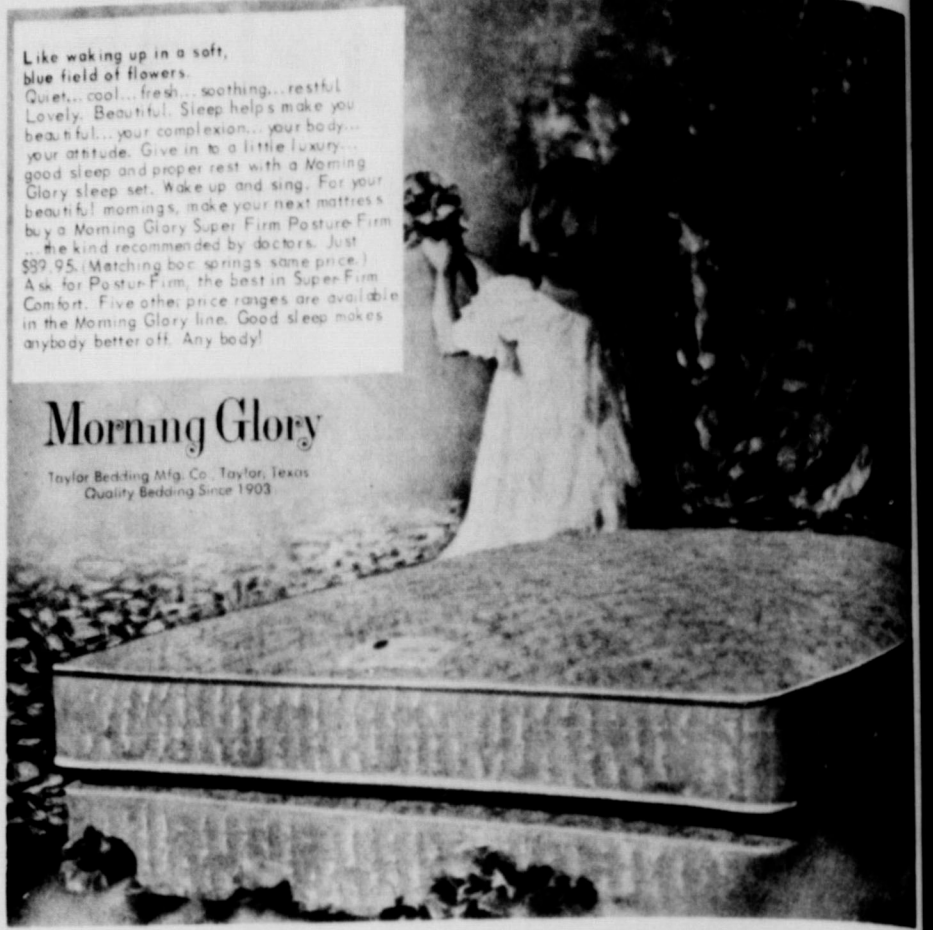

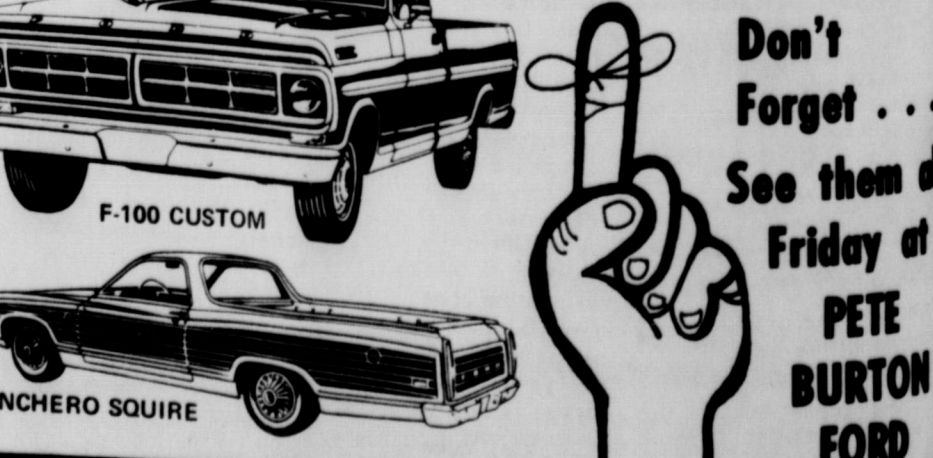

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Across the Fence

 Grazing is short. Many cattle producers will be tempted to graze the residue of cotton and maize crops. Fields treated with most defoliant, dessicants, insecticides and some herbicides should not be grazed by cattle. Agricultural chemicals, commonly used as herbicides, insecticides, defoliant and dessicants are necessary for profitable cotton production in Texas. Some of these chemicals are highly toxic to livestock and animal death can occur when treated fields are grazed. Follow all label instructions when chemicals are used, and if in doubt about grazing restrictions, check with us before livestock are permitted to graze treated fields.

Speaking of chemicals, the effects of 2,4,5-T and to a lesser extent 2,4-D on man and other organisms have been the subject of much of the recent press releases in newspapers and magazines. Henry Verhulst, Pharmacist Director of the Poison Control Division of the Office of Product Safety says he has had no reports of serious illnesses from the occupational uses of 2,4-D or 2,4,5-T. In 1963 there was, however, one case of numbness and tingling of hands and feet in a 39 year old farmer. Individuals differ in many respects, he says, including response to chemical exposure. Since no antidote to 2,4-D intoxication is known, prevention is simpler than treatment. We hope that people using agricultural chemicals will take every precaution to minimize exposure. Rubber gloves, chemical masks, and getting out of soiled clothing quickly are all helpful.

