Post Office Close Window Sat.

Postmaster Virgil Jamison announced this week that there will be no window service on Saturdays beginning June 20, 1970. For the sake of economy and small business on Saturdays the decision was made to close the windows on Saturday morning in order to save a considerable amount of money on Saturdays.

It was also announced that mail will be deposited in the Post Office by 10:00 a.m. on Saturdays if it is to be included in the dispatch for that day.

It was explained by Postmaster Jamison that costs have increased until something had to be done to cut operational costs so that the Dallas office can operate within its budget. The Saturday Closing was worked out because it is felt by the combined Postmasters of all the offices concerned that this would cause a serious Public less trouble and be less troublesome than other measures. It was emphasized that the Rural Routes will run as usual and the Mail will be deposited in the boxes as usual. The only change will just be that the windows will not be open for Sales of Stamps and other business.

Rural Route Time Change

Postmaster Virgil Jamison announced this week that beginning on Saturday, June 20, 1970 the Wheeler Rural Route will leave the office at 8:00 instead of the 10:00 a.m. leaving time he has been observing. This is due to recent changes in getting the mail from the supply source. People wanting to meet the carrier will have to be at their homes sooner than before but later than that the people will get their mail sooner in the day. This is in line with the present policy of getting the mail to all the people possible as soon as possible. Any questions will gladly be answered by inquiry at the Post Office.

Farmers Home Rural Housing Shows Gain Over Nation

The rural housing program is an area of growth in the nation's housing picture, Administration reported today. Mr. Smith disclosed that a rural people served by the home loan insurance program of the Farmers Home Administration, A Department of Agriculture credit agency, are moving into new or improved homes at a 17.4 percent faster rate than a year ago.

The Administrator issued a progress report on the rural FHA's expanding support of home financing for families in the countryside and towns of up to 5,500 population. His report for the first 9 months of fiscal 1970 showed that the agency approved 43,748 home ownership loans totaling \$465.4 million, as against 37,277 loans totaling \$360.7 million in the corresponding period of fiscal 1969.

Mr. Smith said new home starts through his agency will run approximately twice as high this year as in any previous year. Loans for new one family homes under the rural program exceeded 25,000 through March, equalling the number approved for the entire fiscal year 1969. By contrast, new home starts in the nation as a whole declined by an estimated 15.3 percent during the 9-month period ended in March.

The spring seasonal upsurge of building is expected to result in the Farmers Home Administration surpassing \$800 million in insured housing loans for the year ending June 30. The year's activity, Mr. Smith said, will account for about 80,000 new and improved homes for rural Americans of low and moderate income. Last year, the agency's previous record year, Farmers Home insured 500 million worth of loans on 50,000 homes.

The Administrator said Farmers Home is gearing up for a major role it has been assigned under the nation's housing goal for the 1970's. Half of the 6 million publicly-assisted housing loans projected in this decade are assigned to rural areas, where Farmers Home advisers provide assistance to housing through a system of 1,700 rural county offices in the 50 States, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

The agency is aiming for 156,000 insured homebuyer loans for low and moderate income people in fiscal 1971. Under authority conferred by the Housing Act of 1969, Farmers Home has launched this spring a new type of 2-year loan to public and private nonprofit organizations to develop homebuilding sites lacking in rural areas, and a "conditional commitment" to builders certifying that homes they construct will qualify for Farmers Home-insured loans to homebuyers. Building sites improved with Farmers Home financing will be sold as sites for homes of low to moderate income families who can secure housing loans insured by the Farmers Home Administration or its counterpart FHA (Federal Housing Administration) at the Department of Housing and Urban Development. These sites also are available for rental housing for low and moderate income families.

"The rural program is going to be a sustained attack on the shortage of housing and blight of bad housing in rural America," Mr. Smith said. "The average house we are financing is a 3-bedroom home, modern in its facilities,

costing \$12,000 to \$13,000 to build in a rural area. It is fully adequate for the family that will occupy it, and it can be bought and paid for by a rural family of modest means.

Funds for the agency's insured housing loans come from local lending institutions, or investors in other places if local lenders cannot be found. Farmers Home Financing is available to families only after it is established that they cannot qualify for housing credit from other sources. All Farmers Home loans are made through the agency's local county offices in rural areas. The local office is located at 112 W Oklahoma St. in Wheeler.

