"With approximately three months left until the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers, only 14 per cent of the registered vehicles in Wheeler County have been inspected," stated Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safe-

'This will be the last to a year - around inspecers will display the number of the month in which the vehicle was inspected and will be valid through that month of the following year,

added Major Bell. Two items have been added to the inspection list- the exhaust system and the exhaust emission system. A car must now have a muffler and it must be free from leaks. All cars manufactured in 1968 or later coming from the factory equipped with the emmission system (commonly known as the smog device), still must have the device connected and in

Wheeler County now has 4 official inspection stations that are ready and capable of handling the inspection of vehicles in this area if owners will not wait until a few
