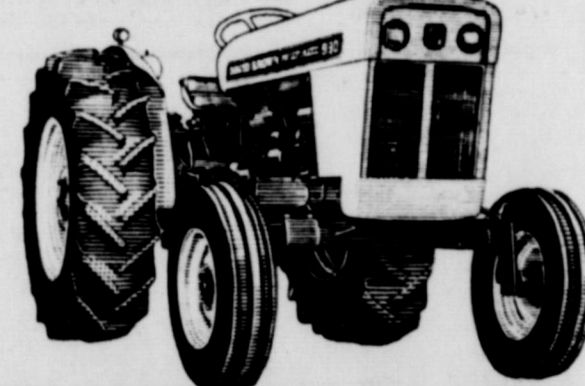

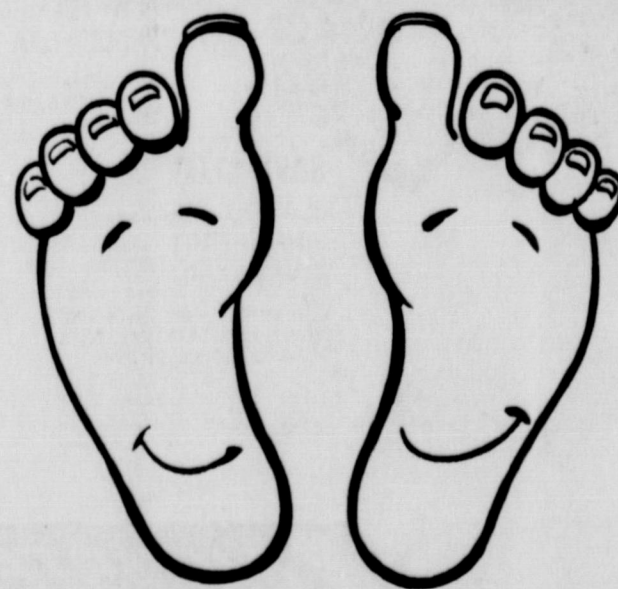