Across the Fence

Cotton farmers are in a tight situation. Many have fertilizer and herbicides in the ground. High winds damaged cotton severely that was already up. Some are considering planting Guar, an oil seed legume that can be harvested with conventional combines. There is a ready market at Vernon and producers are guaranteed \$4.60 per cwt. and the seed is furnished. Yields on a result demonstration at Kelton a few years ago ran a out 1100 pounds to the acre. Be sure and report blown out cotton to the ASCS office before planting. More than likely, you'll be able to pick seed and a contract at the McWhorter Grain Co. in Wheeler. We understand that you'll be able to plant guar on your allotted cotton acres but you'll want to lead the ASCS office know your intentions.

We've been getting a lot of questions concerning the banning of 2,4,5-T herbicide from uses in the yard and garden. The USDA cancelled several uses of the herbicide, including application to food crops. However, this was done in what a low new register, the Des Moines Register, described as "The Danger that Wasn't." The Food and Drug Administration residue tests found 2,4,5-T present in only 25 of 5300 samples of food crops. And the residue amount was so small a pregnant woman would have to eat 147,000 pounds of the "contaminated" food per day to receive the equivalent dose of 2,4,5-T given to laboratory mice that produced birth defects. It's still ok to spray range and pasturelands, though.

Grazing Study—The heifer calves gained one pound a head per day during May on Ermo Weeping Love grass. This was not a phenomenal gain but very outstanding when you consider that the grass was growing on last fall's moisture. We will continue the study hoping for additional moisture in June. The goal of the grazing study is to see if \$100 pounds since April 15. Crude Protein value of the grass was 14% during April, a little less than alfalfa.

Are you fully employed? We are continually asked these questions by farmers and ranchers who ask what resources are needed for full employment in an agricultural enterprise and what are the returns. If you are looking for full employment in beef cow-calf operations it will take 300 mother cows. An estimated

Plenty Of Electricity Available

"Don't hold back. Use all the electric power you want whenever and wherever you want in the 45,000 square mile area that we serve. There is no electric power shortage in this part of the country," Roy Talk, president of the Southwestern Public Service Company, said today.

The statement of the electric company president was made as a result of frequent articles in national magazines and other media which leave the implication that the whole nation faces a power shortage not only this year but "in the decade ahead," as one publication put it.

"At the end of last year, when we announced our plan to invest \$25,000,000 in new plant and equipment this year, I said, 'There'll be no blackouts in our service area in 1970.' That still goes. I'll add at this time that there won't be any in the future, either, as long as we have the right to plan our own future without outside interference. We have a responsibility to meet the electric services needs of this area and we have done

the planning required to carry out that responsibility." Talk continued.

Southwestern Public Service Company has generating capability reserves that are 18% greater than the peak load which has been predicted for 1970.

"That's like saying you have \$118 put aside to pay a \$100 bill that you owe," Talk pointed out.

Adequate reserves are normally considered to be generating capability that is equal to the largest single generating unit on your system. Southwestern's reserve capability for 1970 exceeds that margin of safety by nearly 100,000 kilowatts.

Southwestern is already looking down the line at its next 500,000 kilowatts of electric generating capability. At the present time, a 210,000 kilowatt unit, the first in a new facility south-east of Lubbock, is under construction and is scheduled to go into service in mid-1971. Projected units of 289,000 kilowatts of capability are in the planning stage for 1973 and beyond.

"With the help of our area development department and in cooperation with other local industrial development groups, I have started to write to presidents of some companies and to telephone others whose organizations are interested in expansion to tell them of the availability of electric power and other resources in this area. We have outstanding people, lots of space for expansion, a superb climate and energy reserves. Not many areas can say that these days and all of us should work to benefit from these advantages," Talk concluded.

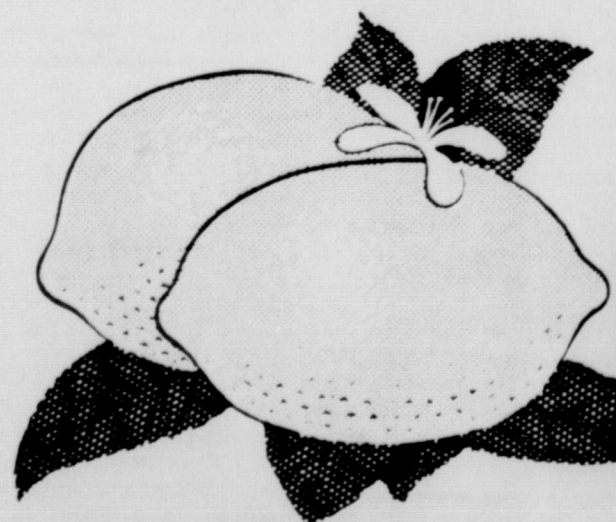
