The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of April, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple. Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in five persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$8,575.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1970 shows a total of 32 accidents resulting in 30 persons killed, 14 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$29,475.00.

Shamrock Obtains Housing Project

A \$238,000 insured loan to construct a rental housing development at Shamrock in Wheeler County, Texas, has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration, reports J. Lynn Futch, the Agency's State Director.

The loan to Shamrock Apartment Homes, Inc. will finance the construction of 19 apartments. This housing project will serve the need in the Shamrock area for rental housing priced within the means of rural senior citizens of low and moderate income, and other rural families of low and moderate income.

Funds for the insured loan will be provided by private investors, with Farmers Home Administration servicing the loan and guaranteeing repayment along with interest. The loan will be repaid in 50 years at an interest rate of 6-1/4 percent. The project will be eligible for benefits of the Interest Supplement provision of the Housing Act of 1968.

The 19 unit housing project will be composed of five separate buildings. Building No. 1 will be a two-story structure with eight one-bedroom apartments, 695 square feet in area. These are designed primarily for single people, couples, or senior citizens. Building No. 2, a single-story building, will have four two-bedroom apartments, 826 square feet each. Building No. 3 will have two two-bedroom and one three-bedroom apartments. Three three-bedroom and one four-bedroom apartments will be in Building No. 4.

A typical unit will have a combination living room and dining area approximately 12 by 21 feet, a 12 by 12 foot bedroom, a completely equipped kitchen and a bathroom.

The community building is designed for outside storage; however, one room is set aside for social and recreational activities of the tenants. There will be vending machines for cold drinks, etc.

Leroy Madrid, 4, Killed Wed.

Leroy Madrid, four year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Madrid, was killed Wednesday morning about noon when he was hit and crushed by a flower box at 1108 S. Main.

The flower box approximately 6 feet long was attached to the house near the back door it was also being held by some bricks. It is not known if the children pulled on the box, or what caused it to fall.

Leroy, his sister, Dianne, and Steve Guthrie were playing at the Guthrie residence at the time of the accident. The box fell on all three children. The boy died on his way to the hospital.

