Post Office Close Window Sat.

Postmaster Virgil Jamison Jr., announced this week that there will be no window service on Saturdays beginning on June 20, 1970. For the sake of economy and small business on Saturdays the decision was made to close the windows on Saturday morning in order to save appreciable amount of money on Saturdays.

It was also announced that Allison, Briscoe, Mobeetie, Wheeler, Twitty, and Shamrock will start the Saturday closing on the same date. Mail will have to be deposited in the Post Office by 10:00 a.m. on Saturdays if it is to be included in the dispatch for that day.

It was explained by Postmaster Jamison that costs have increased until something has to be done to cut operational costs so that the Dallas Region can operate within its budget. The Saturday Closing was worked out because it was felt by the combined Postmasters of all the offices concerned that this would cause the mailing Public less trouble and be less troublesome than other measures.

It was emphasized that the Rural Routes will run and the Mail will be deposited in the boxes as usual. The only change will just be that the Windows will not be open for Sales of Stamps and other business.

BOY SCOUT CAMP ROAD PAVING IS DESIGNATED

County Judge George Hefley received word today that the State Highway Commission had designated the funds for the construction of three miles of pavement and a bridge across Sweetwater Creek. The road, F.M. 3182, is located six miles west of Wheeler and will provide pavement

from highway 152 to the Boy Scout Camp.

A delegation from Wheeler County met with the Highway Commission, and J. C. Dingwall, State Highway Engineer, on June 4, 1970 to request the extension of F.M. 3182 across Sweetwater Creek. D. C. Greer, State Highway Department, served as chairman for the meeting. The meeting was arranged by Virgil Megee, District Engineer.

The collapse of the Sweetwater Creek bridge shortly before the meeting brought about the urgent request for the designated of the road. Judge Hefley, Rep. Malouf

Abraham, John Hmciar of Shamrock and the Commissioners Court were at the meeting.

The request involves about three miles of Farm to Market Road construction at an estimated cost of \$160,000.00, and includes bridges across Sweetwater Creek and Cold Creek.

No definite time for the construction has not been set, but the Judge is hopeful some progress will be under way this summer or fall.

PCA IS No. 10 IN NATION

The Canadian Production credit Association, among the fastest-growing farm-credit organizations in the Southwest in recent years, is now ranked Number Ten in the nation in volume of business and Number Two in Texas.

The Canadian Association, which serves six Northeast Panhandle counties, topped \$50 million in loans in 1969, almost doubling its volume in a single year, to rank tenth in the nation in a list released this week by the Farm Credit Administration in Washington.

The only association in Texas which is topping the Canadian PCA in volume is Plainview, which ranks second in the nation (behind Garden City, Kansas) with \$112,585,000 in loans last year.

The Canadian PCA reached the \$10 million mark for the first time in 1967, having doubled its volume in a single year, and it was predicted at that time the volume would double again in the next two or three years. It did...and then some.

Early in 1969 the Association had moved well above the \$20 million mark...reaching a total volume of more than \$27 million. It was at this time that Larry E. Albin, who had been with the Association as vice-president since 1964, succeeded Erbin L. Crowell as president and general manager of the association (Crowell... now a vice-president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston).

During 1969 it almost doubled its volume again, leading a total of \$50,767,000 to stockholder-members who are farmers, ranchers and feeders in the six-county Northeast Panhandle area.

The "top ten" on the Farm Credit Administration list, in order, are Garden City, Kansas; Plainview, Texas; Guymon, Oklahoma; Portland, Oregon; Mandan, North Dakota; South Omaha, Nebraska; Casper, Wyoming; La Junta, Colorado; Eastern Idaho and Canadian, Texas.

Two other Texas associations are in the top twenty. Winter Garden PCA at Cotulla is No. 14, and Amarillo PCA is 18th.

With the exception of Garden City and Plainview,

which are both over the \$100 million mark, and Guymon which has a total volume of \$60 million, the other seven in the top ten are all in the \$50-\$55 million bracket.