Tribute to the Cow- The cow is a mobile, animated machine housed in unprocessed leather. One end is equipped with a mower, grinder and other standard equipment, including bumpers, headlights, wing-flaps and fog horn. At the other end is a milk dispenser and insect repellent. Although mysterious and secret, this plant is unpatented. It is available in various sizes, colors and output ranging from one to 20 tons of milk a year.

Plant swapping often gives the intended beneficiary a great deal more than realized in the original bargain. Root-Knot nematodes and a whole host of root-rots may hitch a ride on the newly acquired plants and come as an "extra bonus" with the bargain. This in turn may serve to infest a complete flower bed or an entire farm.

New plants should be carefully inspected before planting to make sure that all parts appear normal. If doubt exists the plant should be sacrificed in the interest of protecting existing plants. Most plant disease organisms are difficult to eliminate once they become established.

Root-Knot nematodes are probably the most commonly transported plant problem. The life cycle occurs inside plant root tissues with egg, larval, and male forms present in the soil. Transport of fill soil may also move the organism from one place to another. Once established, growers are faced with the control alternatives of using resistant plants or menadic chemicals to reduce nematode populations in the soil. The grower's best protection lies in being able to recognize symptoms of plant diseases and then carefully observing newly acquired plant materials. The smart gardener doesn't let plant swapping turn into a nematode and plant disease exchange.