Notice Is Given Ex-Students

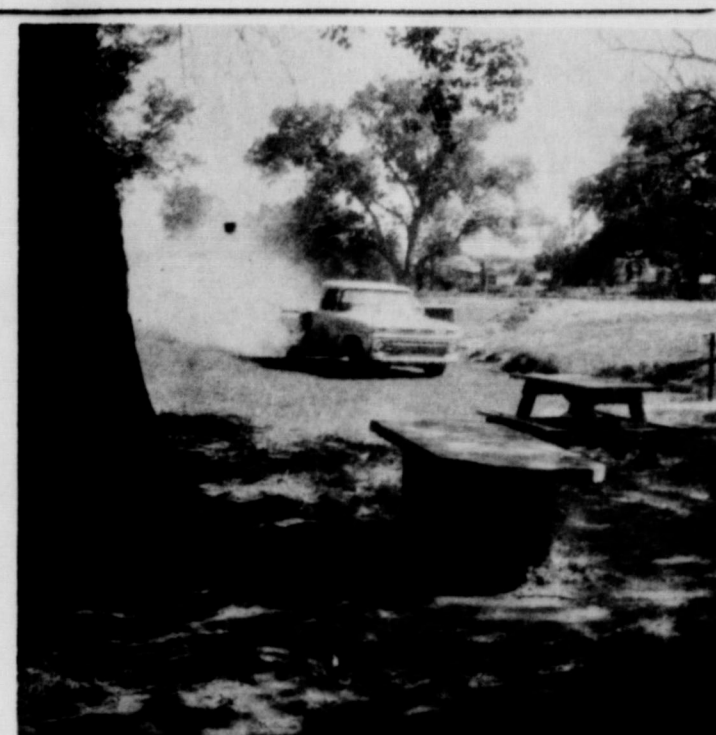

Wins Trip

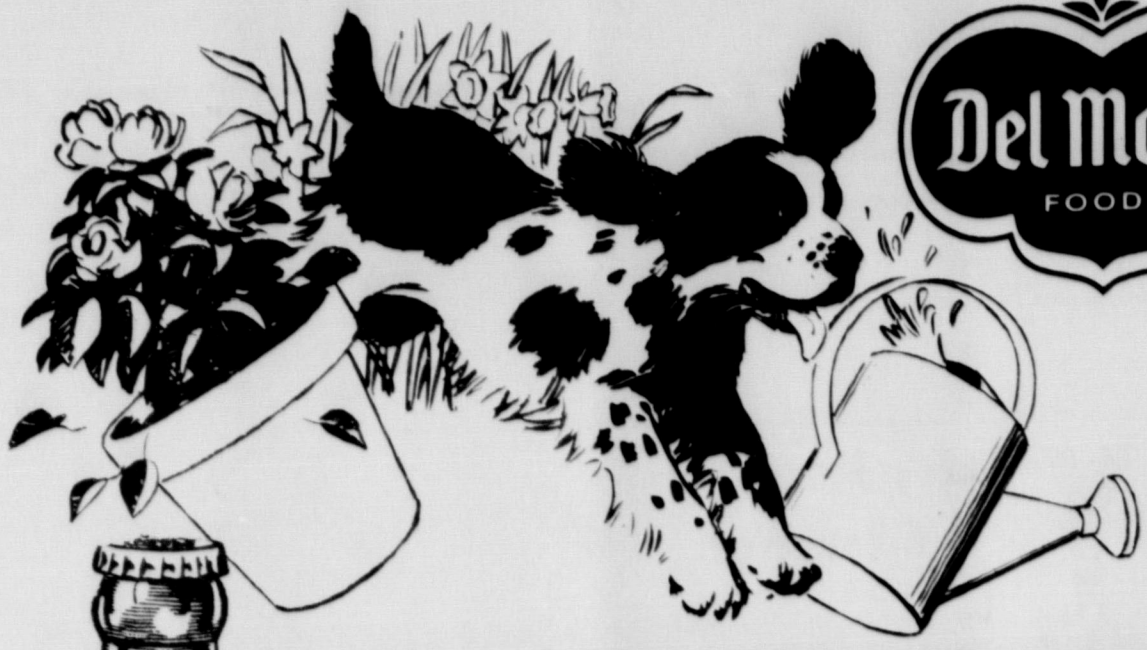

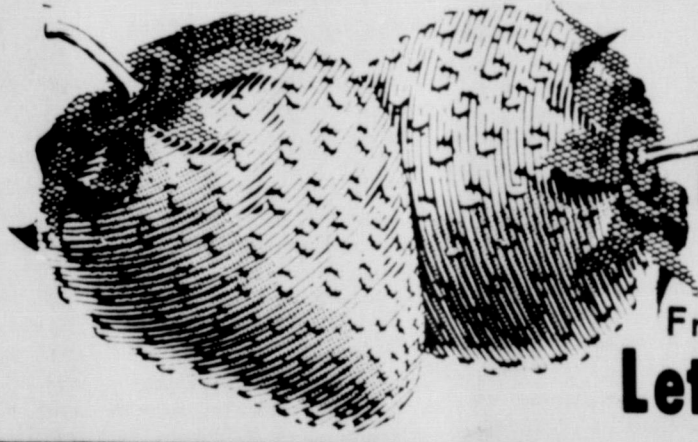

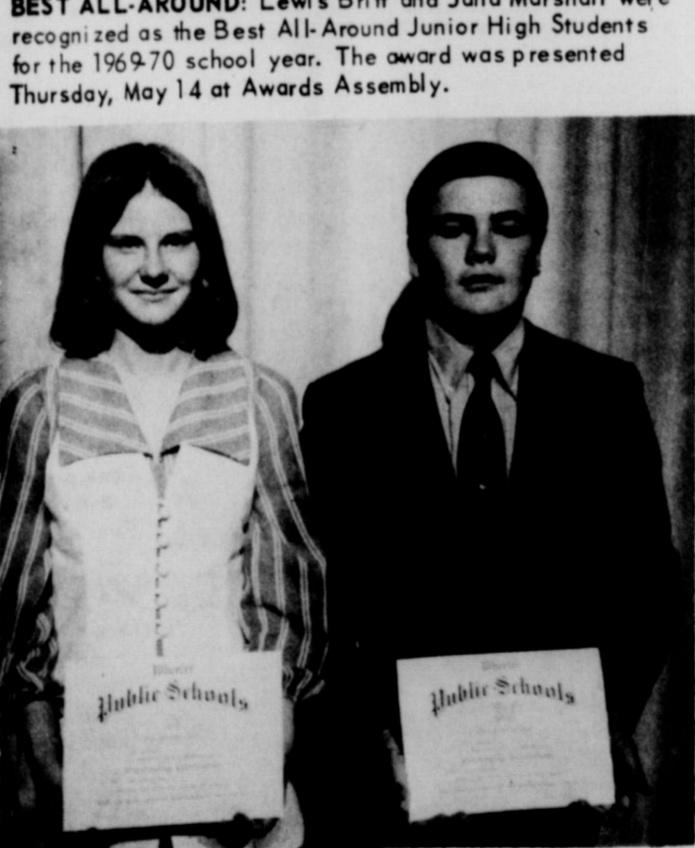

Developing Sprinkler Irrigation systems

To develop a sprinkler system so it will work at it's highest efficiency there are several vital facts that need to be known. It is very unwise to just take a shot in the dark and buy a system and know nothing about it.

The first and probably the most important fact to know in developing a sprinkler system, is to be sure of just how much water is available for irrigation. For conservation irrigation systems it is usually safe to try to irrigate about one acre of crop for each seven to ten gallons of water per minute available.

Another very important fact to consider is the type soil to be irrigated. Sometimes a sprinkler system may be designed to apply water faster than the intake rate of the soil will allow. When this happens we find unnecessary ponding or runoff. This can be controlled by the amount of sprinklers in the system and the size nozzle used.