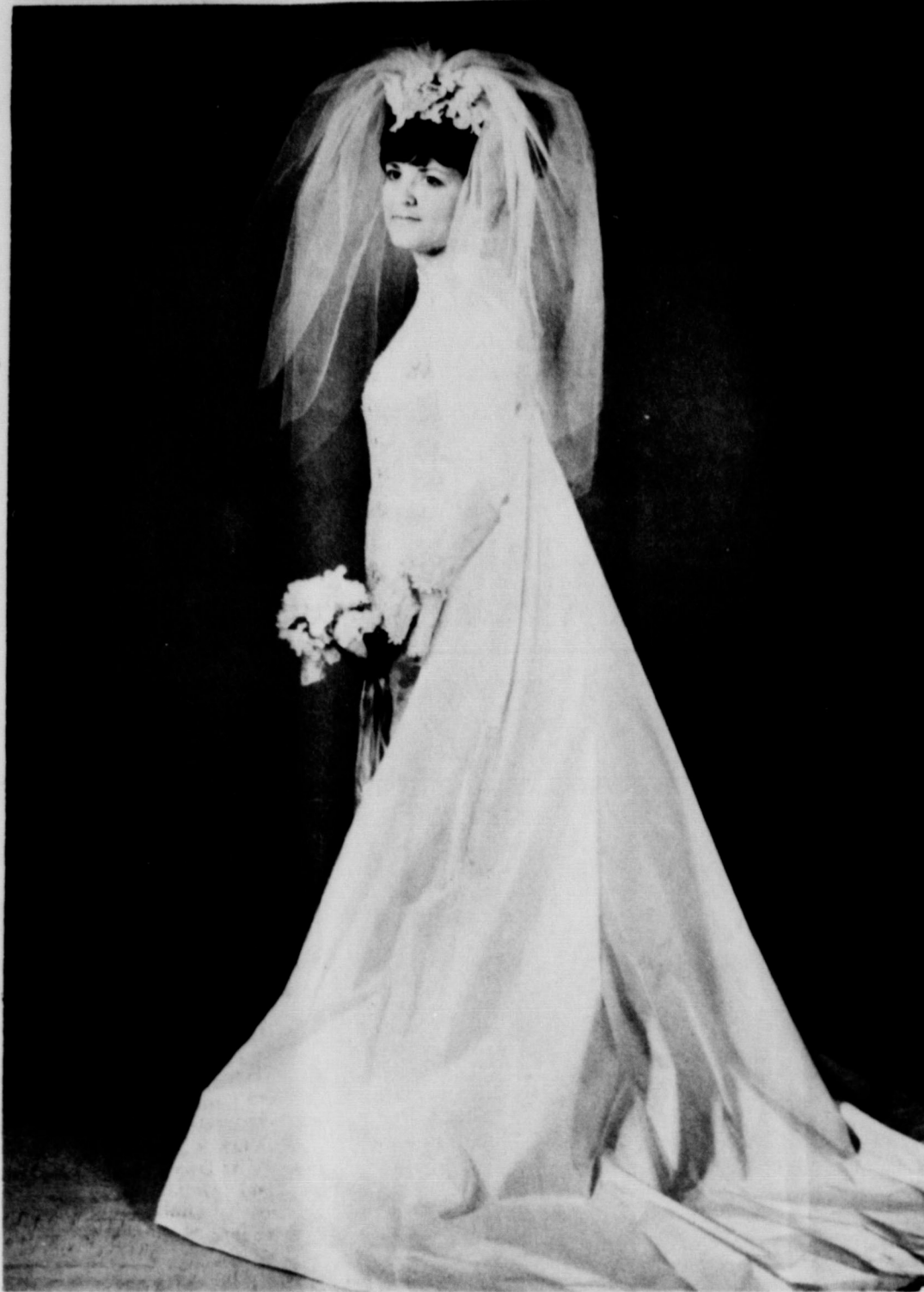
The bride carried out the tradition of wear something old, new, borrowed and blue, with a penny in her shoe. She wore a diamond drop necklace which was a gift from the groom.

