PARADE, BARBEQUE, RODEO—ALL TODAY

1400 POUNDS OF BEEF ARE BEING PREPARED



1400 lbs. of beef were put on to cook at the Wheeler Rodeo Grounds in preparation for the free barbecue which will precede the first night of the 15th Annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo.

Added this year for the first time was the Junior Rodeo which was held Wednesday evening.

The first of the activities slated for today, July 16, will be the parade at 4:00. This year's parade will feature riding clubs, wagon trains, antique cars and commercial floats from Pampa, Wheeler and surrounding areas.

The parade will take the same route as was taken last year. The parade will form at the vacant gin lot. The group will travel west to main street and turn south. At 10th Street, the parade will turn east and go to Parkview Hospital. The paraders will disperse after they pass in front of the hospital.

The barbecue is scheduled to begin at 6:00 p.m. at the rodeo grounds. John Hodges will again be in charge of preparing and cooking the meat. Serving the barbecue will be Wheeler businessmen and Riding Club members.

Everyone attending the Thursday evening performance of the rodeo will be served free barbecue donated by Wheeler merchants, individuals and Riding Club members.

Rodeo performances will be held at 8:00 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 16-17-18.

Producer of the rodeo will be Charley Plummer of Elk City, Okla.

Six events will be included in the rodeo this year. They will be bareback bronc riding, calf roping, girls barrel race, bull dogging, bull riding and heading and heeling.

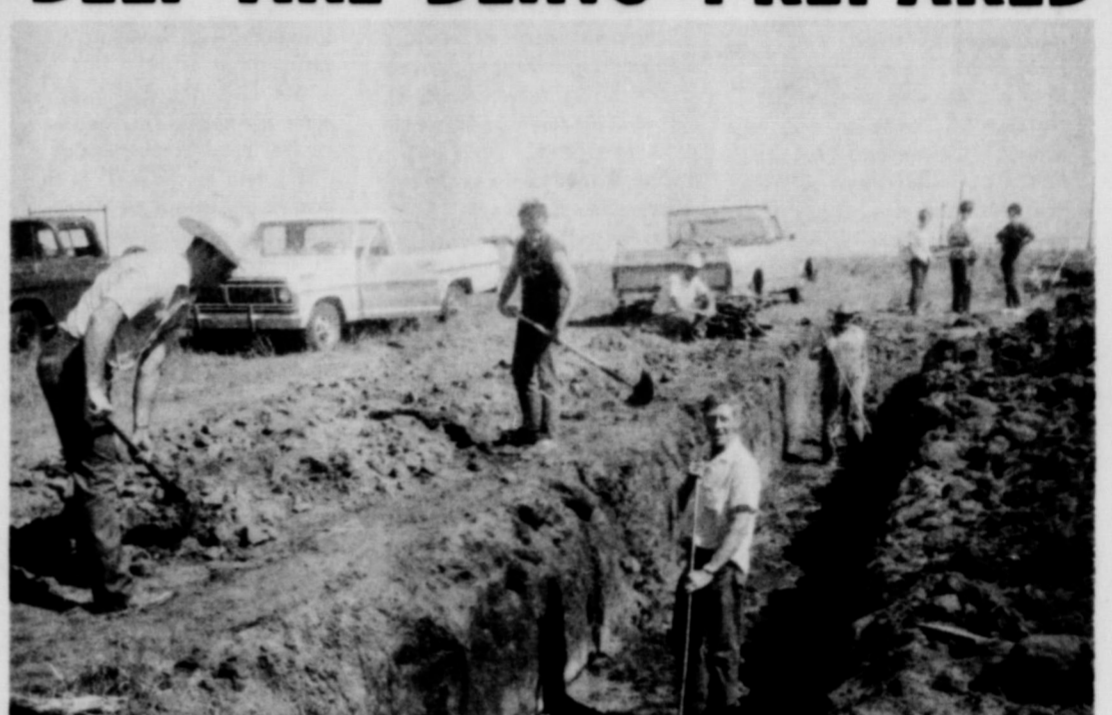
Farmers Supply is rodeo headquarters. Entries close at 12:00 noon Thursday and persons interested in competing should contact Farmers Supply at 826-3215.

Entry fees are \$5, \$15, \$20, and \$22. The entry fee for the barrel race is \$5 for one run. The entry fee for bareback bronc riding, bull dogging and bull riding is \$15. The entry fee for calf roping is \$20 and heading and heeling is \$22 (one ground).

Admission will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children.

Across the Fence

Normal rainfall last month was about 4 inches more than we received. Businessmen on the street are affected too by the drought. Folks don't do much talking about it, but our area is hurt plenty. Fall rains can put us back on our feet since the stocker-calf programs many people are in begin in the fall. Bill Brooks, District Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, said a lot of people were glad they had some weeping-love grass in the drought. We've got a little moi sture about 2 feet down and that's where the roots of that grass are.