Other things to consider is the size main line and laterals to use. If these lines are too small it will take too much pressure to deliver the amount of water desired through the system. A well designed system should not vary the pressure on the nozzles in the system over five to seven pounds per square inch. If these conditions exist, cost of operation will be unnecessarily high.

The technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assist the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District will assist you with the design of a sprinkler irrigation system if you so desire.

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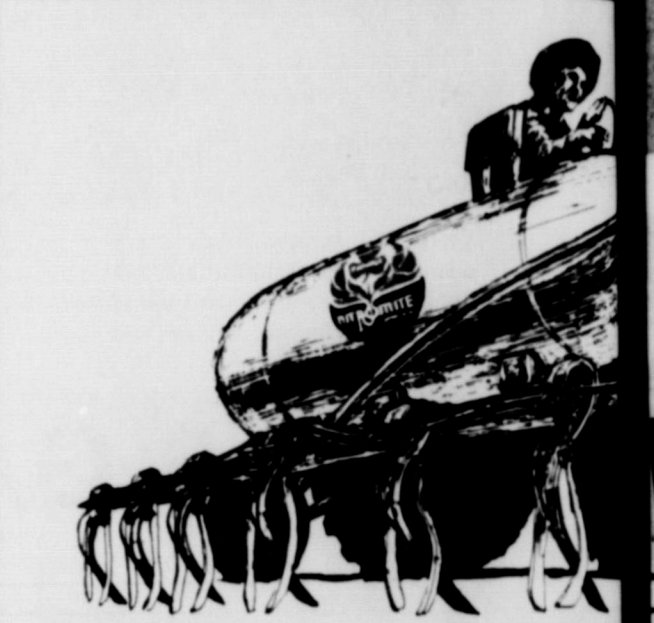

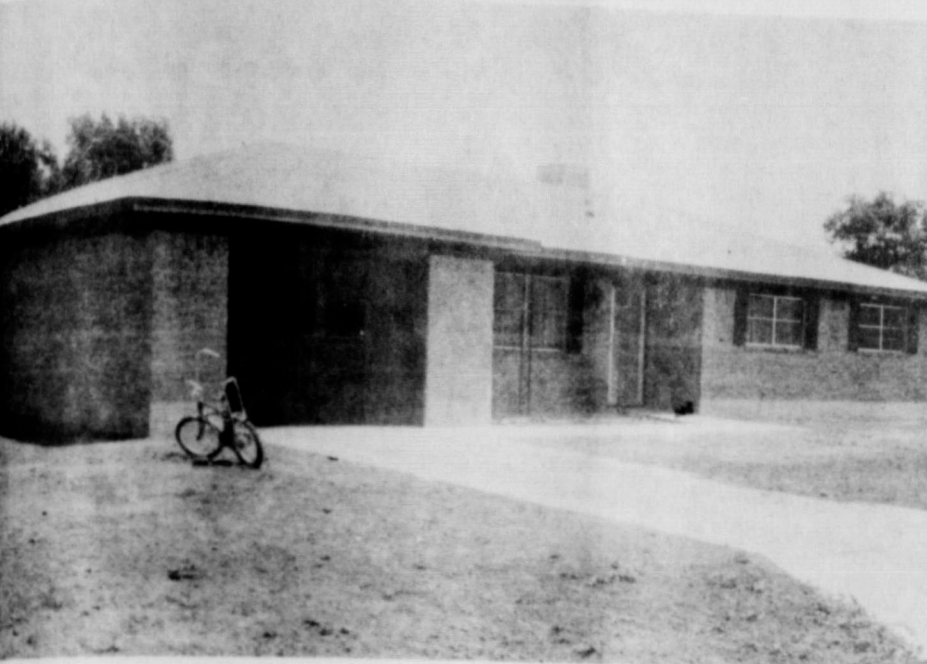

Multiple Agricultural Income: There is a possibility that agricultural income in Wheeler County can be tripled in 1976. For several years, total agricultural income has been pretty well stalemated. Definite trends have been at work that have caused this. Traditional row-cropping practices and growing surplus crops such as cotton, wheat and grain sorghum have pretty well stalemated farm income. Now synthetics threaten cotton. We have been losing 5,000 bales of cotton a year to synthetic fibers. The mini-skirt alone cost us 50,000 bales of cotton in the marketplace just this year.

keeping the grass tender and growing is the key, and growing is the key. period. Stocking at the rate County leaders unanimously endorsed the "\$14 Million in '76" Program. Of course, jumping from \$5 million to \$14 million in 6 years might appear ridiculous to some, but we need to consider that nearly half of this will be contributed by income generated by the feedlot cattle. Government payments are not included in any figures. We hope the leadership of the county will get behind this ambitious income-increasing program. It is going to take a lot of financing but unless we have enough confidence in our own area to back it financially, we will not be able to project our income.