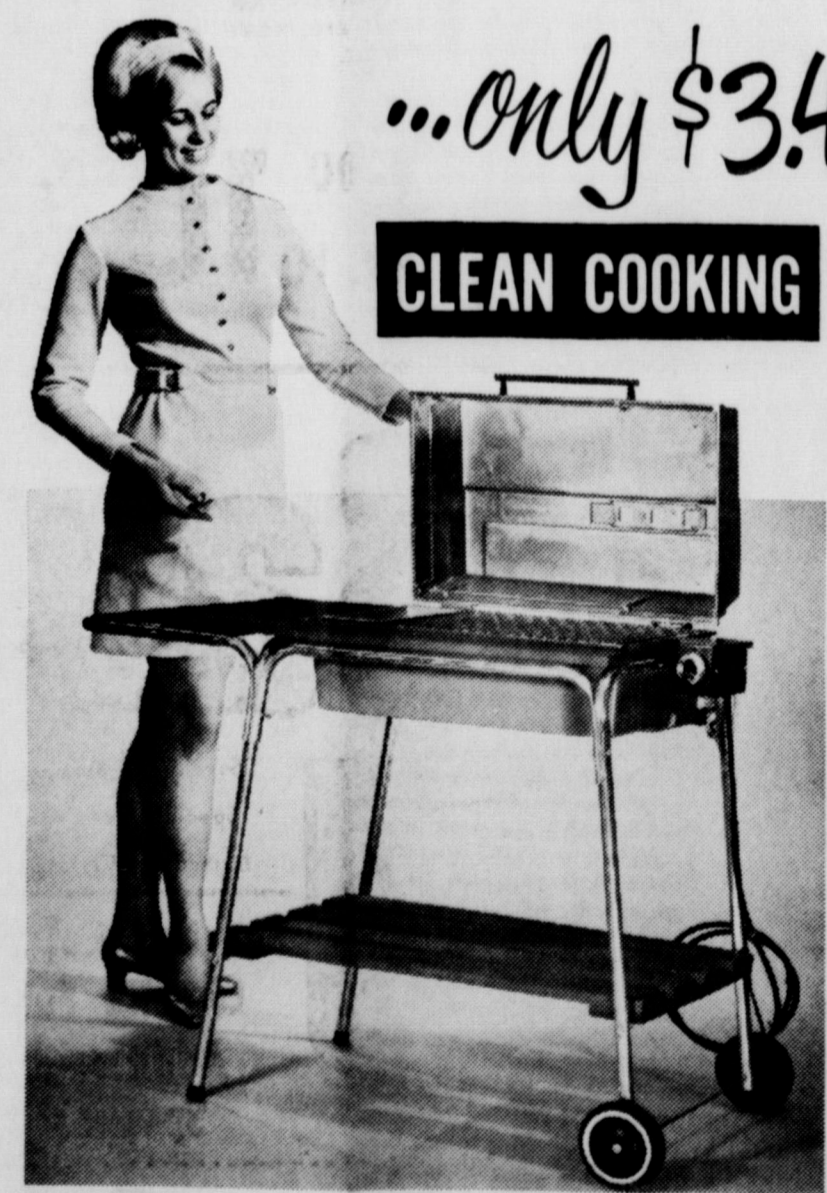

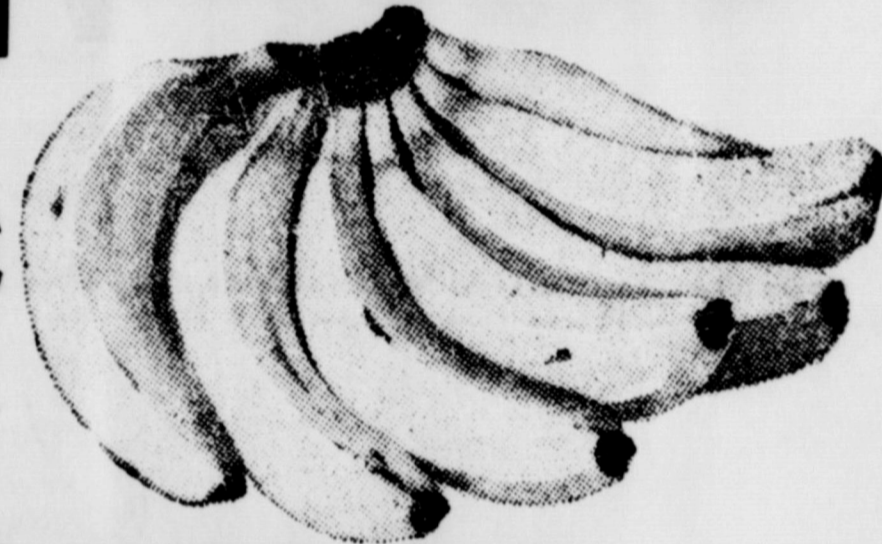