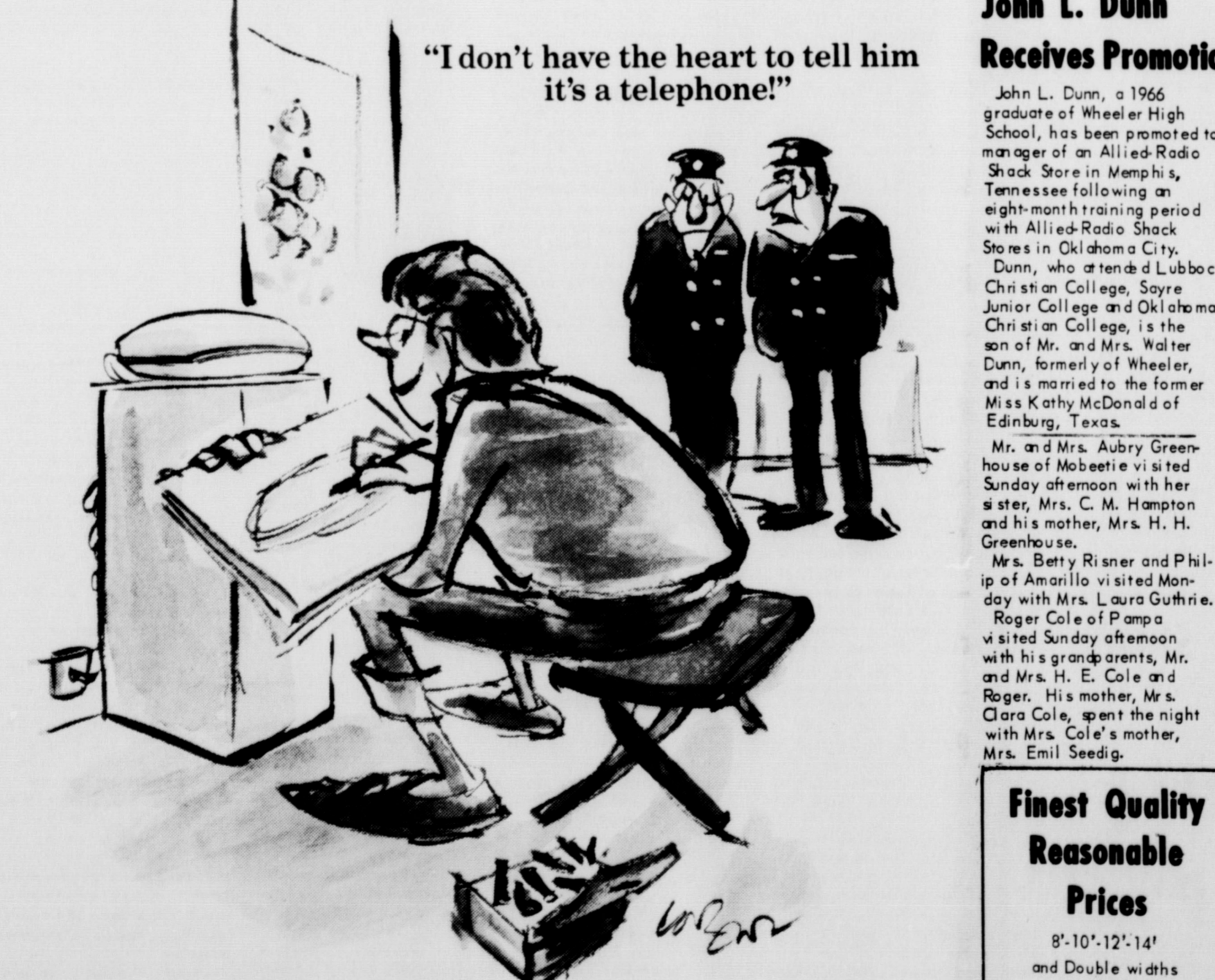

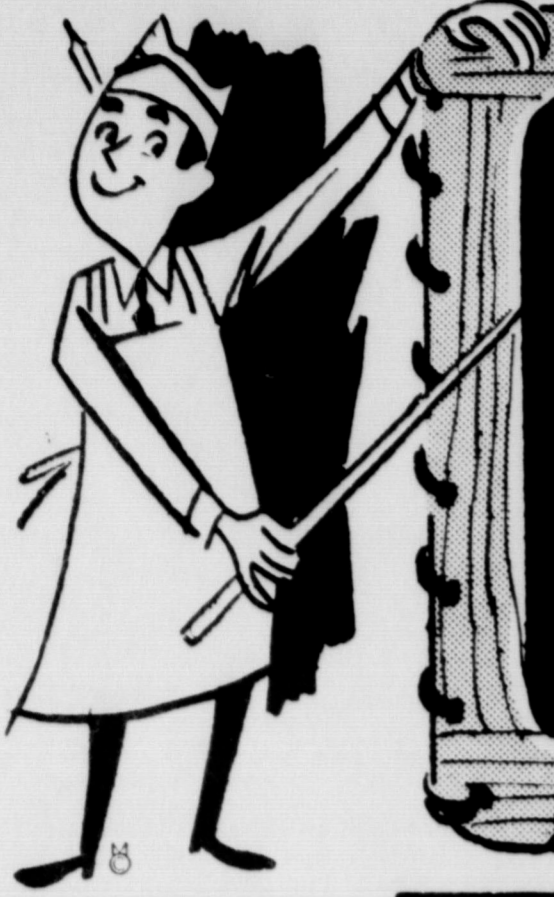