4-H Horsemen to Compete For District Honors—The top 4-H Horsemen in Wheeler County will compete in the Extension District 1 4-H Horse Show at Amarillo, Friday, July 24, with hopes of qualifying for state competition.

The district show will be held in the Bill Cody Arena at the Amarillo Fair Grounds. About 150 4-H boys and girls from the 22 Panhandle counties in the district are expected to participate.

Registration will start at 8 a.m. and judging will get underway at 9:00 a.m. Official judge for the show will be Roland Moore of Plainview. Halter classes will be judged first and will be followed by showmanship, western pleasure, reining, pole bending

and barrel racing. The top 20 contestants from the district-wide show will be eligible to compete in the State 4-H Horse Show which will be held at the same location August 6, 7 and 8.

Beef can treat themselves with safe, approved insecticides to control the troublesome horn flies that attack during warm weather.

All that is needed, is a self-applier bag properly stocked with dust containing either three percent Clodrin or a one percent coumaphos (Co-Ral) and located so the cattle will contact the bag as they go about their daily routine.

Locate the bag in the gateway to a fenced off watering trough, a salt box or in the entrance to a resting area. Commercial, ready-filled bags can be purchased from livestock supply outlets or they can be inexpensively made. All that is needed are a few medium to fine mesh burlap bags, and a few grommets to serve as hook eyes. A roof to protect the de-

vice from rainy weather strongly recommended. Stock each double-bag with 5 to 10 pounds the selected insecticide hang them in pairs in a way the animals will be ed to walk between the

Cream Puffs

1/2 cup crisco
1/2 cup boiling water
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs

Stir crisco in the water over low heat until melted. Add flour and salt all at once. Beat until smooth. Remove from heat.

Add eggs one at a time beating mixture.

Drop by tablespoon on greased cookie sheet. Bake for 10 minutes at 450 degrees then reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake for 20 minutes. Puffs should be golden and crisp. Cool and slice with sharp knife. Fill with favorite puddings. Makes approximately 8 large puffs.

Refrigerator biscuits with the middle cut out and deep fried make good doughnuts. Roll cooked doughnuts in powdered sugar or cinnamon sugar mixture.

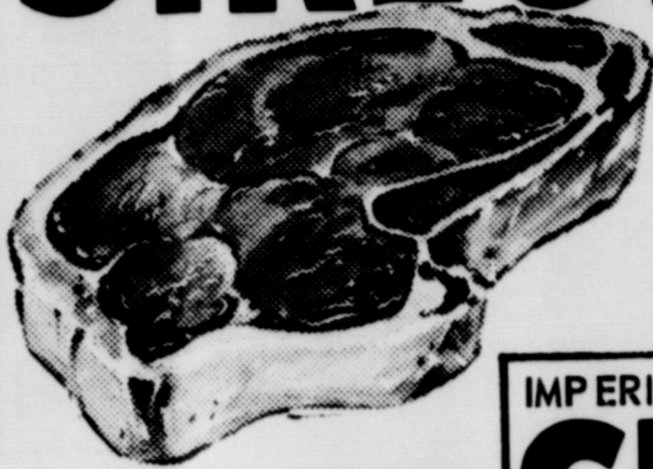

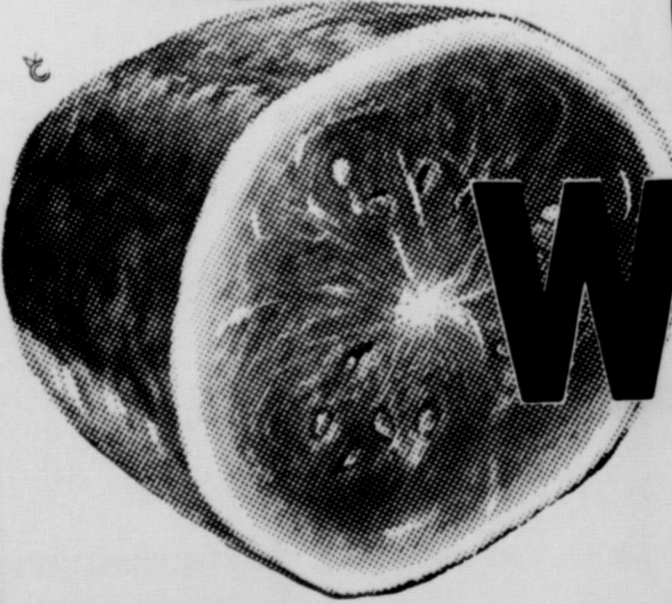
